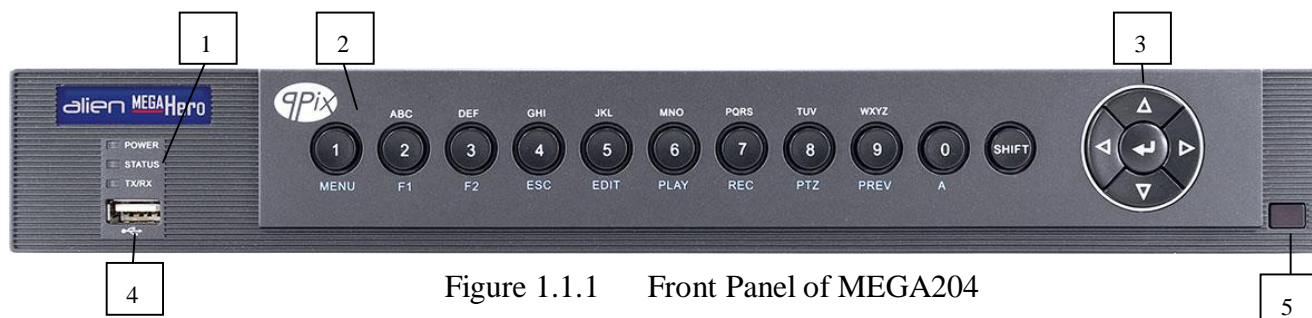


Figure 1.1.1 Front Panel of MEGA204

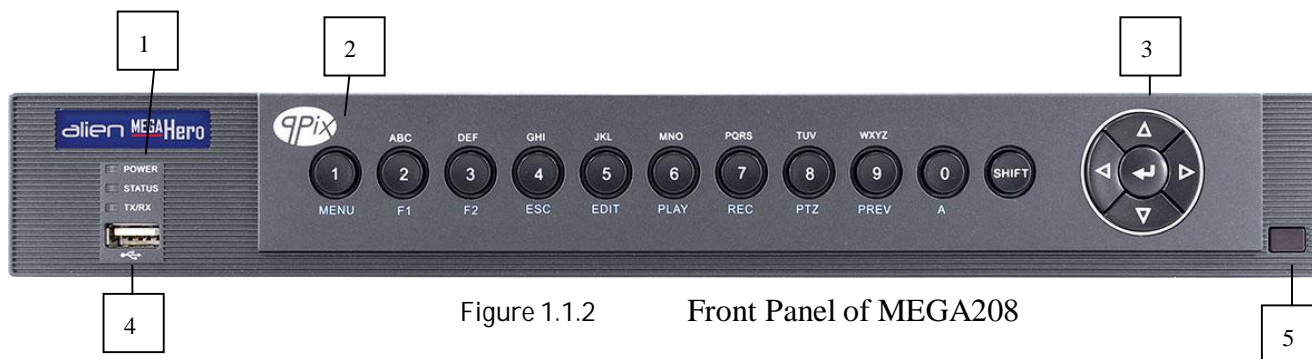


Figure 1.1.2 Front Panel of MEGA208

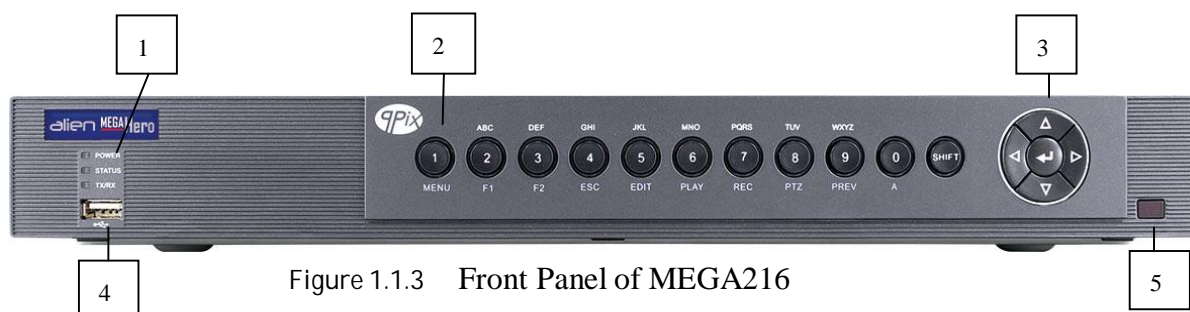


Figure 1.1.3 Front Panel of MEGA216

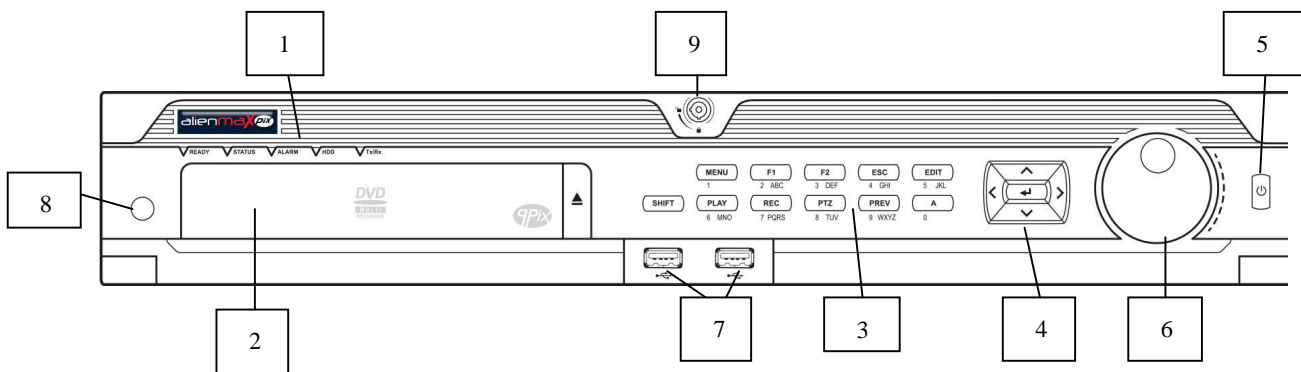


Figure 1.1.4 Front Panel of MAX316

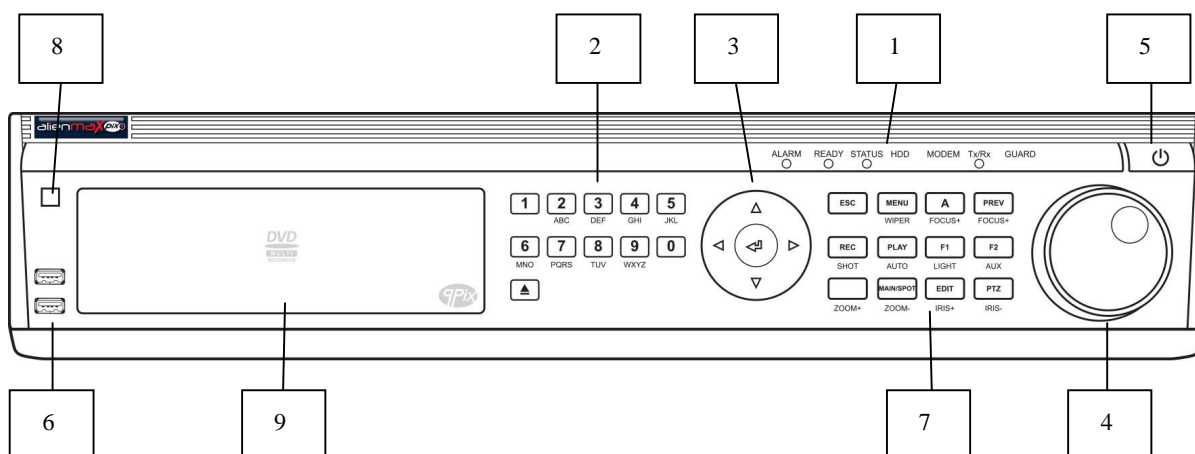


Figure 1.1.5 Front Panel of MAX416

1.2 IR Remote Control Operations

The DVR may also be controlled with the included IR remote control. Batteries (2×AAA) must be installed before operation. There are two versions of the IR Remote. The one detailed below is the Advanced IR Remote that can be used to control most functions in the DVR but is only supplied with the Max series of DVR. However the standard MEGA DVR is shipped with a basic IR remote which has limited functionality.

Troubleshooting Remote Control:

Make sure you have install batteries properly in the remote control. Aim the remote control at the IR receiver on the front panel. If there is no response after you press any button on the remote, follow the procedure below to troubleshoot.

Steps:

1. Go into Menu > Settings > General > More Settings by operating the front control panel or the mouse.
2. Check and remember DVR ID number. The default ID is 255. Press the DEV button on the remote control.
3. Enter the DVR ID number in step 2.
4. Press the ENTER button on the remote.

If the Status indicator on the front panel turns blue, the remote control is operating properly. If the Status indicator does not turn blue and there is still no response from the remote, please check the following:

1. Batteries are installed correctly and the polarities of the batteries are not reversed.
2. Batteries are fresh and not flat.
3. IR receiver is not obstructed.

If the remote still cannot function properly, please change the remote and try again.

1.3 USB Mouse Operation

A regular 3-button (Left/Right/Scroll-wheel) USB mouse can also be used with this DVR. To use a USB mouse:

Steps:

1. Plug USB mouse into one of the USB interfaces on the front panel of the DVR.
2. The mouse should automatically be detected. If in a rare case the mouse is not detected, the possible reason may be that the two devices are not compatible. In which case try another mouse.

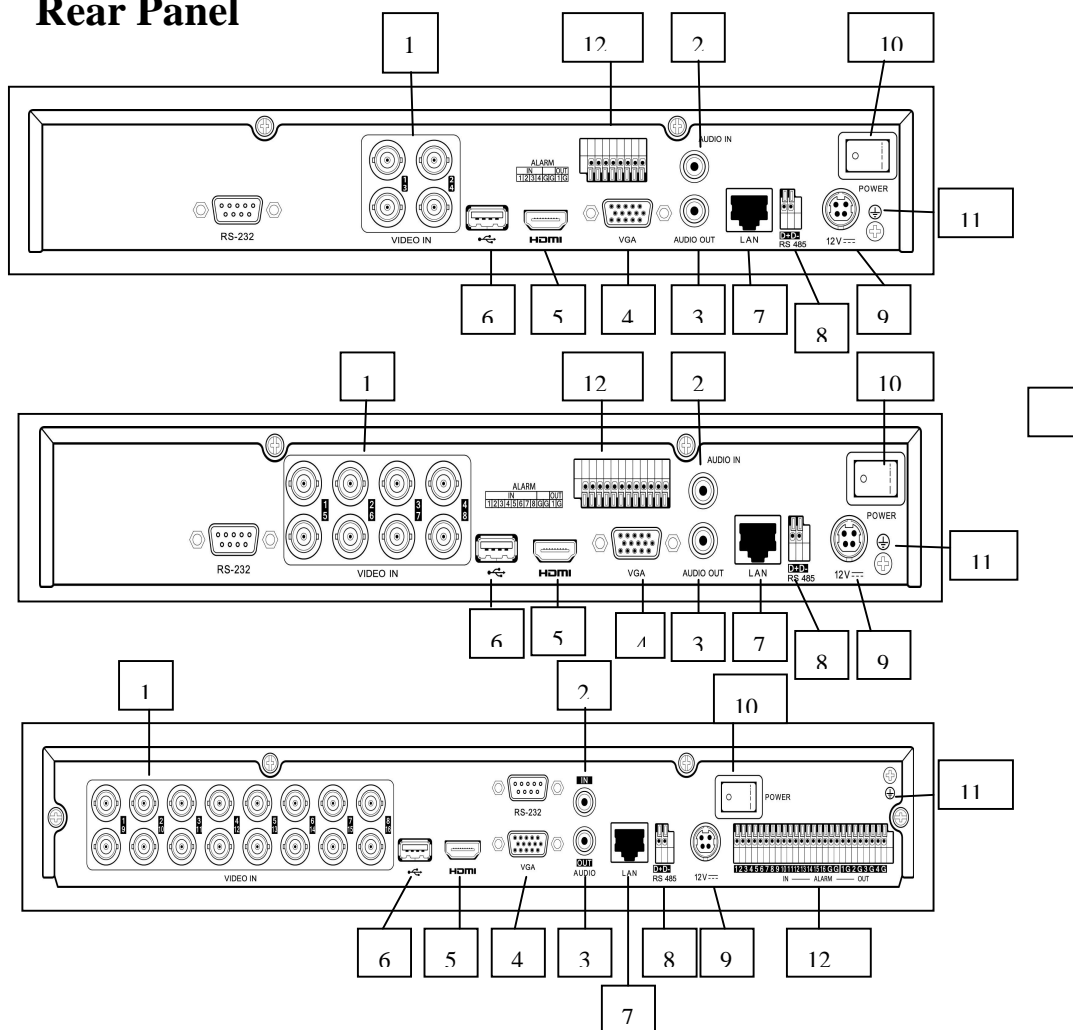


Figure 1.5.1 MEGA204 / MEGA208 / MEGA216

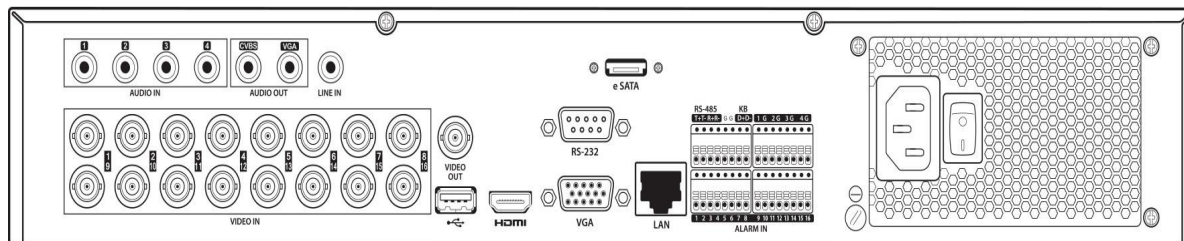


Figure 1.5.2 MAX316

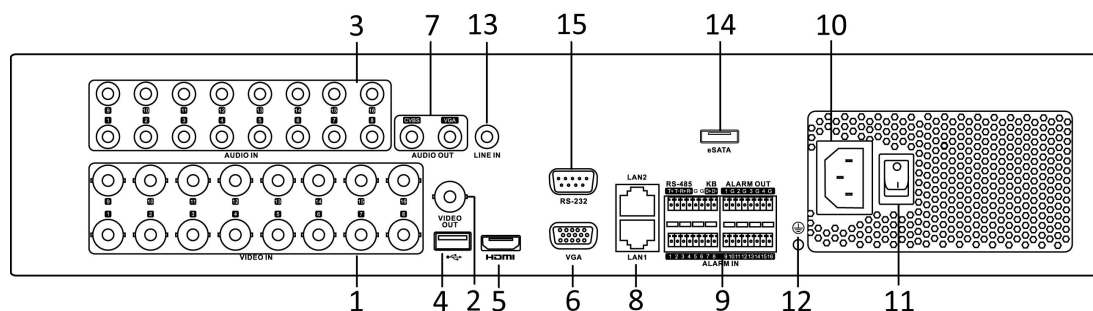


Figure 1.5.3 MAX416

Chapter 2 Getting Started

2.1 Starting Up and Shutting Down the DVR

Purpose:

Proper startup and shutdown procedures are crucial for extending the life of the DVR.

Before you start:

If the DVR uses an external power supply check that the voltage matches the DVR's requirement.

Starting the DVR

Steps:

1. Check the power supply is plugged into an electrical outlet. It is **HIGHLY** recommended that an Uninterruptible Power Supply (UPS) be used in conjunction with the device.
2. Turn on the power switch on the rear panel, and the Power indicator LED should turn on indicating that the unit is starting the bootup procedure.
3. After startup, the Power indicator LED remains on.
4. Click the right mouse button and select Menu, or Menu button on the front panel of the DVR if applicable, to enter the Menu Welcome screen.

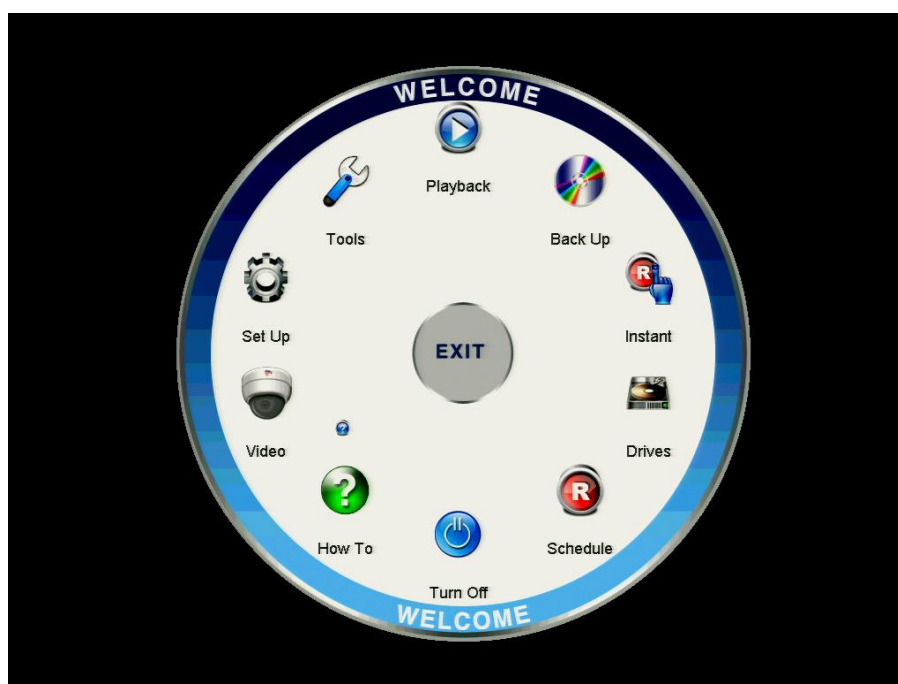


Figure 2.1.1 Menu Welcome Screen

Shutting down the DVR

Steps:

There are two correct ways to shut down the DVR. To shut down the DVR:

- **OPTION 1: Standard shutdown**

1. Enter the Shutdown menu.

Menu > Turn Off

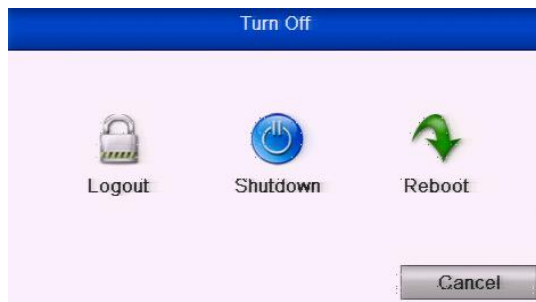


Figure 2.1.2 Shutdown Menu

2. Select the **Shutdown** button.
3. Click the **Yes** button.
4. Turn off the power switch on the rear panel following display below.

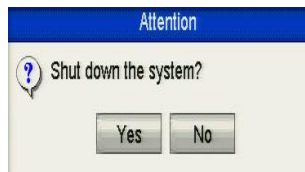


Figure 2.1.3 Shutdown Display

- **OPTION 2: By operating the front panel (for MAX316 and MAX416)**
 1. Press and hold the POWER button on the front panel for 3 seconds.
 2. Enter the administrator's username and password in the dialogue box for authentication.
 3. Click the **Yes** button.

SPECIAL NOTE

- Do not press the POWER button again when the system is shutting down.
- The device remains in standby mode after shutting down, and the POWER indicator turns red; you can turn on the device by pressing the POWER button on the remote control.

Rebooting the DVR

Steps:

1. Enter the **Shutdown** menu by clicking Menu > Shutdown.
2. Click the **Logout** button to log out or the **Reboot** button to reboot the DVR.

2.2 Using the Wizard for Basic Configuration

As the DVRs are setup when the hard drives are installed, using the Setup Wizard is generally not necessary. However if for whatever reason the unit needs to be set for basic operation, then this facility may be useful. You can cancel options not required as you run through the setup.

If initiated the Setup Wizard will start once the DVR has loaded, as shown below.

Steps:

1. Please select the resolution of the monitor in the drop-down list.

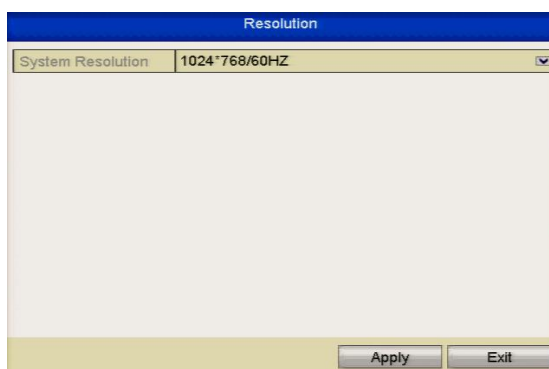


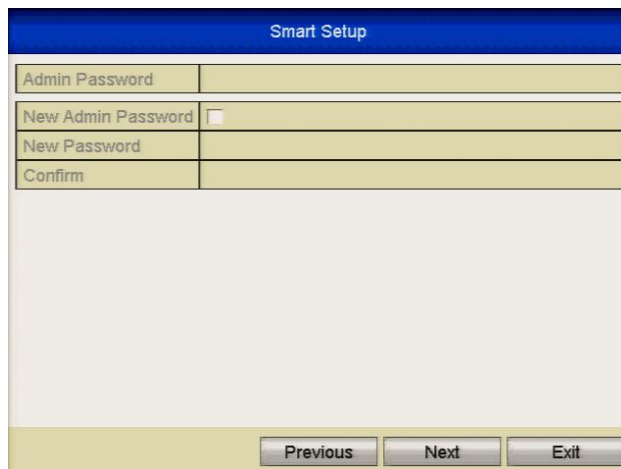
Figure 2.2.1 Resolution Selection

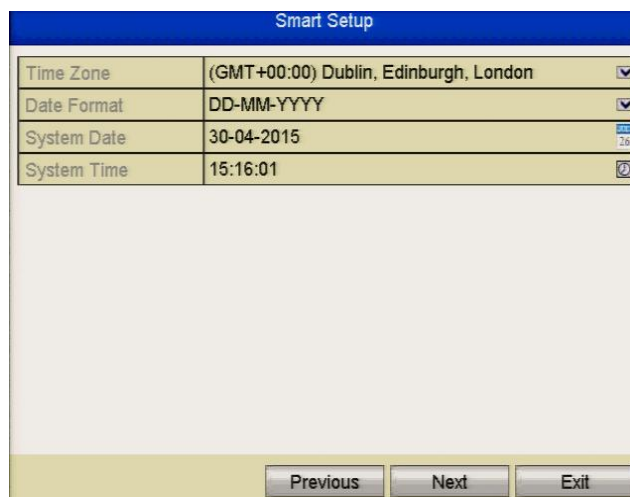

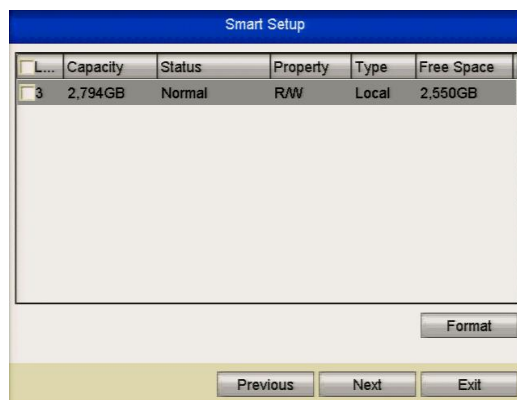


Figure 2.2.7 HDD Management

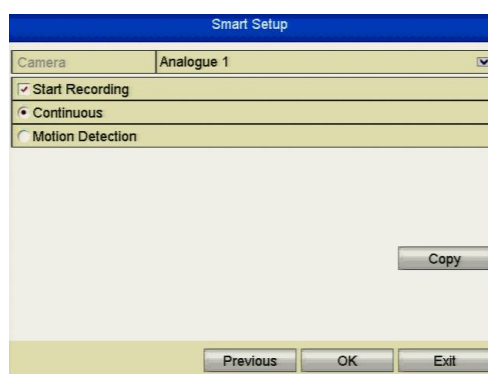


Figure 2.2.9 Record Settings

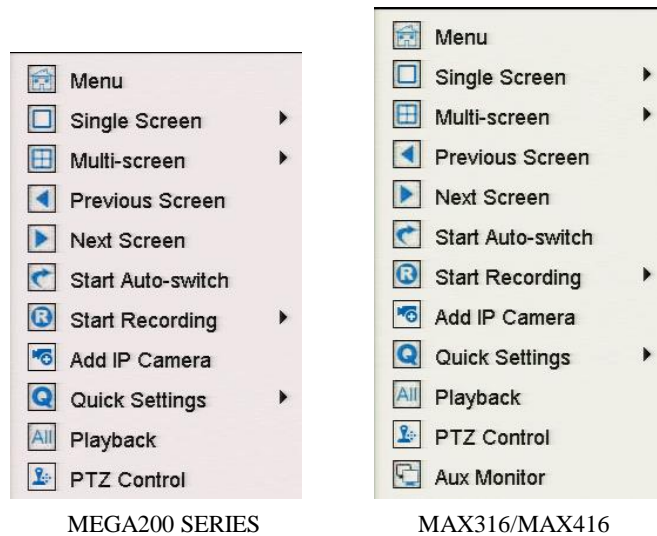


Figure 2.3.1.1 Right-click Menu

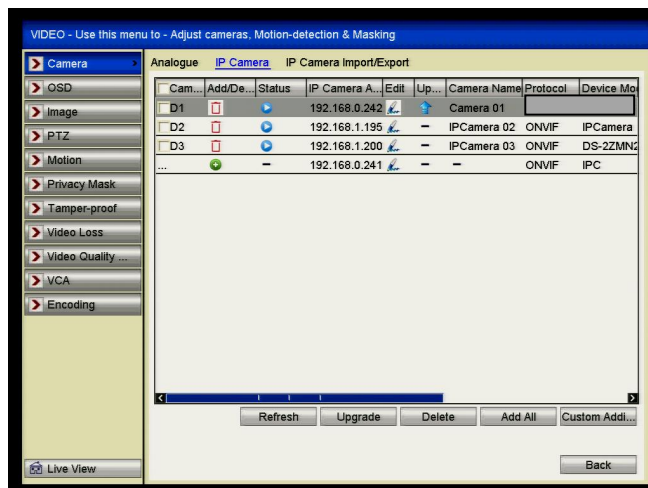










Figure 2.3.1.2 Adding IP Camera Interface

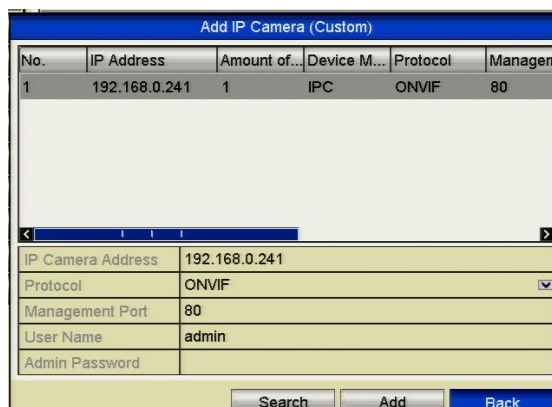


Figure 2.3.1.3 Custom Adding IP Camera Interface

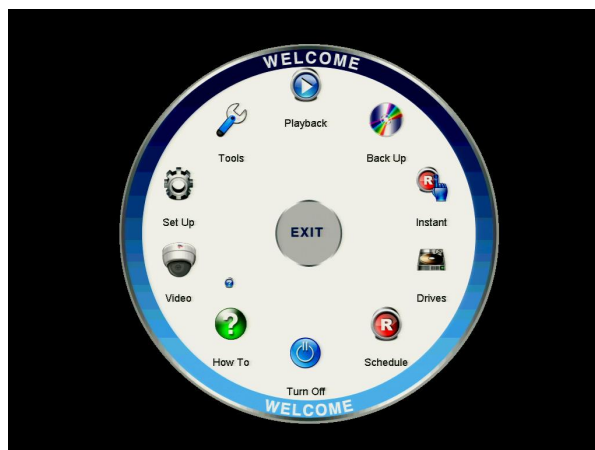









Figure 2.3.1.4 Main Menu

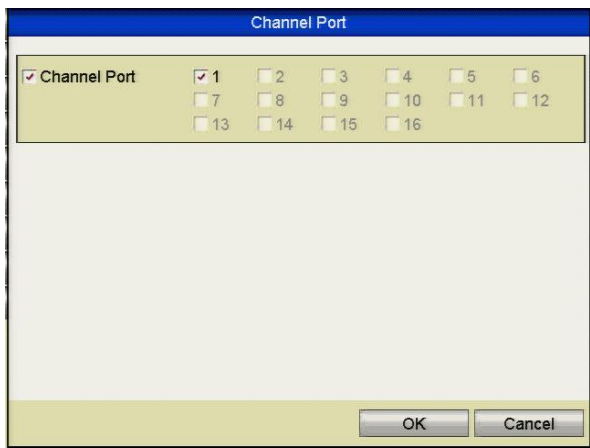



Figure 2.3.1.6 Selecting Multiple Channels

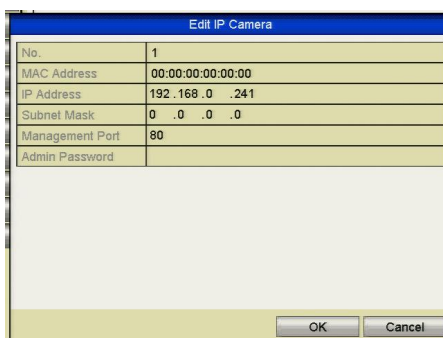



Figure 2.3.2.1 Edit the Parameters

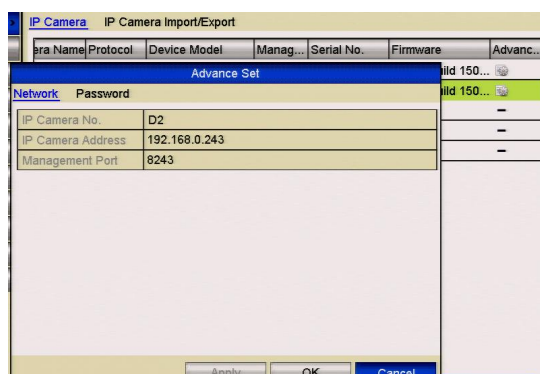


Figure 2.3.2.2 Network Configuration of the Camera

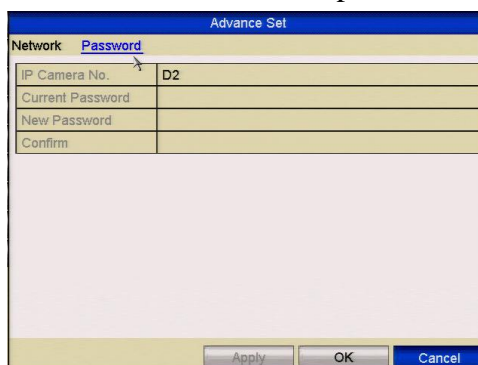


Figure 2.3.2.3 Password Configuration of the Camera

Chapter 3 Live View

3.1 Introduction to Live View

Live view shows you the video image from each camera in real time. The DVR will automatically enter Live View mode when powered on. It is also at the very top of the menu hierarchy, thus hitting the ESC many times (depending on which menu you're on) will bring you to the Live View mode.

Live View Icons

In the live view mode, there are icons at the right top of the screen for each channel, showing the status of the record and/or alarm of the relevant channel.

Icons	Description
	Alarm (video loss, tampering, motion detection or sensor alarm)
	Record (manual record, schedule record, motion detection or alarm triggered record)
	Alarm & Record

3.2 Operations in Live View Mode

In live view mode, there are many functions provided. The functions are listed below.

- **Single Screen:** show only one channel on the monitor.
- **Multi-screen:** show multiple channels on the monitor simultaneously.
- **Auto-switch:** the screen is auto switched to the next one. You must set the dwell time for each screen in the configuration menu before enabling the auto-switch. Menu>Configuration>Live View>Dwell Time.
- **Start Recording:** normal record and motion detection record are supported.
- **Quick Set:** select the output mode to Standard, Bright, Gentle or Vivid.
- **Playback:** play back the recorded videos for current day.
- **Aux/Main output switch:** the DVR checks the connection of the output interfaces to define the main and auxiliary output interfaces. When the aux output is enabled, the main output is inoperable but you can do some basic operations in live view mode using the Aux output.

The MEGA204,MEGA208 and MEGA216 models do not support Aux/Main output switch.

The priority level for the main and aux output for the MAX316 and MAX416 models for the main and aux output is HDMI/VGA>CVBS.

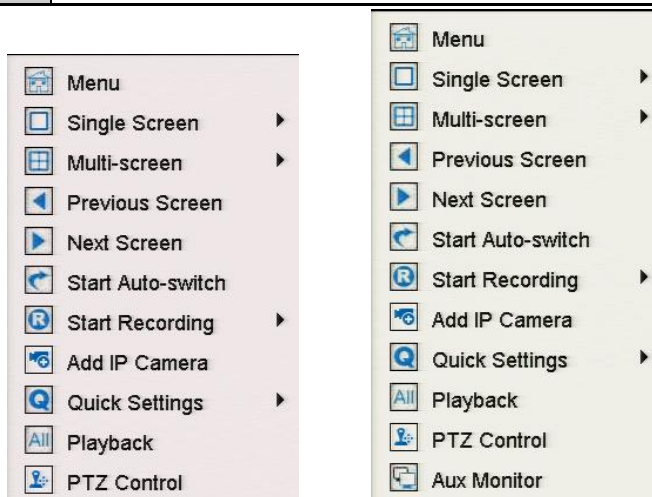

3.2.3 Main/Aux Output Switching

The MEGA204, MEGA208 and MEGA216 models do not support Aux/Main output switch.

When the HDMI/VGA output is configured as the main output, you can perform the following operation to switch to CVBS output as the main output.

Steps:

1. Use the mouse wheel to double-click on the HDMI/VGA output screen, and the following message displays:

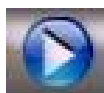
3.2.4 Quick Setting Toolbar in Live View Mode

On the screen of each channel, there is a quick setting toolbar which shows when you point the mouse at the bottom of the screen.

Instant Playback only shows the recording of the last five minutes. If no recording is found, it means there is no recording during the last five minutes.



Digital Zoom can zoom in to the selected area of the full screen. You can left-click and draw to select the area for zooming in, as shown below.

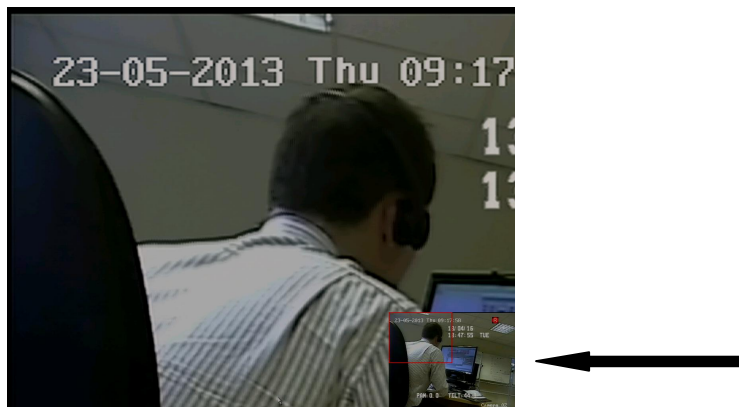


Figure 3.2.4.2 Digital Zoom

 Image Settings icon can be selected to enter the Image Settings menu.

Four modes are selectable according to the real situation:

- **Standard:** for general lighting conditions (default).
- **Indoor:** the image is relatively smoother.
- **Dim Light:** the image is smoother than the other two modes.
- **Outdoor:** the image is relatively clearer and sharper. The degree of contrast and saturation is high.

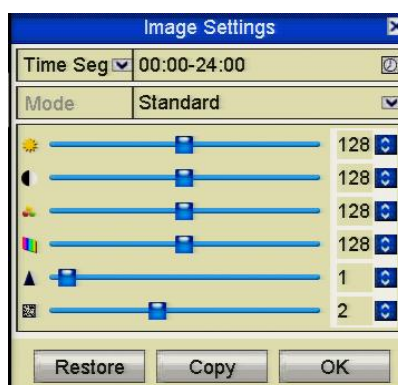


Figure 3.2.4.3 Image Settings

You can adjust the image parameters, including brightness, contrast, saturation, hue, sharpness and denoising. You can also click **Default** to restore the default settings and click **Copy** to copy the image settings to other analogue cameras.

Refer to the *Chapter 10.10 Configuring Video Parameters* for more details.

3.3 Channel-Zero Encoding

This chapter is applicable to MAX316 and MAX416 series only.

Purpose:

Sometimes due to low broadband resources you need to get a remote view of many channels in real time mode from a web browser or client software, in order to decrease the bandwidth requirement without affecting the image quality. The channel-zero encoding facility allows you to display all camera channels on a single channel display and by clicking on one of the imbedded channels, a full channel screen display for that channel is displayed.

Steps:

1. Enter the **Live View** Settings interface.
Menu> Setup> Live View
2. Select the **Channel-Zero Encoding** tab.

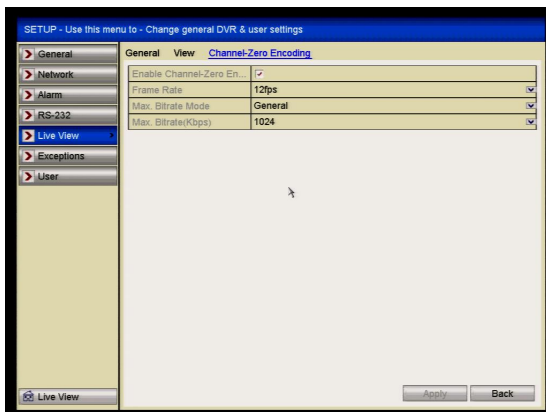


Figure 3.3.1 Live View- Channel-Zero Encoding

3. Click the checkbox after **Enable Channel-Zero Encoding**.
4. Configure the Frame Rate, Max. Bitrate Mode and Max. Bitrate.
5. Click the **Apply** button to activate the settings.

After you set the Channel-Zero encoding, you can get a view in CCTVWindow or web browser, 16 channels on a single channel. When clicking on the imbedded channel, a full screen display of the channel will be shown.

3.4 Adjusting Live View Settings

Purpose:

Live View settings can be customised according to different needs. You can configure the output interface, dwell time for screen to be shown, mute or turning on the audio, the screen number for each channel, etc.

Steps:

1. Enter the Live View Settings interface.

Menu> Setup> Live View

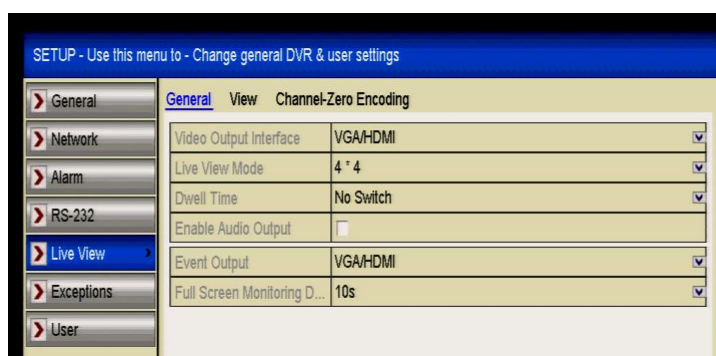


Figure 3.4.1 Live View-General

The settings available in this menu include:

- **Video Output Interface:** Designates the output to configure the settings for. The MEGA204, MEGA208 and MEGA216 provide HDMI/VGA outputs and MAX316 and MAX416 models provide HDMI/VGA and CVBS outputs for selection.
- **Live View Mode:** Designates the display mode to be used for Live View.
- **Dwell Time:** The time in seconds to *dwell* between switching of channels when enabling auto-switch in Live View.
- **Enable Audio Output:** Enables/disables audio output for the selected camera in the live view mode.
- **Event Output:** Designates the output to show event video; if available, you can select a different video output interface in the Video Output Interface when an event occurs.
- **Full Screen Monitoring Dwell Time:** The time in seconds to show alarm event screen.

2. Set the camera order.
 - 1) Select **View** tab.

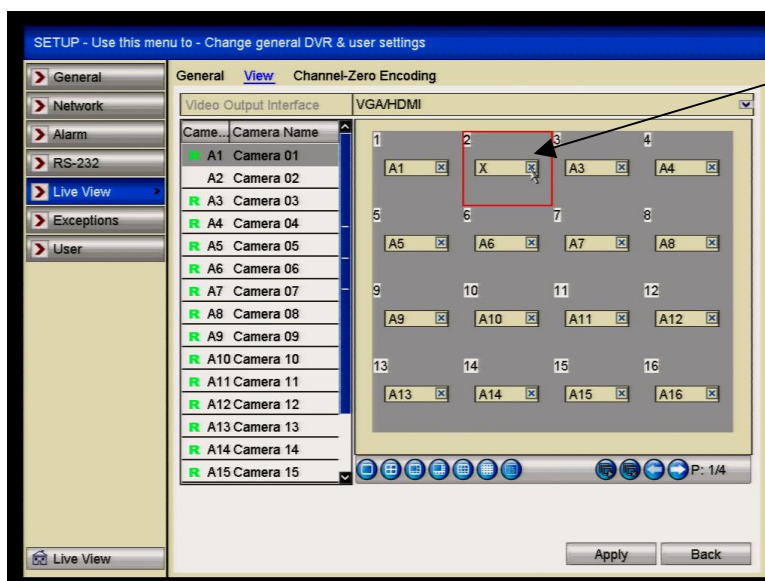






Figure 3.4.2 Live View- Camera Order

- 2) Click a window to select it, and then double-click a camera name in the camera list you would like to display. Setting an 'X' means the window will not display any camera.

- 3) You can also click  to start live view of all channels in order and click  to stop live view of all channels. Click  or  to go to the previous or next page.

- 4) Click the **Apply** button.

3.5 Manual Video Quality Diagnostics

Purpose:

The video quality of the analogue channels can be diagnosed manually and you can view the diagnostic results from a list.

Steps:

1. Enter the Manual Video Quality Diagnostics interface.
Menu> Instant>Manual Video> Manual Video Quality Diagnostics

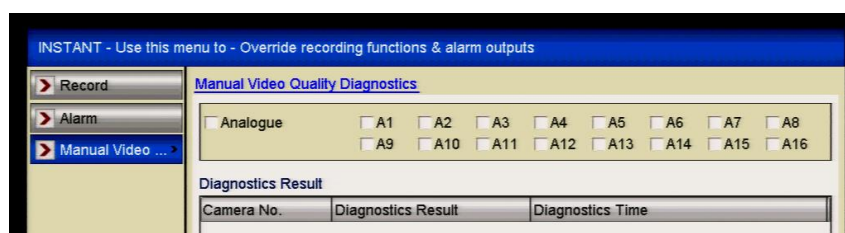


Figure 3.5.1 Video Quality Diagnostics

2. Check the checkboxes to select the channels for diagnostics.
3. Click the button **Diagnose**, and the results will be displayed on a list. You can view the video status and diagnostics time of the selected channels.

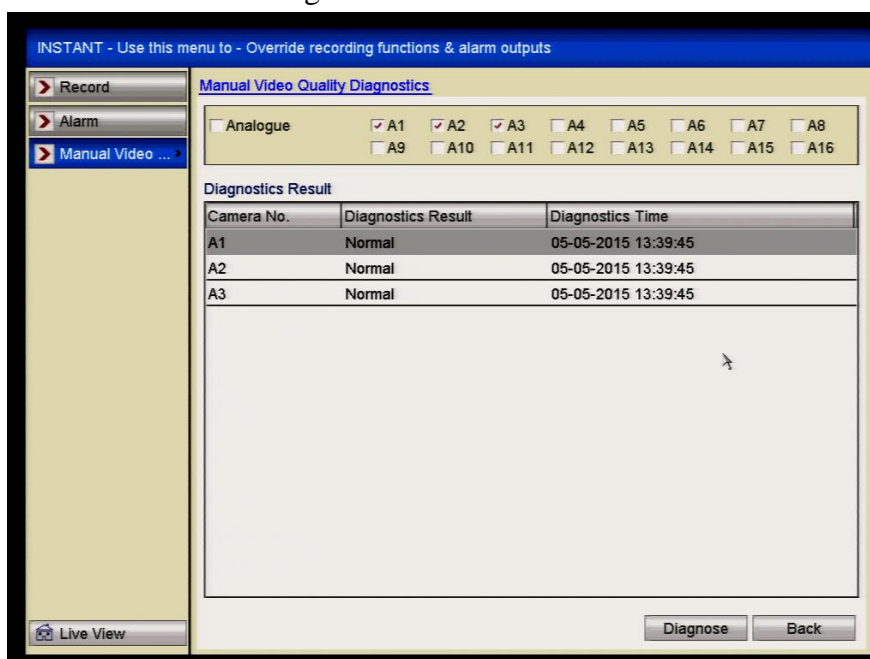


Figure 3.5.2 Diagnostics Result

- Three exception types can be diagnosed: Blurred Image, Abnormal Brightness and Colour Cast.

3.6 User Logout

Purpose:

After logging out, the monitor returns to the live view mode and if you want to do some operations, you need to enter user name and password to log in again.

Steps:

1. Enter the Shutdown menu.

4.1 Configuring PTZ Settings

Purpose:

Follow the procedure to set the parameters for PTZ. The configuring of the PTZ parameters must be done for you control the PTZ camera.

Steps:

1. Enter the PTZ Settings interface.
Menu >Video> PTZ

2. Choose the camera for PTZ settings in the **Camera** dropdown list.
3. Click the **PTZ Settings** button to set the RS-485 parameters.

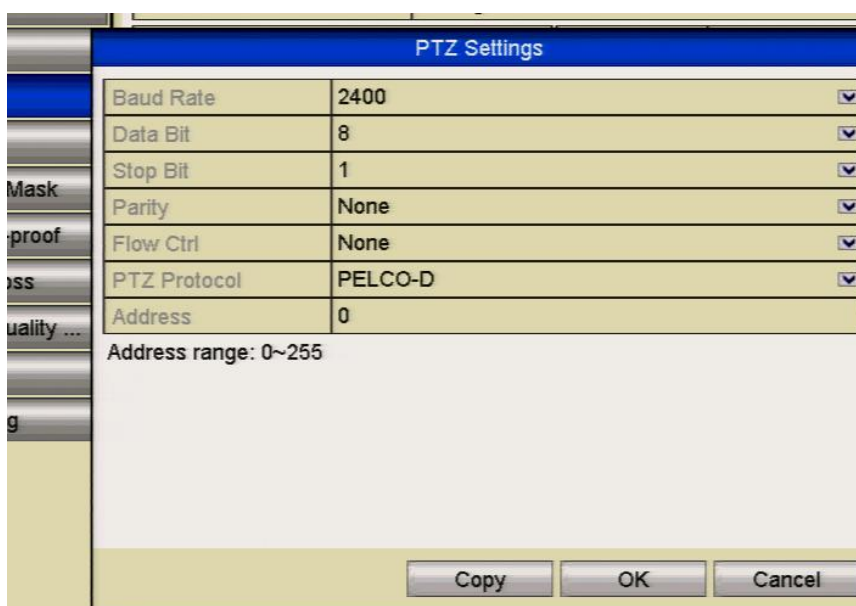


Figure 4.1.3 PTZ- General

4. Enter the parameters of the PTZ camera.
All the parameters should be exactly the same as the PTZ camera parameters.
5. Click **Apply** button to save the settings.

4.2 Setting PTZ Presets, Patrols & Patterns

Before you start:

Please make sure that the presets, patrols or patterns are supported by PTZ equipment used.

4.2.1 Customising Presets

Purpose:

Follow the steps to set the Preset location which you want the PTZ camera to point to when an event takes place.

Steps:

1. Enter the PTZ Control interface.
Menu>Video>PTZ

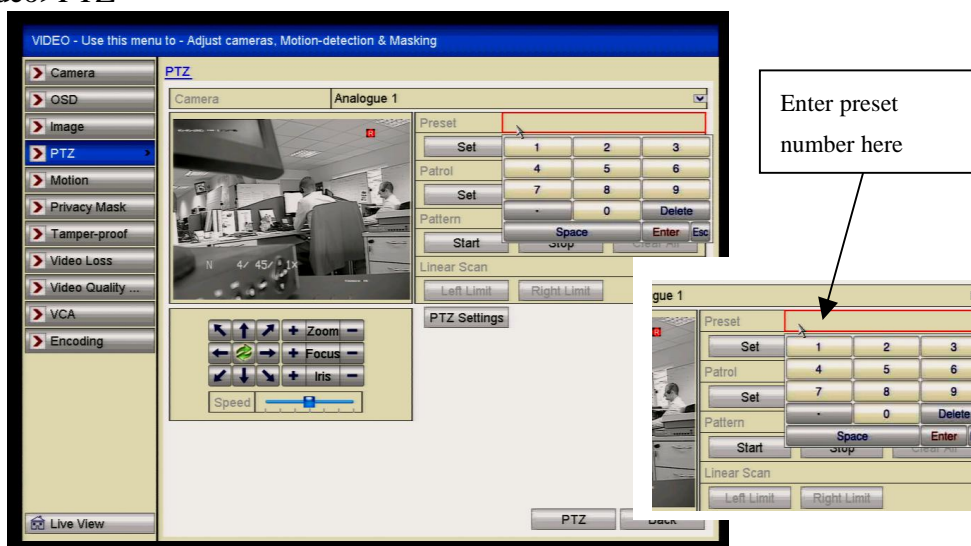


Figure 4.2.1.1. PTZ Settings


2. Use the direction buttons to move the camera to the location where you want to set a preset. Note that the zoom and focus operations can be recorded in the preset as well.
3. Enter the preset No. (1~255) in the preset text field, and click the **Set** button to link the location to the preset.
Repeat the steps 2-3 to save more presets.
You can click the **Clear** button to clear the location information of the preset, or click the **Clear All** button to clear the location information of all the presets.

4.2.2 Calling Presets

Purpose:

This feature enables the camera to move to a specified preset.

Steps:

1. Click the button **PTZ** in the lower-right corner of the PTZ setting interface; or press the PTZ button on the front panel or click the PTZ Control icon in the quick setting bar, or select the PTZ option in the right-click menu to show the PTZ control panel.
2. Choose **Camera** in the dropdown list.
3. Click the  button to show the **General** settings in the PTZ control.
4. Click to enter the preset No. in the corresponding text field.
5. Click the **Call Preset** button to call it.

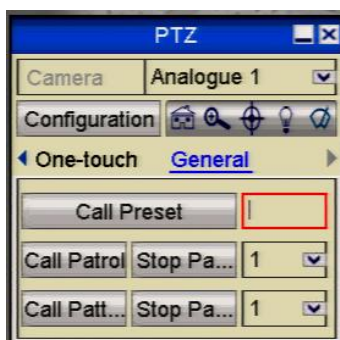


Figure 4.2.2.5. PTZ Panel - General

4.2.3 Customising Patrols

General:

The DVR uses a standardised method of controlling Tours/Patrols. These may not always work with every PTZ. Most PTZs use allocated preset numbers to trigger tours/patrols so these will normally work, providing the presets are within the range that the DVR can control.

Purpose:

Tours/Patrols can be set to move the PTZ to different key points and have it stay there for a set duration before moving on to the next key point. The key points correspond to the presets. The presets can be set following the steps above in **Customising Presets**.

Steps:

1. Enter the PTZ Control interface.
Menu>Video>PTZ

2. Select patrol No. in the drop-down list of patrol.
3. Click the **Set** button to add key points for the patrol.

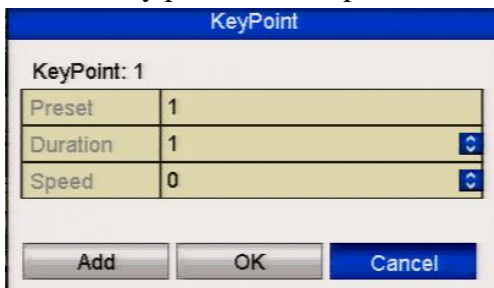


Figure 4.2.3.3 Key point Configuration

4. Configure key point parameters, such as the key point No., duration of staying at key point (dwell time) and speed of patrol. The key point corresponds to the preset. The **Key Point No.** determines the order at which the PTZ will follow while cycling through the patrol. The **Duration** refers to the dwell time it stays at the corresponding key point. The **Speed** defines the speed at which the PTZ will move from one key point to the next.
5. Click the **Add** button to add the next key point to the patrol, or you can click the **OK** button to save the key point to the patrol.
 You can delete all the key points by clicking the **Clear** button for the selected tour/patrol, or click the **Clear All** button to delete all the key points for all tours/patrols.

4.2.4 Calling Patrols


General:

The DVR uses a standardised method of controlling Tours/Patrols. These may not always work with every PTZ. Most PTZs use allocated preset numbers to trigger tours/patrols so these will normally work, providing the presets are within the range that the DVR can control.

Purpose:

Calling a patrol makes the PTZ initiate the predefined patrol number.

Steps:

1. Click the button **PTZ** in the lower-right corner of the PTZ setting interface; or press the PTZ button on the front panel or click the PTZ Control icon in the quick setting bar, or select the PTZ option in the right-click menu to show the PTZ control panel.
2. Click the  button to show the general settings of the PTZ control.

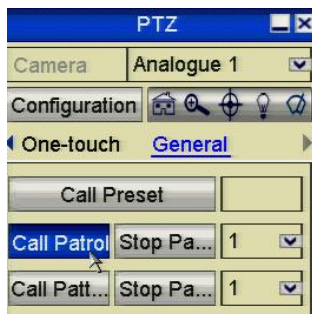


Figure 4.2.4.2 PTZ Panel - General

3. Select a patrol in the dropdown list and click the **Call Patrol** button to call it.
4. You can click the **Stop Patrol** button to stop calling it. Note that most PTZ cameras trigger tours using a defined CALL PRESET number and may not work using this utility option.

4.2.5 Customising Patterns

General:

Patterns can only be recorded if the PTZ being used has the capability of running patterns.

Purpose:

Patterns can be set by recording the movement of the PTZ. You can call the pattern to make the PTZ movement according to the predefined path.

Steps:

1. Enter the PTZ Control interface - Menu > Video > PTZ

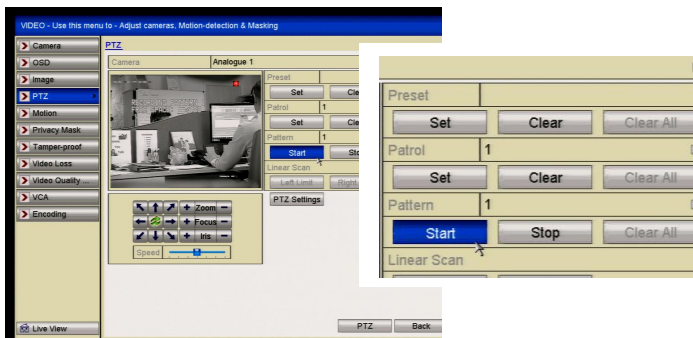


Figure 4.2.5.1 PTZ Settings


2. Choose pattern number from the dropdown list.
3. Click the **Start** button and click corresponding buttons in the control panel to move the PTZ camera. The movement of the PTZ is then recorded as the pattern.
4. Click the **Stop** button to stop the PTZ.

4.2.6 Calling Patterns

Purpose:

Running the pattern.

Steps:

1. Click the button **PTZ** in the lower-right corner of the PTZ setting interface; or press the PTZ button on the front panel or click the PTZ Control icon in the quick setting bar, or select the PTZ option in the right-click menu to show the PTZ control panel.
2. Click the  button to show the general settings of the PTZ control.

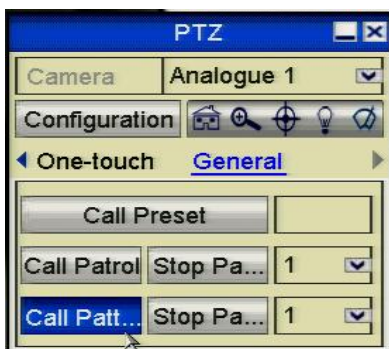


Figure 4.2.6.1 PTZ Panel - Pattern

3. Click the **Call Pattern** button to call it.
4. Click the **Stop Pattern** button to stop it.

4.2.7 Customising Auto Scans

Purpose:

The Auto Scan can be enabled to trigger the PTZ to scan between two horizontal positions.

This function is not supported by certain models.

Steps:

1. Enter the PTZ Control interface.
Menu > Video > PTZ

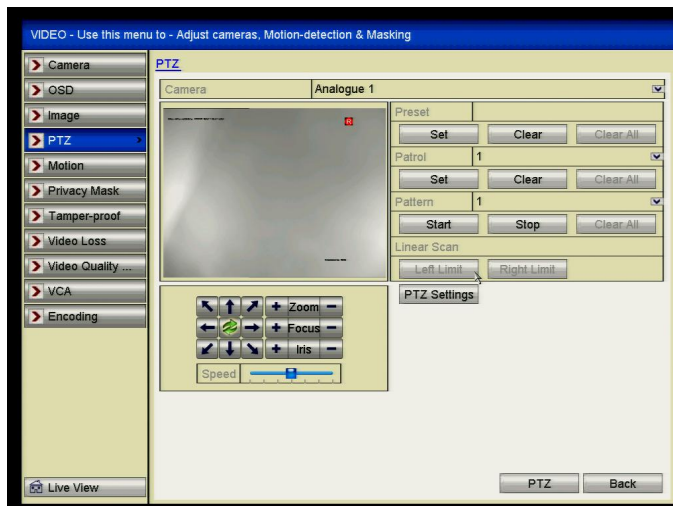


Figure 4.2.7.1 PTZ Settings

2. Use the directional button to move the PTZ camera to the location where you want to start the Auto Scan and click the **Left Limit** button then move to where the Auto Scan stops and press the **Right Limit** button.
The PTZ starts the Auto Scan from the left limit to the right limit. The distance should be no more than 180°.

4.2.8 Calling Auto Scans

Purpose:

Follow the procedure to call the Auto Scan.

Steps:


1. Click the button **PTZ** in the lower-right corner of the PTZ setting interface; or press the PTZ button on the front panel or click the PTZ Control icon in the quick setting bar to enter the PTZ setting menu in live view mode.
2. Click the  button to show the one-touch function of the PTZ control.

3. Click **Linear Scan (Auto Scan)** button to start the Auto Scan and click again to stop it.
You can click the **Restore** button to clear the defined left limit and right limit points and the reboot the PTZ to make settings take effect.

4.2.9 One-touch Park

Purpose:

Some PTZ cameras have a predefined park action option that allows the PTZ to resume a (scan, preset, patrol etc.) automatically after a period of inactivity (park time).

Steps:


1. Click the button **PTZ** in the lower-right corner of the PTZ setting interface; or press the PTZ button on the front panel or click the PTZ Control icon in the quick setting bar to enter the PTZ setting menu in live view mode.
2. Click the  button to show the one-touch function of the PTZ control.

3. There are 3 one-touch park types selectable, click the corresponding button to activate the park action.

Park (Quick Patrol): The dome starts patrol from the predefined preset 1 to preset 32 in order after the park time. Any undefined preset will be skipped.

Park (Patrol 1): The dome starts moving according to the predefined patrol 1 settings after the park time.

Park (Preset 1): The dome moves to the predefined preset 1 location after the park time expires.

Note that the park time can only be set through the speed dome configuration interface, by default the value is 5s.

4. Click the button again to inactivate it.

4.3 PTZ Control Panel

To enter the PTZ control panel, there are two ways supported.

OPTION 1:

In the PTZ settings interface, click the **PTZ** button on the lower-right corner which is next to the Back button.

OPTION 2:

In the Live View mode, you can press the PTZ Control button on the front panel or on the remote control, or choose the PTZ Control icon, or select the PTZ option in the right-click menu.

Click the **Configuration** button on the control panel, and you can enter the PTZ Settings interface.

In PTZ control mode, the PTZ panel will be displayed when a mouse is connected with the device. If no mouse is connected, the PTZ icon appears in the lower-left corner of the window, indicating that this camera is in PTZ control mode.

Chapter 5 Recording Settings

5.1 Configuring Recording Parameters

Before you start:

1. Make sure that the HDD has already been installed. If not, please install an HDD and format it. (Menu>Drives>General) Tick box on HDD being formatted.

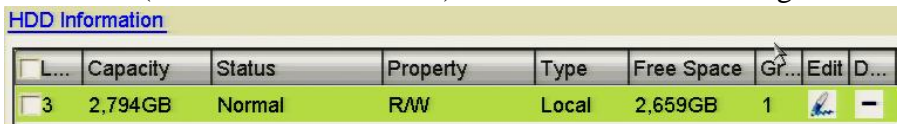


Figure 5.1.1 HDD- General

2. Click **Advance** to check the storage mode of the HDD.
 - 1) Whether the HDD mode is *Quota*, please set the maximum record capacity. For detailed information, see *Chapter 0. Configuring Quota Mode*.
 - 2) If the HDD mode is *Group*, you should set the HDD group. For detailed information, see *Chapter 5.9 Configuring HDD Group for Recording*.

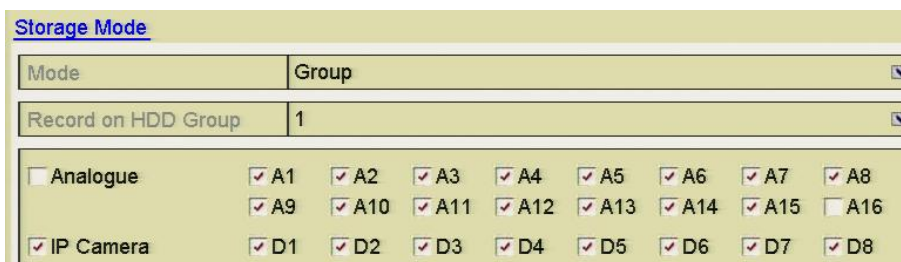


Figure 5.1.2 HDD- Advanced

Steps:

1. Enter the Encoding settings interface to configure the encoding parameters:
Menu>Video>Encoding

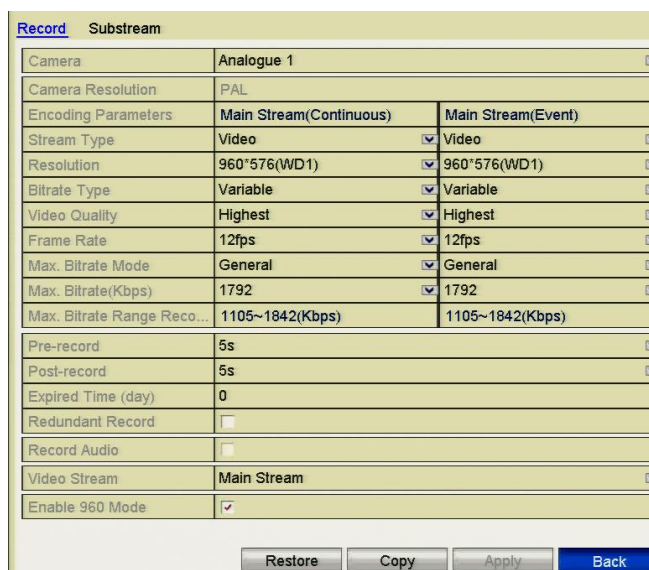


Figure 5.1.3 Encoding Parameters

2. Set the parameters for recording.

1) Select the **Record** tab to configure.

2) Select a camera number in the camera drop down list.

You can configure the stream type, the resolution, the video quality and other parameters on demand for Main Stream (Continuous) and Main Stream (Event) respectively.

The **Input Resolution** of camera connected will be displayed in the live view for 5 seconds when the camera is connected or when the DVR is powered on. The input resolution includes the resolution and frame rate of the camera, e.g. 1080P25.

3) You can also configure additional parameters, including pre-record, post-record time, expired time, redundant record (this option is only available when the HDD mode is *Group*) and whether you want to record audio.

- **Pre-record:** The time you set to record before the scheduled time or event. For example, if an alarm triggers the recording at 10:00, if you set the pre-record time at 5 seconds, the camera records it at 9:59:55.
- **Post-record:** The time you set to record after the event or scheduled time. For example, if an alarm triggers the recording which ends at 11:00, if you set the post-record time at 5 seconds, it records until 11:00:05.
- **Expired Time:** The expired time is the longest time for a recorded file to be kept on the HDD. If the deadline is reached, the file will be deleted. You can set the expired time to 0, and then the file will not be deleted. The actual keeping time for the file should be determined by the capacity of the HDD.
- **Redundant Record:** The redundant record is to decide whether you want the camera to save the recorded files on the redundant HDD. You must configure the redundant HDD in HDD settings. For detailed information, see *Chapter 5.8. Configuring Redundant Recording*.
- **Record Audio:** Check the Record Audio checkbox to record sound, otherwise record images without sound.
- **Video Stream:** Main stream and sub-stream are selectable for recording. When you select sub-stream, you can record for a longer time with the same storage space.
- **Enable 960 Mode:** The option is supported by analogue cameras. Enabling the 960 mode to enable the WD1 resolution for main stream, otherwise, the resolution supports up to 4CIF. This option is not supported using TVI cameras although the WD1 resolution is available all the time.

4) Click **Apply** to save the settings.

5) You can copy the settings to other channels by clicking **Copy** providing the settings are valid for use with other cameras.

You can only copy the same settings to other cameras of the same type e.g. if channels 1, 2 and 3 are connected to TVI cameras and channel 4 is connected to an analogue, the settings set for channel 1 can only be copied to channels 2 and 3.

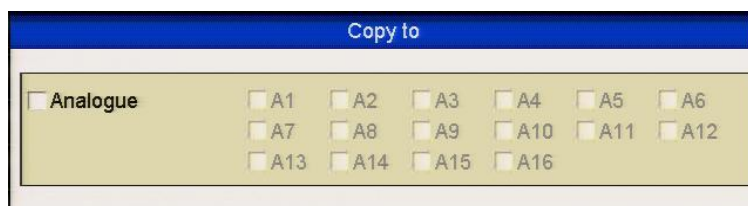


Figure 5.1.4 Copy Camera Settings

3. Set encoding parameters for sub-stream.

- 1) Select the **Substream** tab.

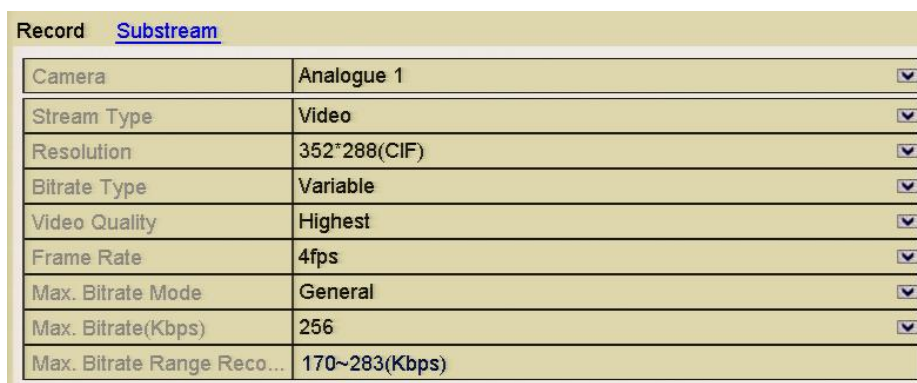


Figure 5.1.5 Sub-stream Encoding

- 2) Select a camera in the camera dropdown list.
- 3) Configure the parameters.
- 4) Click **Apply** to save the settings.
- 5) (Optional) If the parameters can also be used to other cameras, click **Copy** to copy the settings to other channels.

You can only copy the same settings to other cameras of the same type e.g. if channels 1, 2 and 3 are connected to TVI cameras and the channel 4 is connected to an analogue camera, the settings set for channel 1 can only be copied to channels 2 and 3.

5.2 Configuring Record Schedule

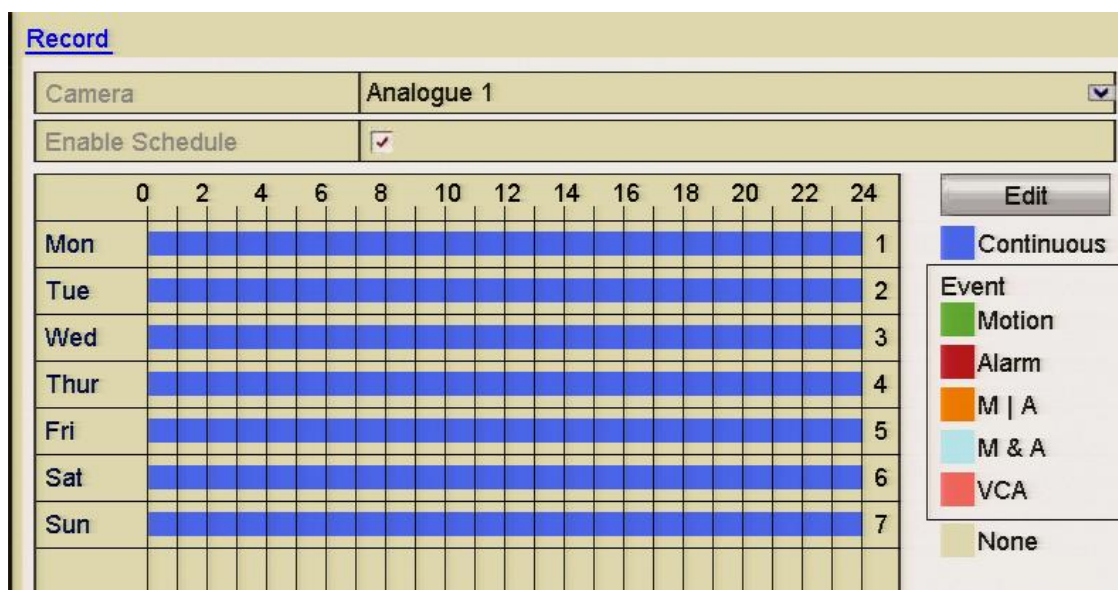
The MEGA204, MEGA208, MEG216, MAX316 and MAX416 support continuous, alarm, motion, motion | alarm, motion & alarm and VCA triggered recording types.

Purpose:

Set the record schedule so that the camera will automatically start/stop recording according to the configured schedule.

Steps:

1. Enter the Record Schedule interface.
Menu> Schedule> Schedule

3. Check the Enable Schedule box.
4. Configure the record schedule.

Edit the schedule

- 1) Click **Edit**.

- 3) To schedule an all-day continuous recording, check the checkbox after the **All Day** item.

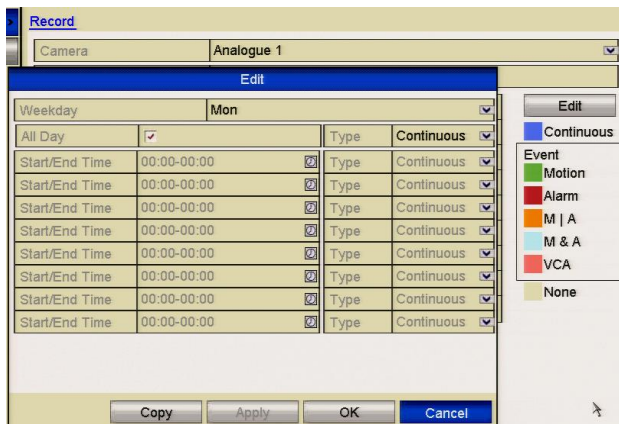


Figure 5.2.2 Edit Schedule- All Day

- 4) To arrange event schedules, leave the **All Day** checkbox blank and set the Start/End time.

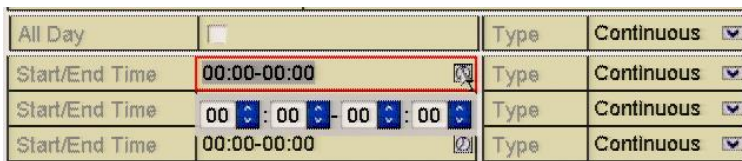


Figure 5.2.3 Edit Schedule- Set Time Period

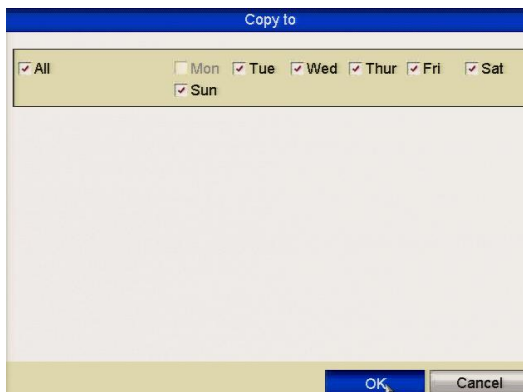


Figure 5.2.4 Copy Schedule for Other Days

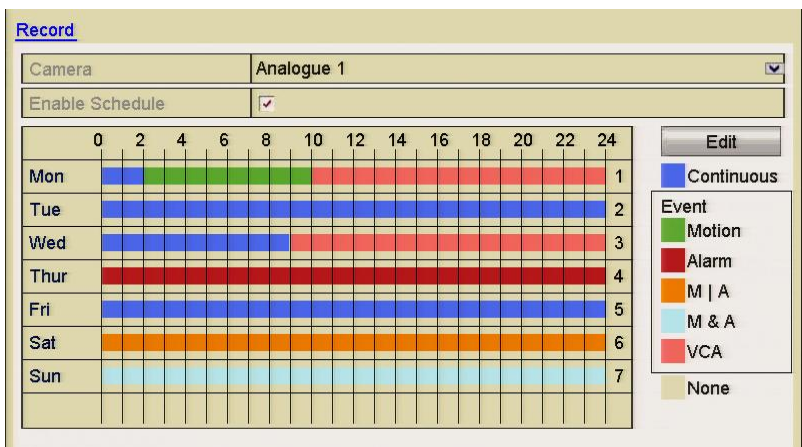


Figure 5.2.5 Draw the Schedule

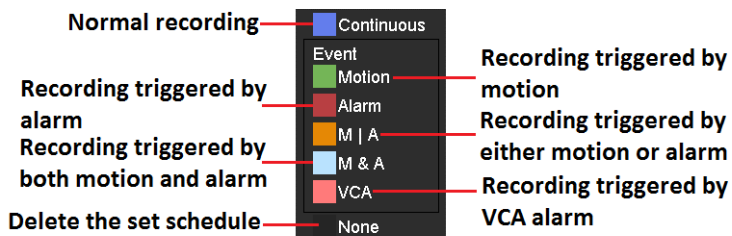


Figure 5.2.6 Descriptions of the Color Icons

5.3 Configuring Motion Detection

Purpose:

Follow the steps to set the motion detection parameters. In the live view mode, once a motion detection event takes place, the DVR can initiate a number of options. Enabling the motion detection function can trigger certain channels to start recording, trigger full screen monitoring, output an audio warning, notify a surveillance center and send emails etc.

Steps:

1. Enter the Motion Detection interface.
Menu>Video>Motion

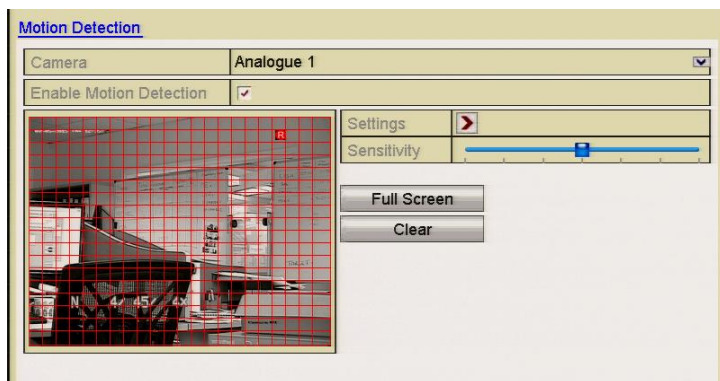


Figure 5.3.1 Motion Detection

2. Configure Motion Detection:

- 1) Choose the camera you want to configure.
- 2) Check the checkbox after **Enable Motion Detection**.

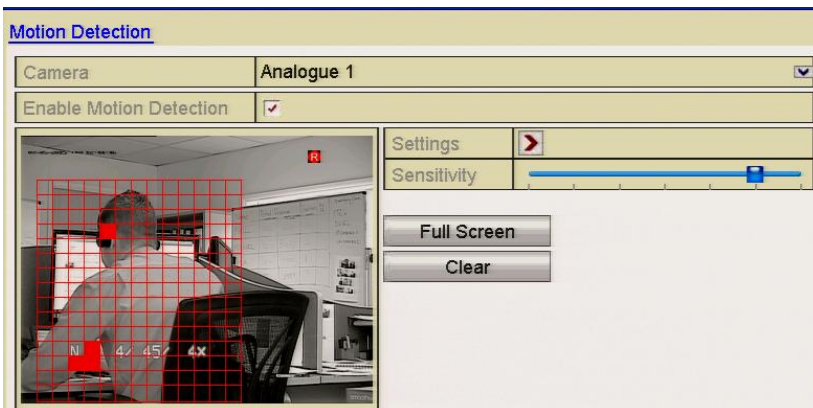


Figure 5.3.2 Motion Detection- Mask

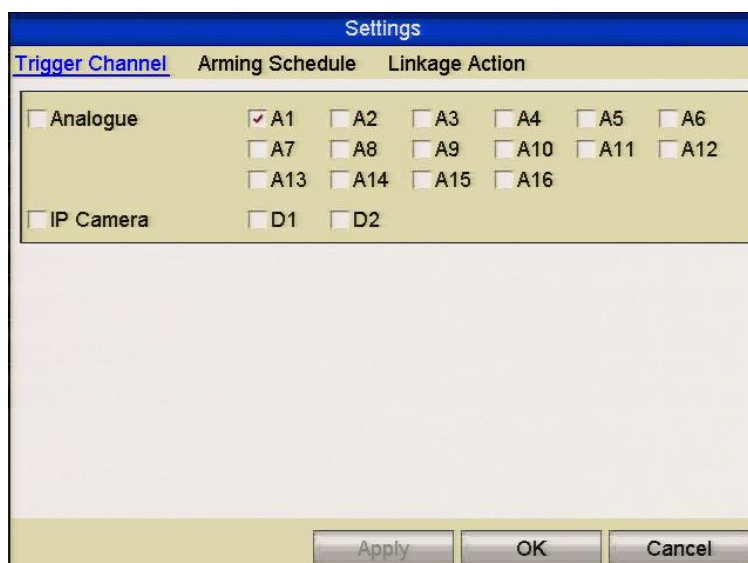


Figure 5.3.3 Motion Detection Settings

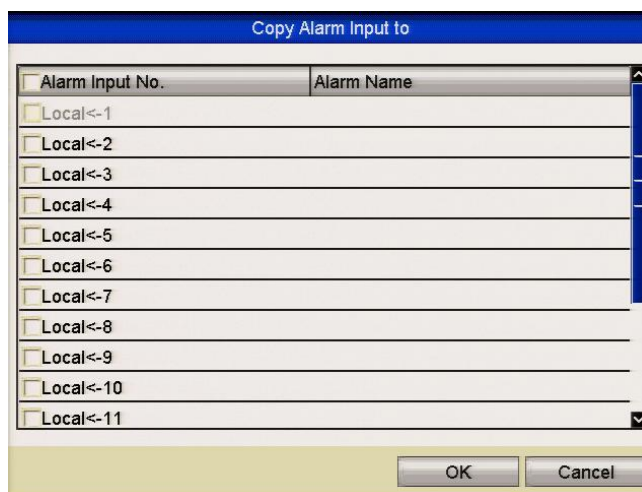


Figure 5.4.4 Copy Alarm Input

5.5 Configuring VCA (Video Content Analysis) Record

Purpose:

The DVR supports the VCA (line crossing detection and intrusion detection) triggered recording. The VCA settings and VCA event triggered recording is supported on 2 analogue cameras.

1. Enter the VCA settings interface and select a camera for the VCA settings.

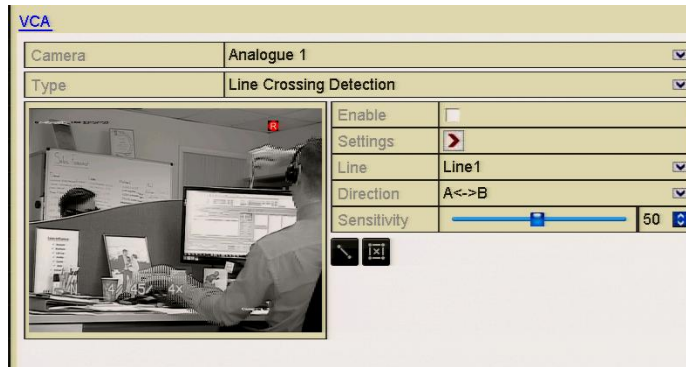


Figure 5.5.1 VCA Settings

2. Configure the detection rules for VCA events. For details, see *Chapter 8. Detecting VCA Alarm.*
3. Click the **Settings** icon to configure the alarm linkage actions for VCA events. Select **Trigger Channel** tab and select one or more channels which will start to record when VCA alarm is triggered. Click **Apply** to save the settings

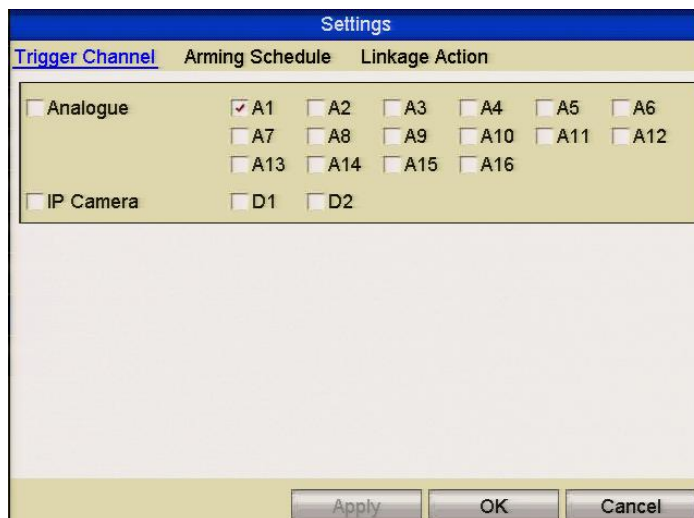


Figure 5.5.2 Set Trigger Camera of VCA Alarm

The PTZ Linking function is only available for the VCA settings of IP cameras.

4. Enter Record Schedule settings interface (Menu> Schedule> Schedule>Record and then set VCA as the record type. For details, see *Chapter 5. Configuring Record Schedule*.

5.6 Configuring Manual Record

Purpose:

Follow the steps to set parameters for the manual record. Using manual record, you are overriding the record schedule and using highest record settings. Therefore disk space will be used much quicker. This option is only used for emergency recording when the schedule is not running 24 x 7. When the DVR is rebooted the manual settings are cancelled.

Steps:

1. Enter the Manual settings interface.

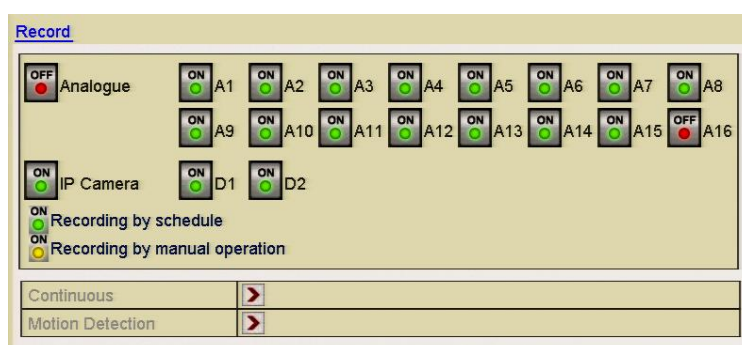


Figure 5.6.1 Manual Record

5.7 Configuring Holiday Record

Purpose:

The Holiday Record feature allows you to set on a date basis, a different recording schedule.

Steps:

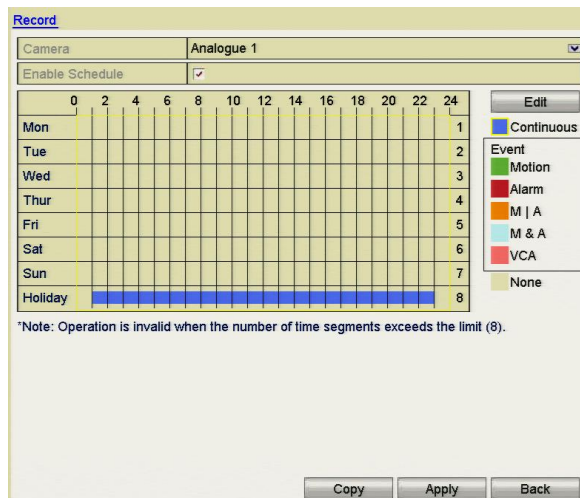


Figure 5.7.3 Edit Schedule- Holiday

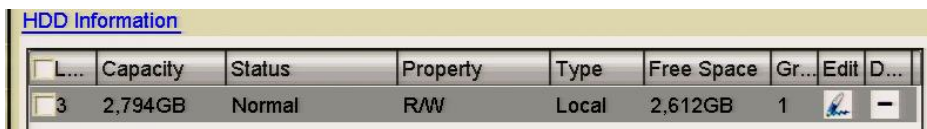


Figure 5.8.1 HDD General

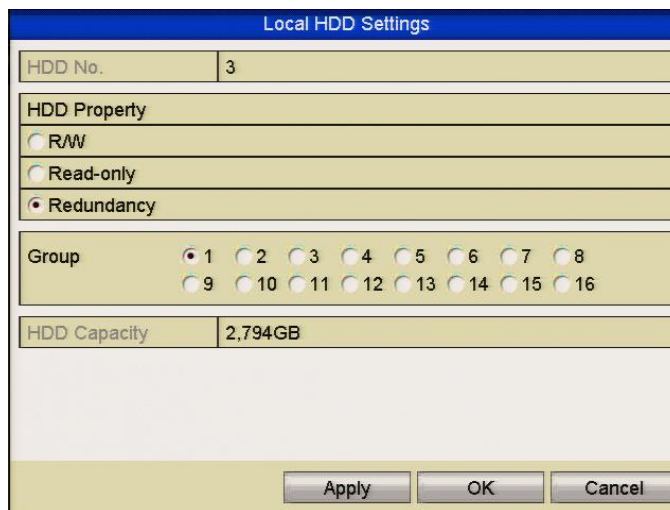


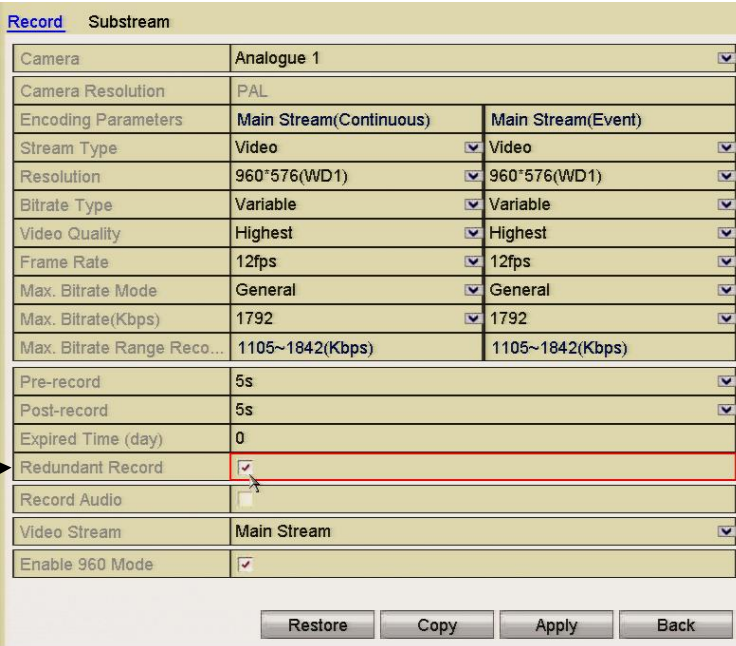
Figure 5.8.2 HDD General-Editing

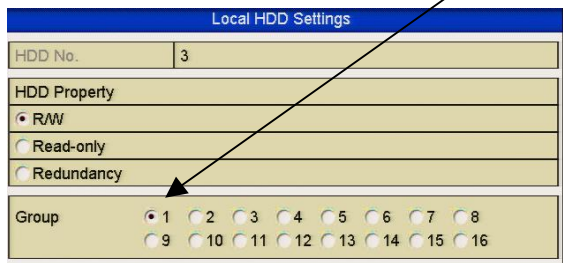

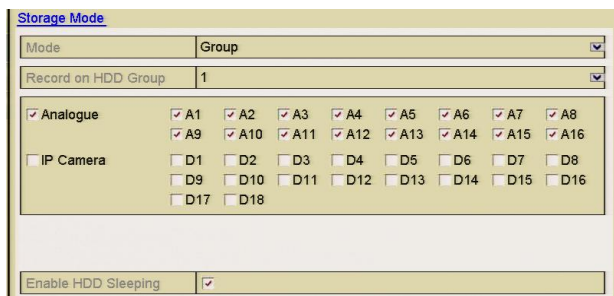


Figure 5.9.2. HDD Advanced

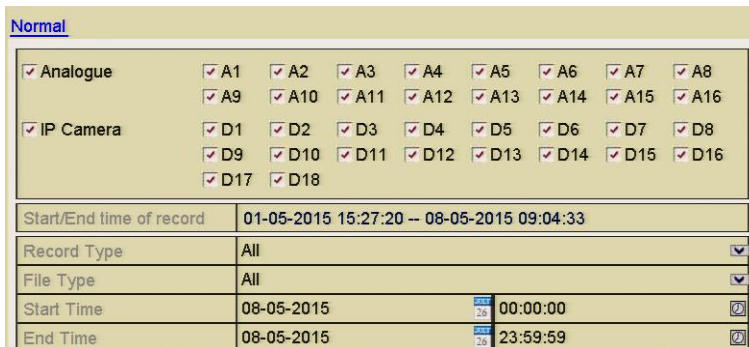


Figure 5.10.1 Backup

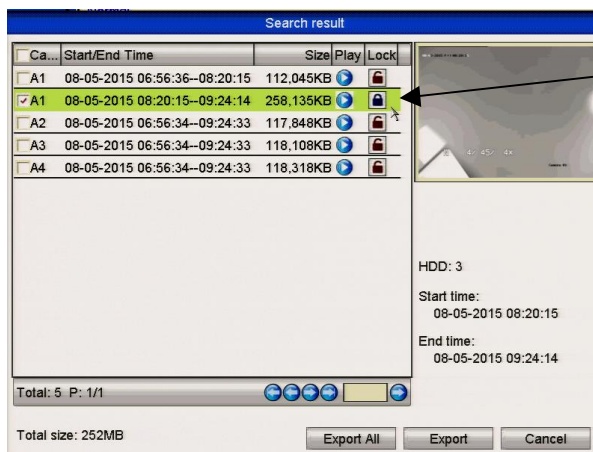




Figure 5.10.2 Export- Search Result

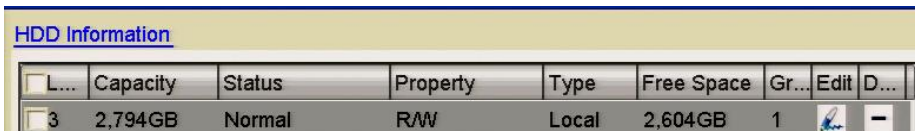


Figure 5.10.3 Drives General

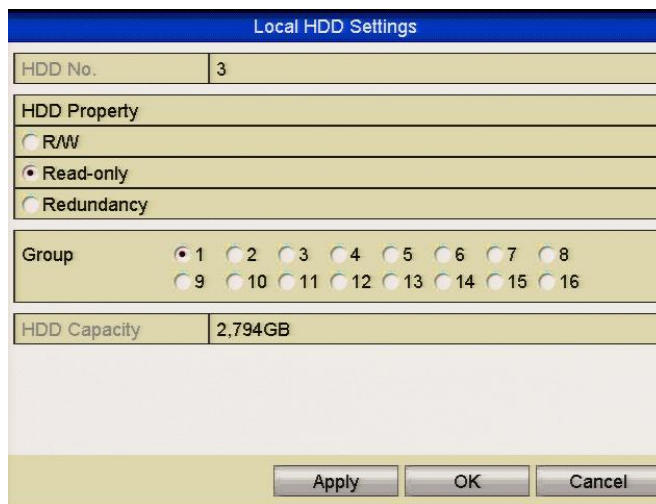


Figure 5.10.4 Drives General- Editing

- If you set the HDD to Read-only whilst the DVR is saving files, then the file will be saved in the next R/W HDD. If there is only one HDD available, the recording will be stopped.

Chapter 6 Playback

6.1 Playing Back Recorded Files

6.1.1 Playing Back by Channel

Purpose:

Play back the recorded video files of a specific channel in the live view mode.

Channel switch is supported.

● **OPTION 1**

Choose a channel in live view mode using the mouse and click the play button in the quick setting toolbar.

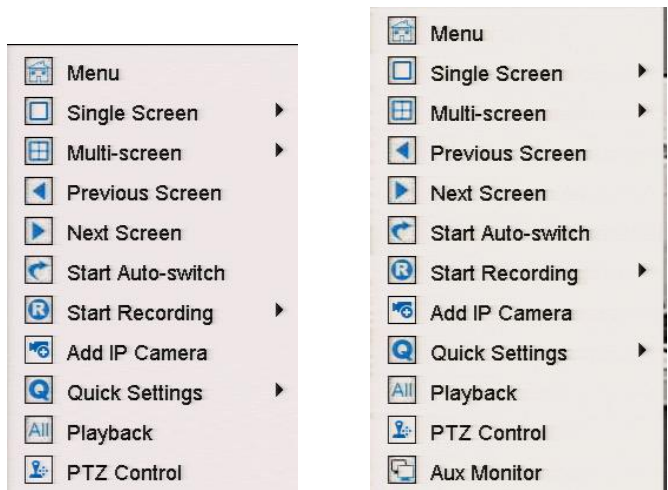


Figure 6.1.1.1 Instant Playback Interface

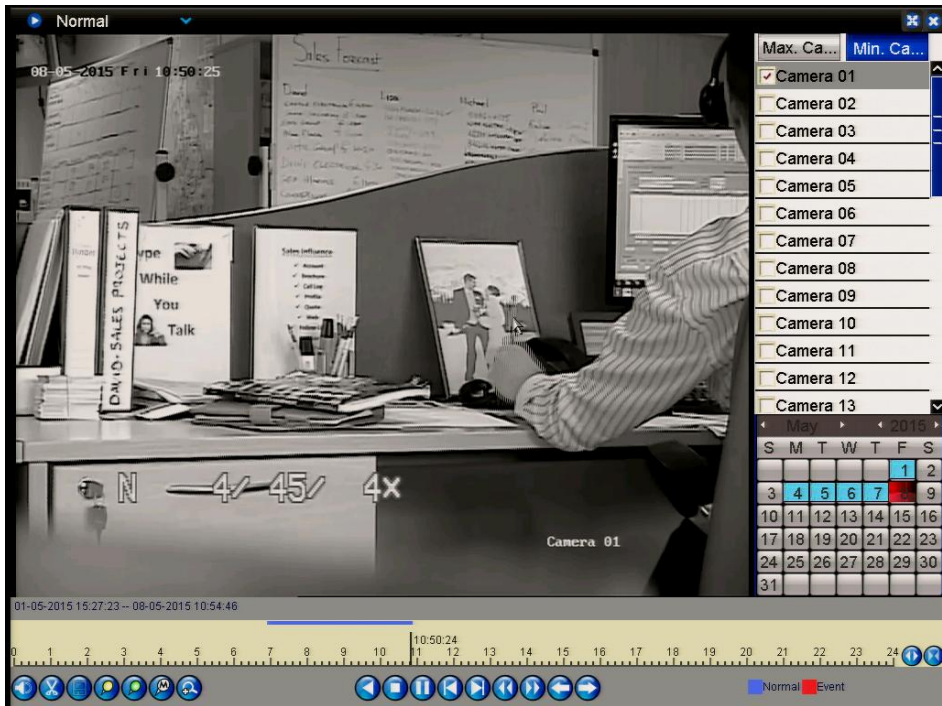


Figure 6.1.1.3 Playback Interface

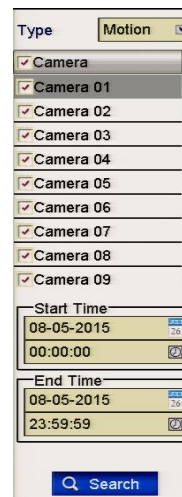
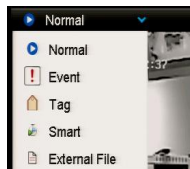


Figure 6.1.3.2 Playback Options

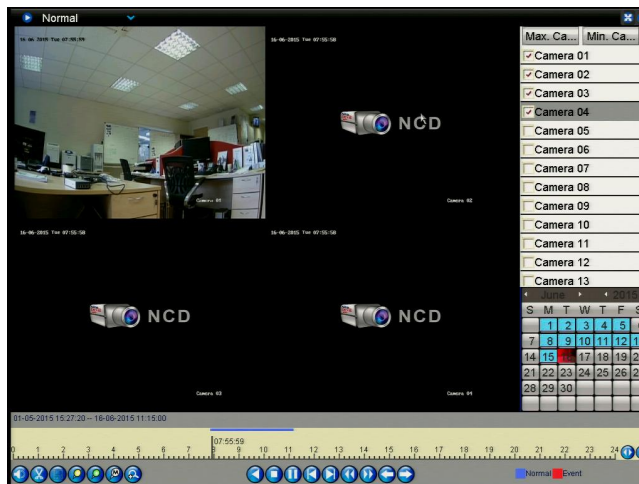


Figure 6.1.3.3 Select Channels for Synchronous Playback

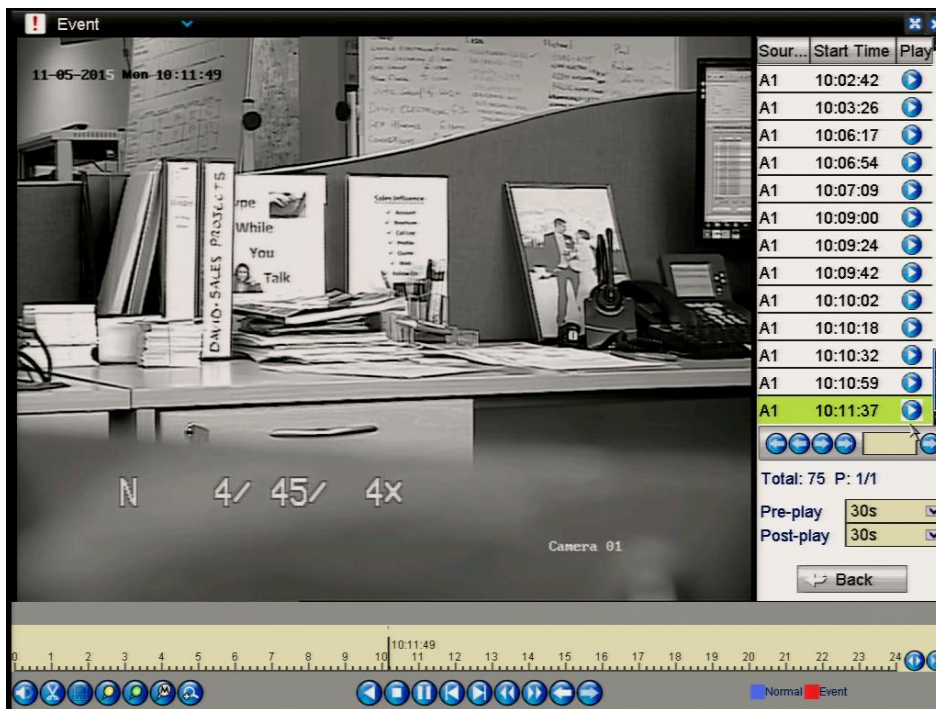


Figure 6.1.3.4 Interface for Playback by Event

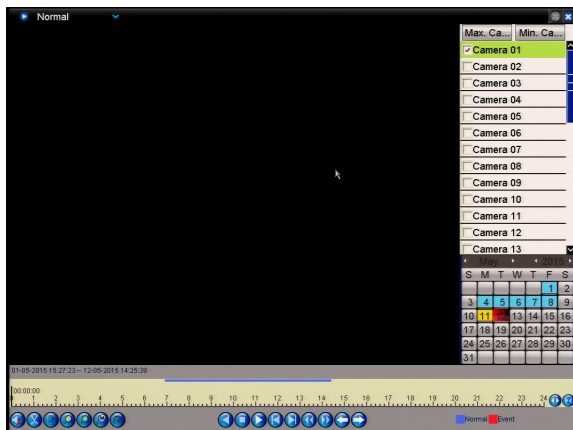


Figure 6.1.4.1 Normal Playback Interface

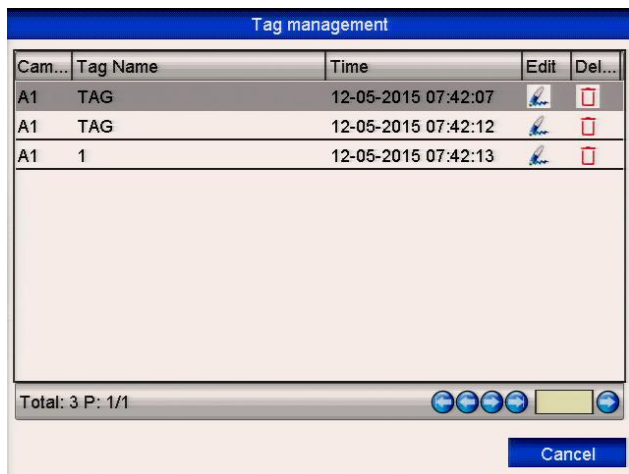
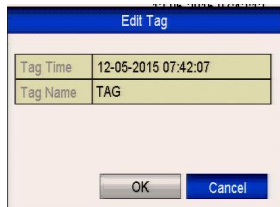


Figure 6.1.4.2 Tag Management Interface

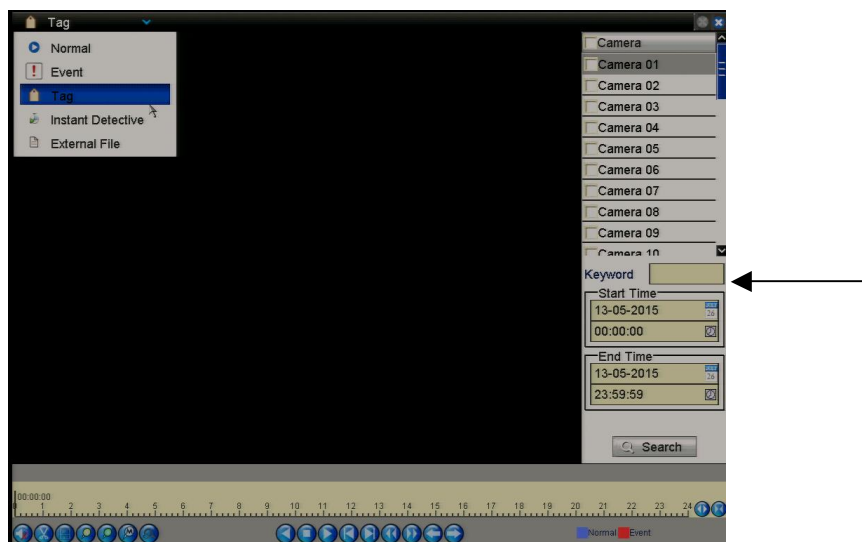



Figure 6.1.4.3 Video Search by Tag

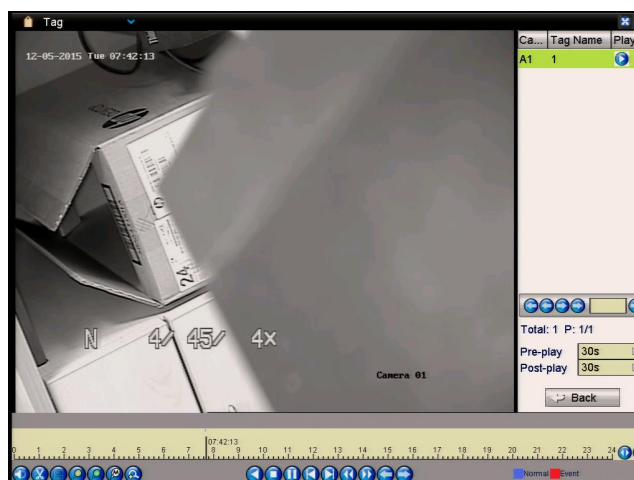


Figure 6.1.4.4 Playback by Tag Interface

The filtering rules for recorded files and playback speed for the non-related and related video, can be configured independently.

The playback by Instant Detective search is not supported for IP cameras.

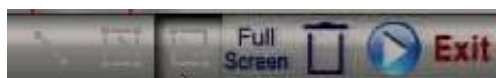
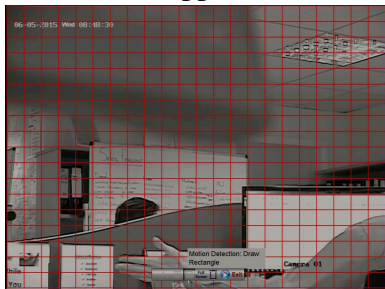









Figure 6.1.5.1 Draw Area for Smart Search

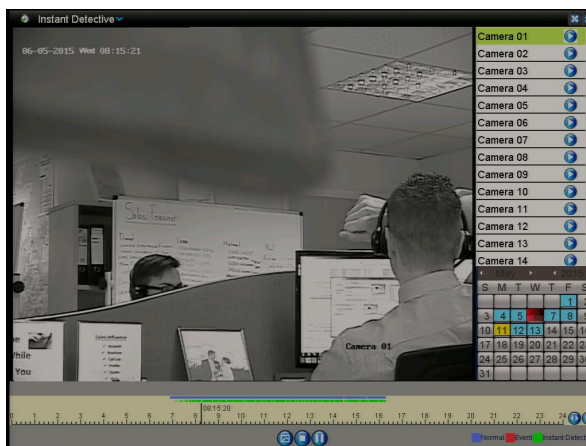








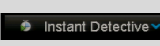


Figure 6.1.5.2 Smart Playback Interface

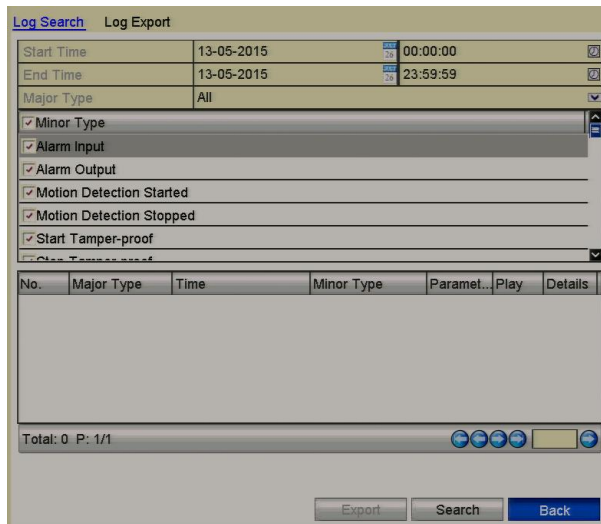


Figure 6.1.6.1 System Log Search Interface

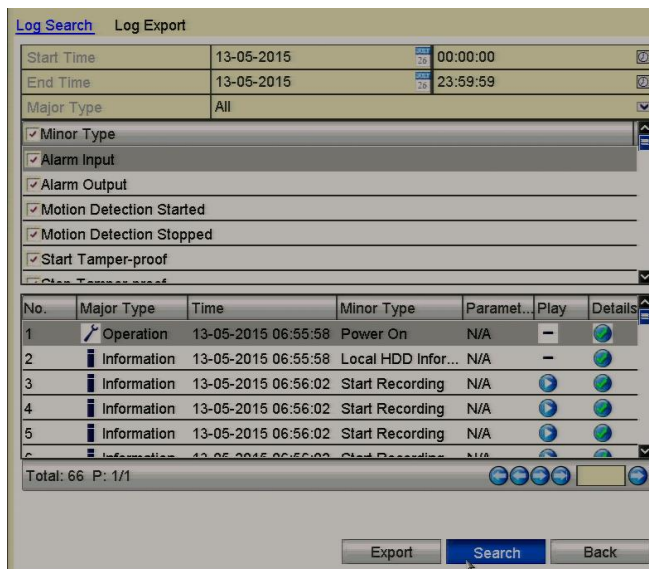



Figure 6.1.6.2 Result of System Log Search

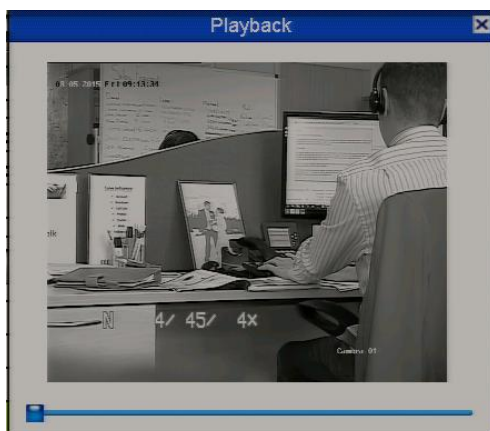




Figure 6.1.6.3 Interface of Playback by Log

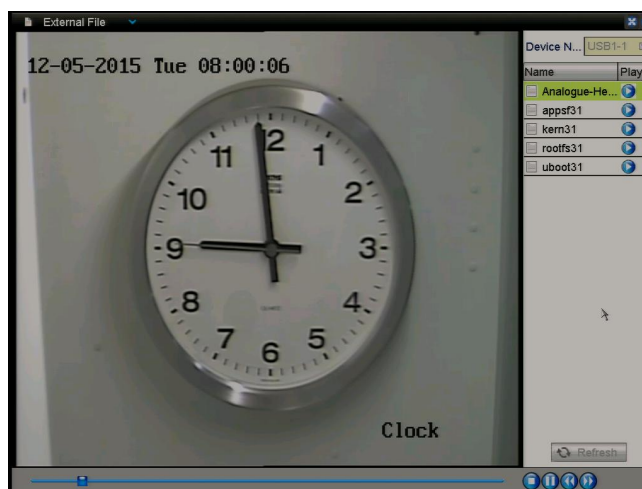


Figure 6.1.7.1 Interface of External File Playback

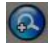

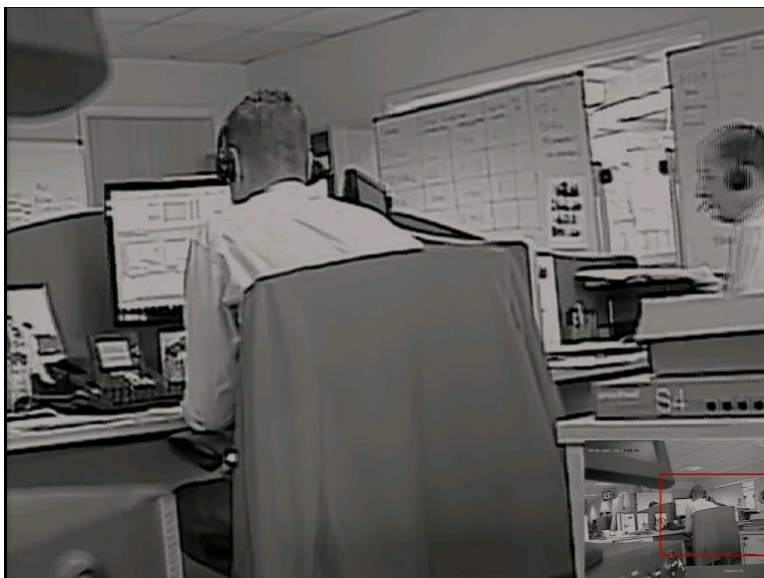


Figure 6.2.2.1 Draw Area for Digital Zoom

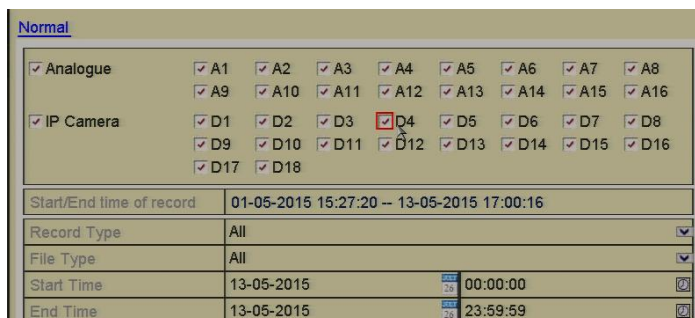


Figure 7.1.1.1 Normal Export Interface

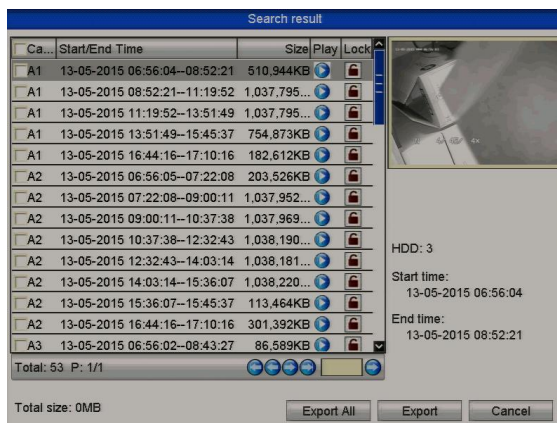



Figure 7.1.1.2 Result of Normal Video Search for Backup

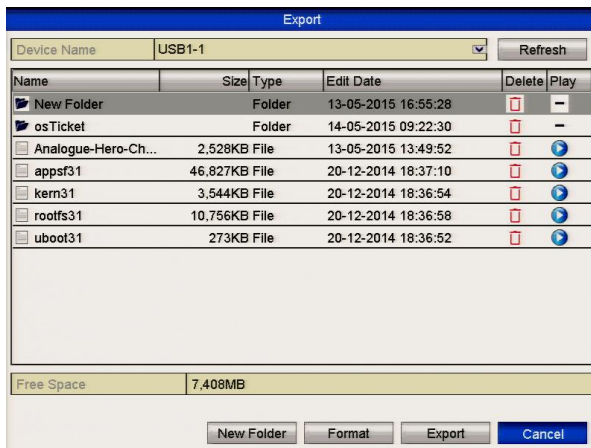


Figure 7.1.1.3 Export by Normal Video Search using USB Flash Drive

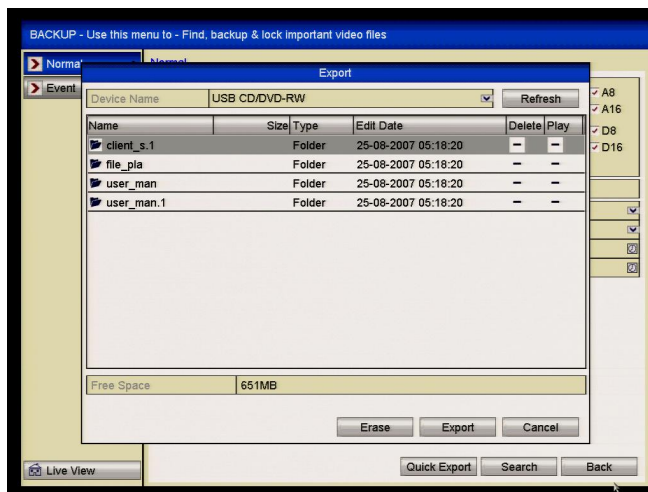


Figure 7.1.1.4 Export by Normal Video Search using USB Writer

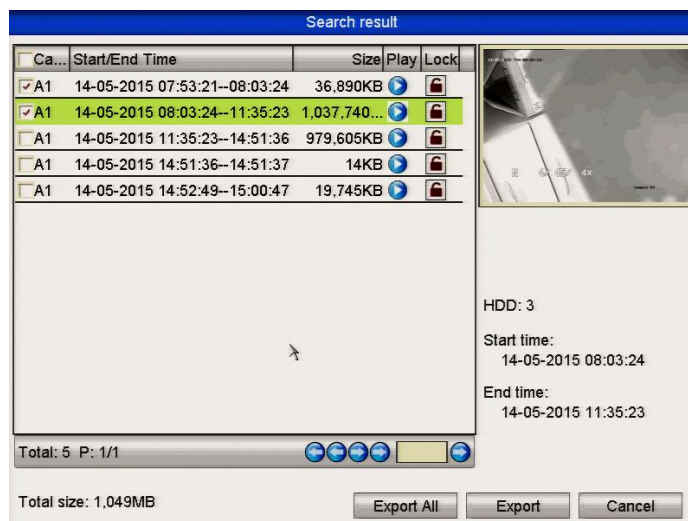


Figure 7.1.1.5 Result of Normal Video Search for Backup

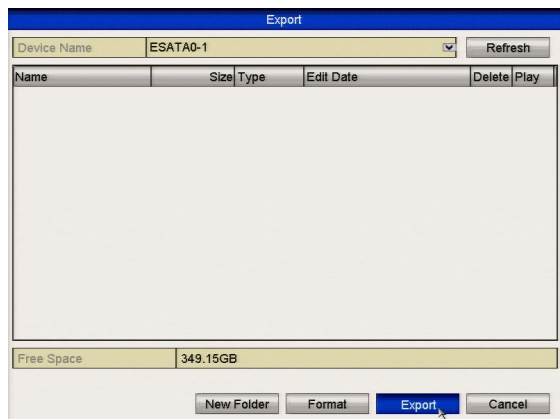



Figure 7.1.1.6 Export by Normal Video Search Using eSATA HDD

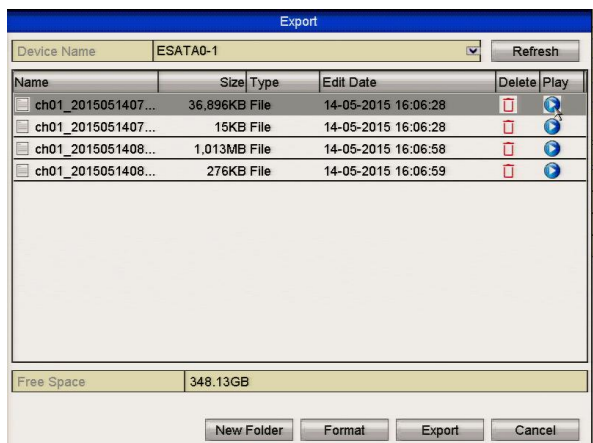


Figure 7.1.1.7 Checkup of Export Result Using eSATA HDD

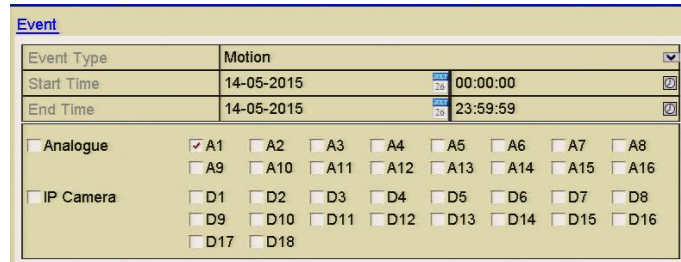


Figure 7.1.2.1 Event Search for Backup

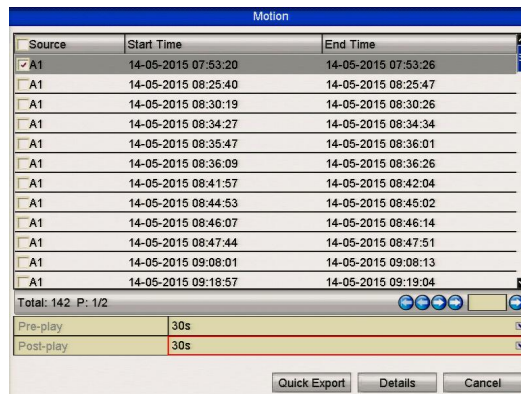


Figure 7.1.2.2. Result of Event Search

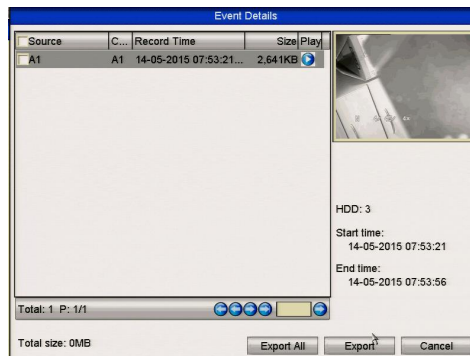


Figure 7.1.2.3 Event Details Interface

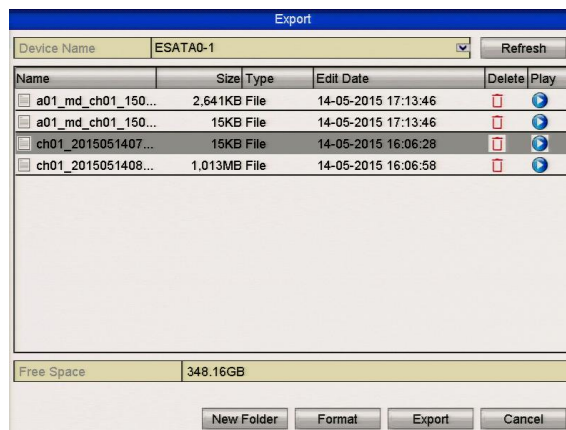


Figure 7.1.2.4 Export by Event Using USB Drive

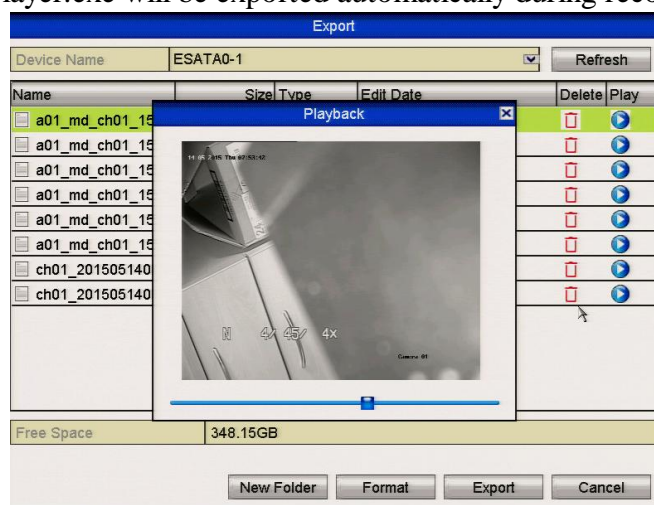


Figure 7.1.2.5 Checkup of Event Export Result using USB Drive

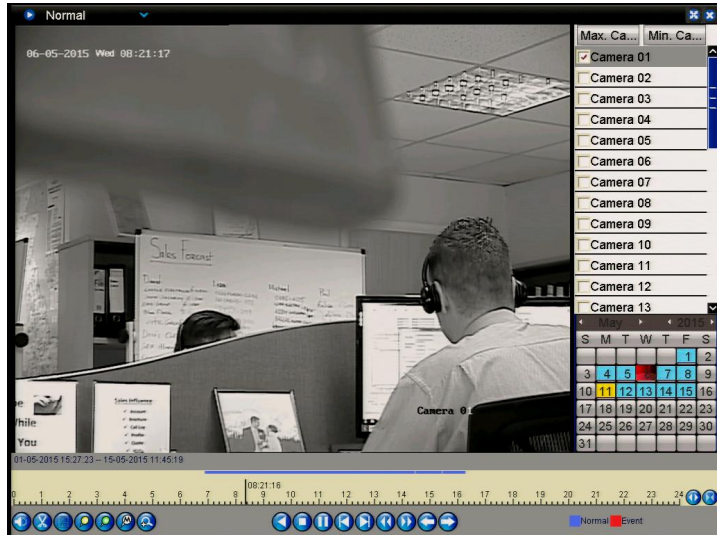





Figure 7.1.3.1 Interface of Playback

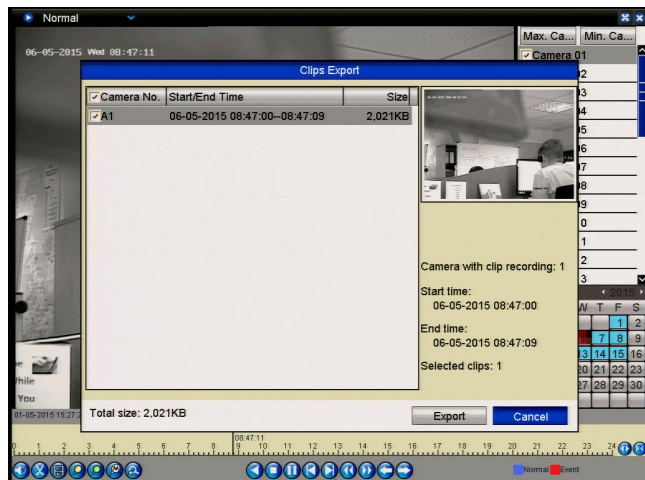


Figure 7.1.3.2 Clip Export

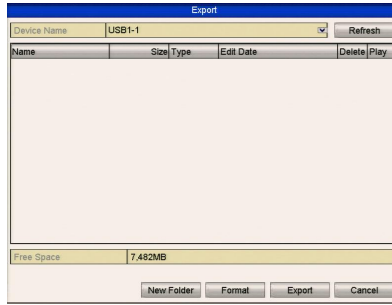
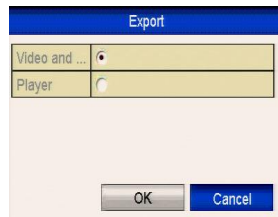
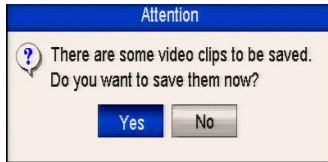


Figure 7.1.3.3 Export Video Clips Using USB Flash Drive

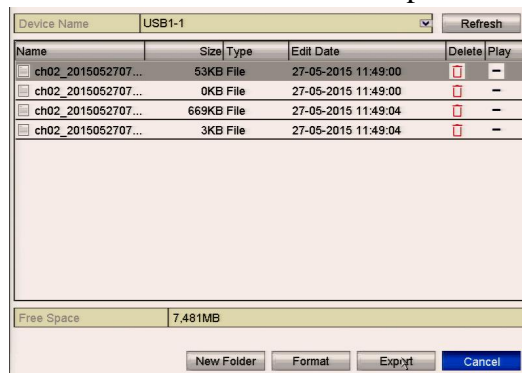


Figure 7.1.3.5 Checkup of Video Clips Export Result Using USB Flash Drive

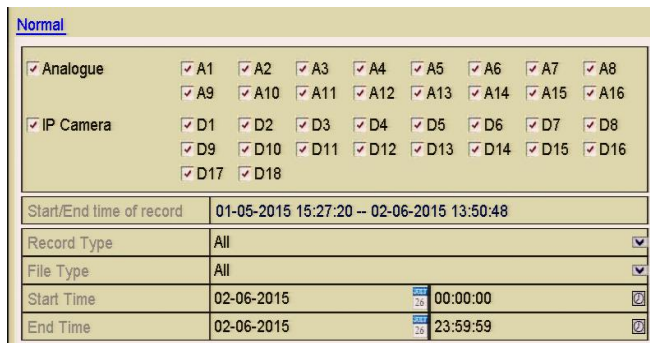


Figure 7.2.1 Normal Video Search for Backup

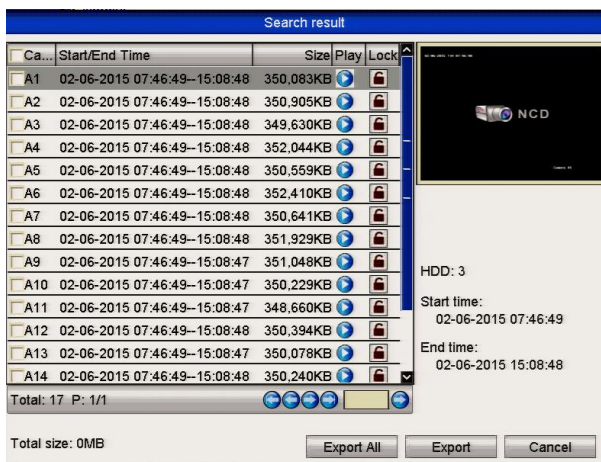


Figure 7.2.2 Backup Results for Normal Video Search

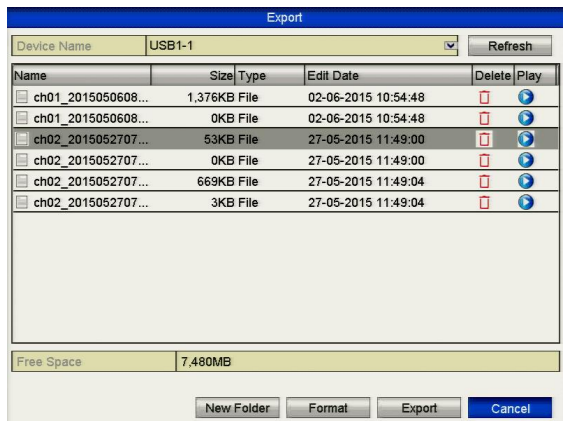




Figure 7.2.3 USB Flash Drive Management

Click **Format** button to format the backup device.

If the inserted USB device is not recognised:

Chapter 8 Alarm Settings

8.1 Setting Motion Detection Triggering

There are two stages in motion detection setup. Stage 1 for motion triggering is detailed below. Motion recording, Stage 2 is covered in the Schedule menu.

Steps:

1. Enter Motion Detection interface in Camera Management and choose a camera you want to set up for motion detection.

Menu> Video> Motion

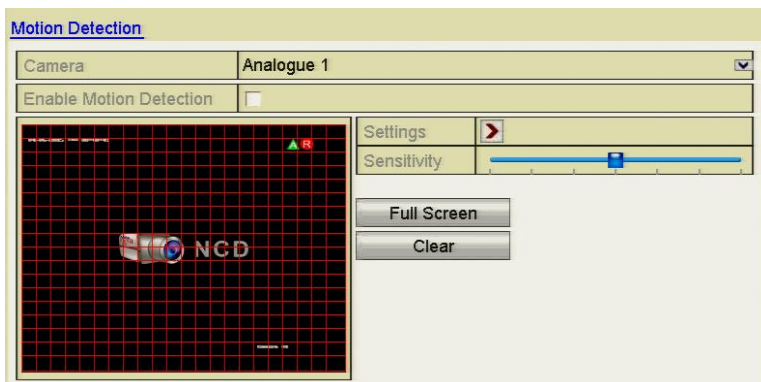


Figure 8.1.1 Motion Detection Setup Interface

2. Set detection area and sensitivity.

Click checkbox to enable motion detection and use the mouse to draw detection area(s) then drag the sensitivity bar to set sensitivity.

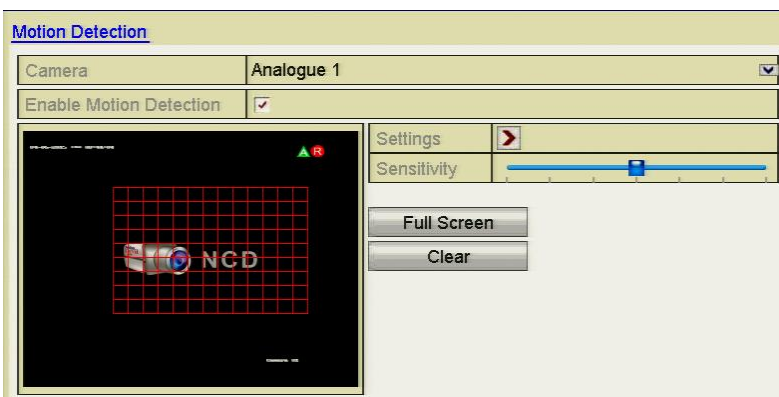



Figure 8.1.2 Set Detection Area and Sensitivity

3. Click Settings  to set alarm response actions.

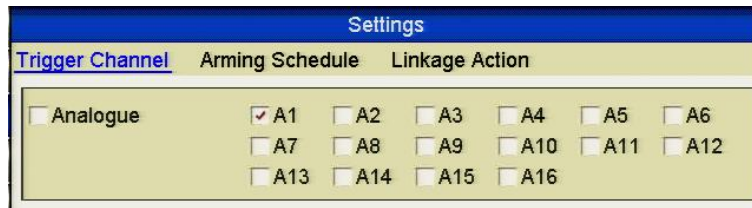


Figure 8.1.3 Set Trigger Camera of Motion Detection

Click **Trigger Channel** tab and select one or more channels which will start to record or become full-screen monitoring when motion alarm is triggered.

4. Set arming schedule of the channel.

Select **Arming Schedule** tab to set the channel's arming schedule.

Choose one day of a week and up to eight time periods can be set within each day.

You can click the **Copy** button to copy the time period settings to other day(s).

Time periods must not be duplicated or overlap.

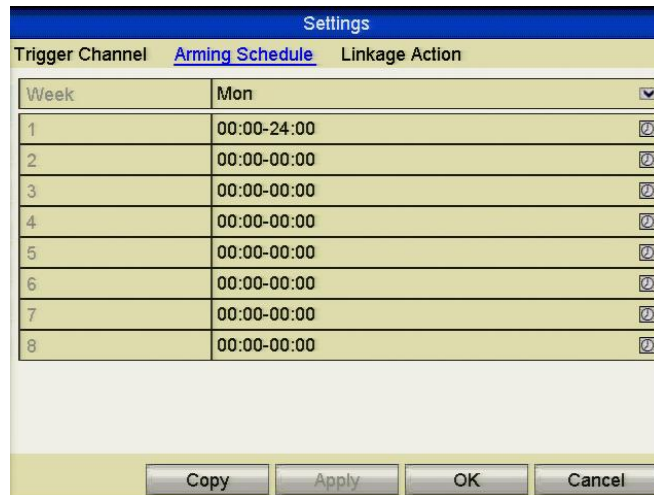


Figure 8.1.4 Set Arming Schedule of Motion Detection

5. Click **Linkage Action** tab to set up alarm response actions for motion alarm (please refer to *Setting Alarm Response Actions* in this Chapter.

Repeat the above steps to set up arming schedule for other days of the week.

Click the **OK** button to complete the motion detection settings for the channel.

6. If you want to set motion detection for another channel, repeat the above steps or just copy the above settings to it.

You are not allowed to copy the "Trigger Channel" action.

8.2 Setting Sensor Alarms

This function may not be supported on some DVR models.

Purpose:

Set up handling method of an external sensor alarm.

Steps:

1. Enter Alarm Settings in System Configuration and select an alarm input.

Menu> Setup> Alarm

Select Alarm Input tab to enter Alarm Input Settings interface.

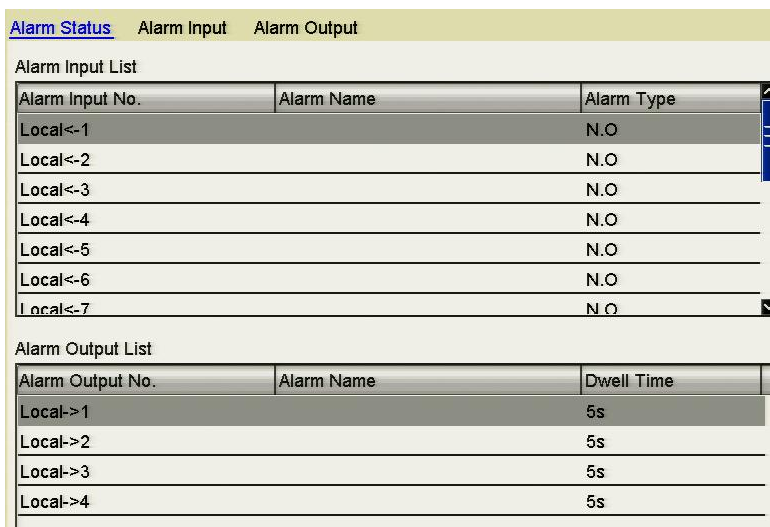


Figure 8.2.1 Alarm Status Interface

2. Set the handling method of the selected alarm input.

Click the **Enable** checkbox and  button to set alarm response actions.

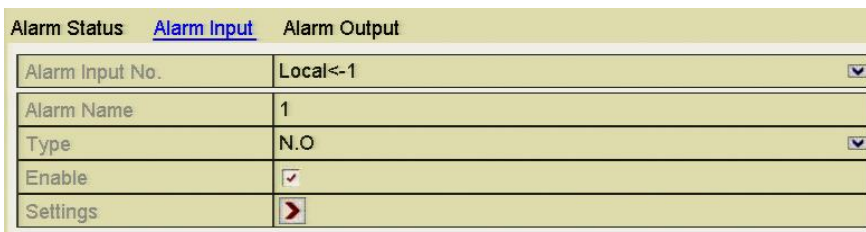


Figure 8.2.2 Alarm Input Settings Interface

4. Select **Arming Schedule** tab to set the channel's arming schedule. Choose one day of a week and a maximum of eight time periods can be set within each day. Time periods must not be duplicated or overlap.

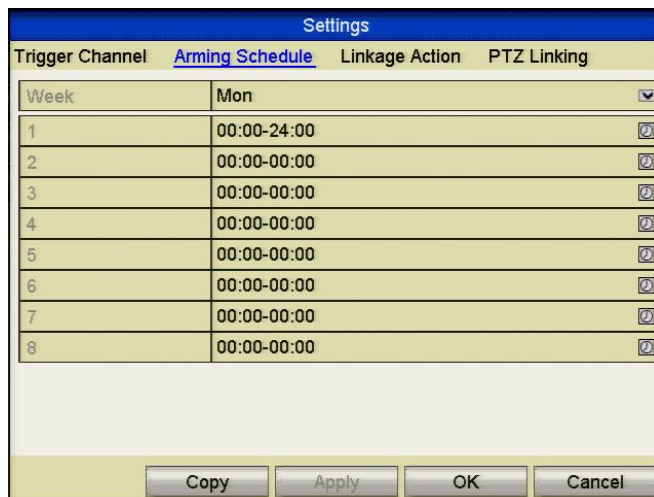


Figure 8.2.3 Set Arming Schedule of Alarm Input

5. Select **Linkage Action** tab to set up alarm response actions of the alarm input (please refer to *Setting Alarm Response Actions later in this chapter.*
Repeat the above steps to set up arming schedule of other days of a week. You can also use **Copy** button to copy an arming schedule to other days.
6. If necessary, select **PTZ Linking** tab and set PTZ linkage for the alarm input. Set PTZ linking parameters and click the **OK** button to complete the alarm input settings.

Please check whether the PTZ or speed dome supports PTZ linkage.
One alarm input can trigger presets, patrols or patterns for more than one channel.
However presets, patrols and patterns are exclusive.

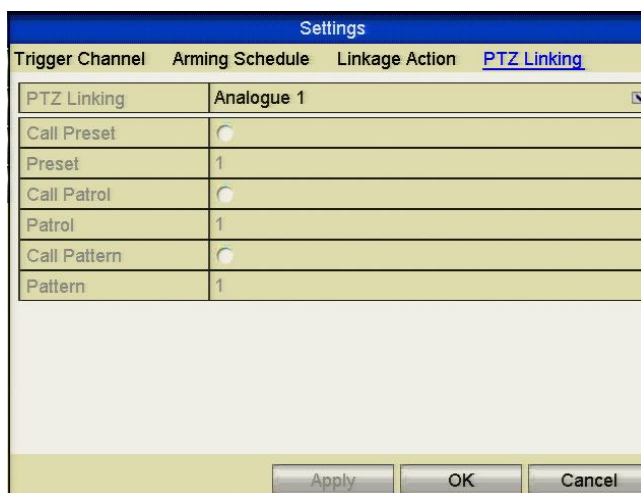


Figure 8.2.4 Set PTZ Linking of Alarm Input

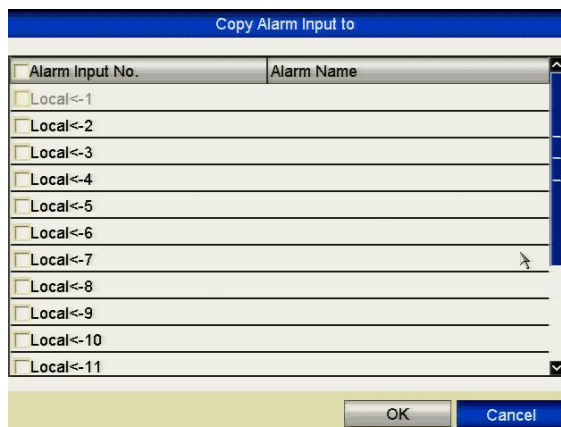


Figure 8.2.5 Copy Settings of Alarm Input

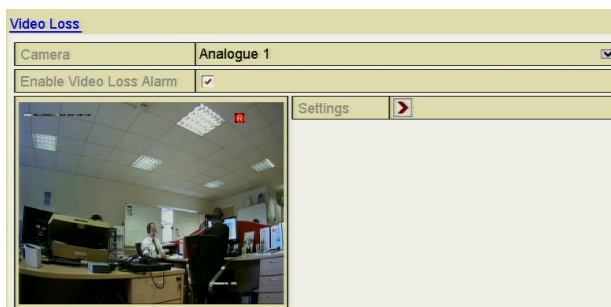


Figure 8.3.1 Video Loss Setup Interface

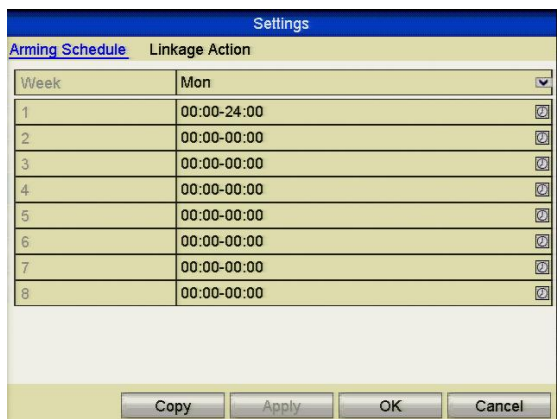


Figure 8.3.2 Set Arming Schedule of Video Loss

Purpose:

Trigger alarm when the lens is covered and take alarm response action(s).

Steps:

1. Enter Video Tampering interface in Camera Management and select a channel you want to detect for video tampering.
Menu> Video> Tamper-proof

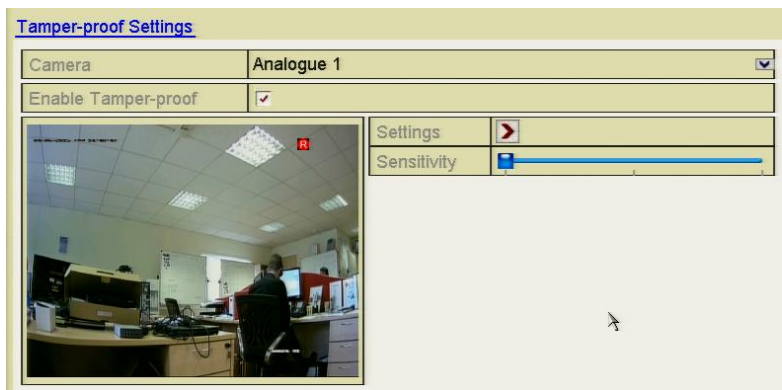


Figure 8.4.1 Video Tampering Interface

2. Click the checkbox “Enable Tamper-proof”.
3. Drag the sensitivity bar and choose the required sensitivity level.
4. Click **Settings** to set handling method for video tampering. Set arming schedule and alarm response actions for the channel.
 - 1) Click **Arming Schedule** tab to set the arming schedule response action.
 - 2) Choose one day of the week and up to eight time periods can be set within each day. Time periods must not be duplicated or overlap.

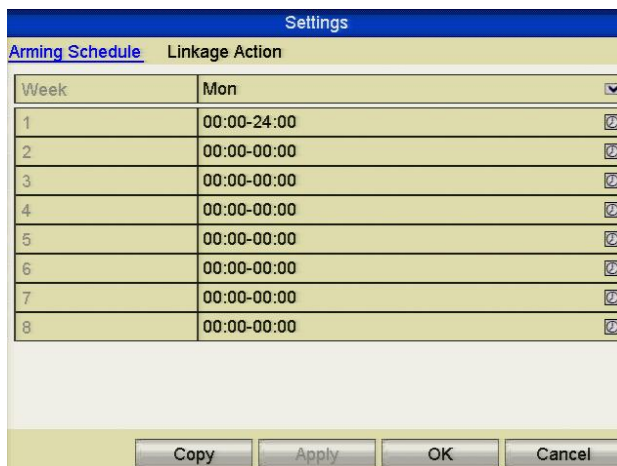


Figure 8.4.2 Set Arming Schedule for Video Tampering

8.5 Detecting VCA Alarm

Purpose:

The DVR can provide VCA (Video Content Analysis) capability for enabling linkage actions when detecting exceptional events such as people, vehicles and objects crossing a virtual line or intruders entering a pre-defined region.

The MEGA series DVRs can receive the VCA alarm sent by analogue cameras but VCA detection must be enabled and configured in the VCA settings interface first.

Perform the steps below to set the VCA configuration.

The MEGA204, MEGA208, MEG216 and MAX316 support one analogue camera channel for VCA but 2 analogue camera channels for the MAX416.

Steps:

1. Enter VCA Alarm interface in Camera Management and select a camera you want to detect the VCA alarm.

Menu> Video> VCA

REMINDER: The selected camera must support the VCA function.

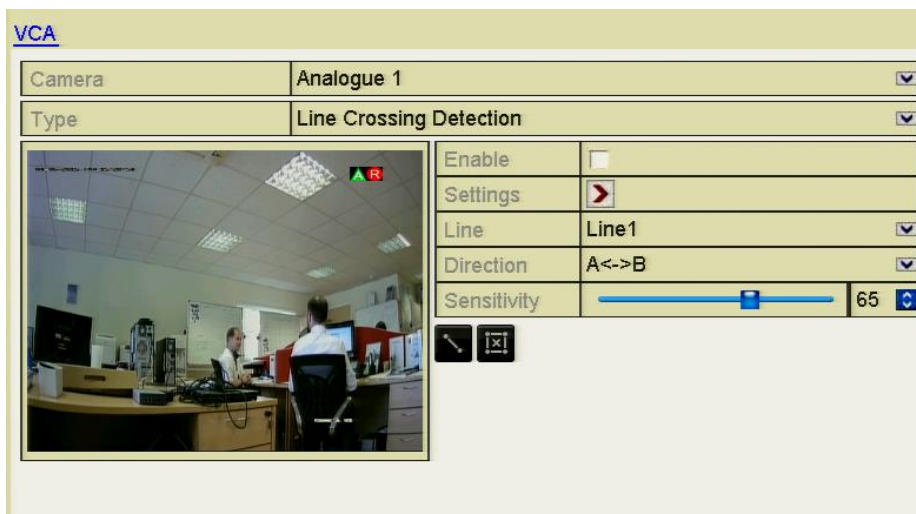



Figure 8.5.1 VCA Alarm Setting Interface

2. Select the analogue camera to configure the VCA.
3. Select the detection type to **Line Crossing Detection** or **Intrusion Detection**.

Line Crossing Detection: This function can be used for detecting people, vehicles and objects crossing a set virtual line. The line crossing direction can be set as bidirectional, from left to right or from right to left or you can set the duration for the alarm response actions, such as full screen monitoring, audible warning, etc.

Intrusion Detection: This function can be used for detecting whether there are people, vehicles and objects intruding into the pre-defined region longer than the set duration. You can set the duration for the alarm response actions, such as full screen monitoring, audible warning.

4. Click the **Enable** checkbox to enable the selected VCA detection.
5. Click the **Settings**  to configure the trigger channel, arming schedule and linkage actions.

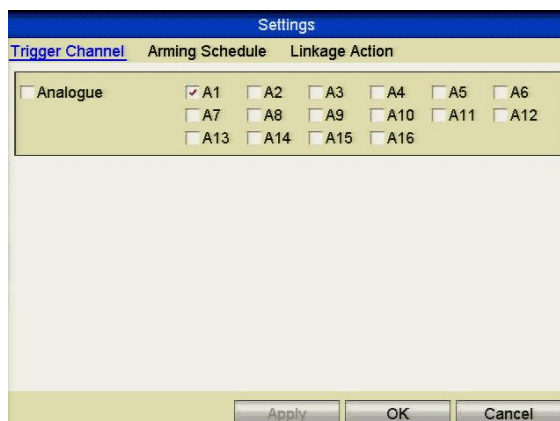


Figure 8.5.2 Set Triggering Channel for VCA Alarm

- 1) Select **Trigger Channel** tab and select one or more channels which will start to record/capture or become full-screen monitoring when a VCA alarm is triggered, and click **Apply** to save the settings.
- 2) Select **Arming Schedule** tab to set the arming schedule for handling actions.

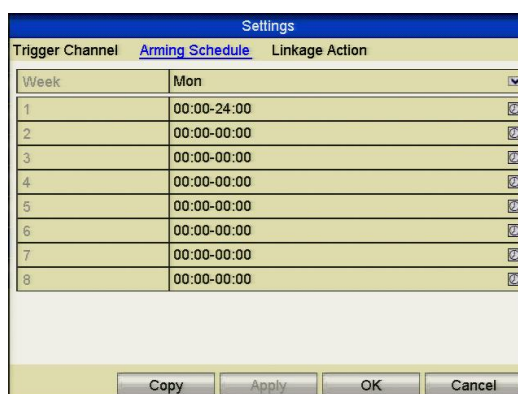


Figure 8.5.3 Set Arming Schedule for VCA Alarm

- 3) Select **Linkage Action** tab to set up alarm response actions of the alarm input (please refer to *Setting Alarm Response Actions later in this chapter*).
- 4) Click the **OK** button to complete the VCA alarm settings for the channel.

6. Configure the region and other settings for the selected VCA detection.

Task1: Configure the Line Crossing Detection.

- 1) Select the virtual line from the drop-down list. Up to 4 lines are selectable.
- 2) Select the direction to A<->B, A->B or A<-B.

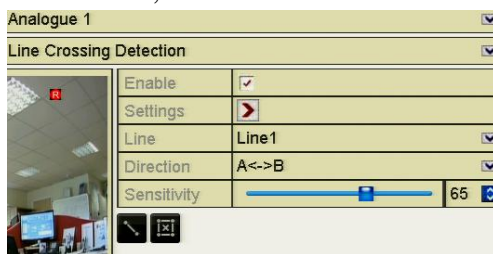



Figure 8.5.4 Set Direction of Line Crossing Detection

- 4) Click  and set two points in the preview window to draw a virtual line.

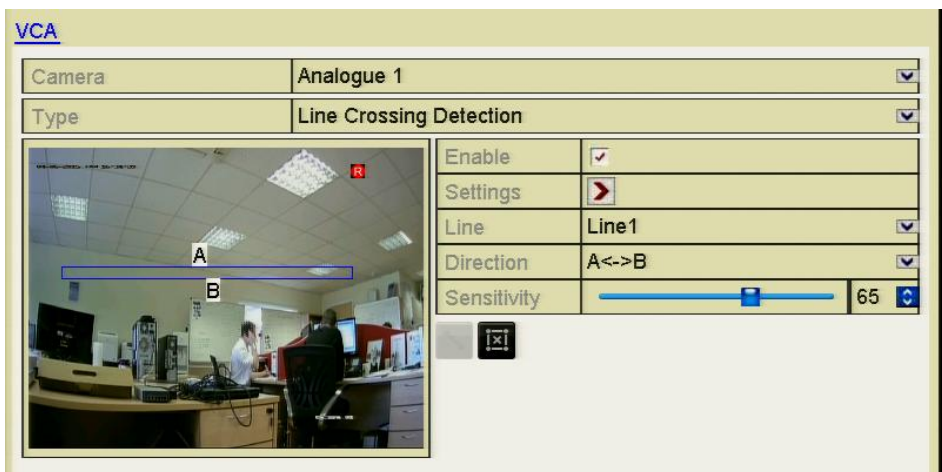



Figure 8.5.5 Draw Virtual Line in the Image

Task2: Configure the Intrusion Detection.

- 1) Select the intrusion region from the drop-down list. Up to 4 regions are selectable.
- 2) Select the sensitivity of the intrusion detection from 1-100.
- 3) Set the percentage from 1-100. Percentage defines the ratio of the in-region part of the object which can trigger the alarm. For example, when you set the percentage to 50%, half of the object entering the region will trigger the alarm.

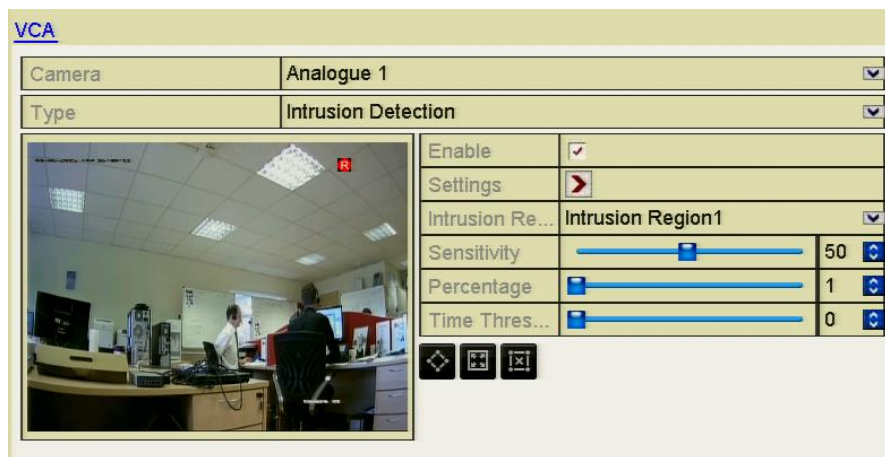





Figure 8.5.6 Set Intrusion Detection

- 4) Set the time threshold from 0-10 sec. When the duration of the object in the defined detection area is greater than the set time, the alarm will be triggered.
- 5) Click  and draw a quadrilateral or click  to draw the full screen in the preview window for the selected intrusion region. You can use the  to clear the existing region and re-draw it.
- 6) Repeat the above steps to set other intrusion regions.
- 7) Click **Apply** to save the settings.

8.6 Setting All-day Video Quality Diagnostics**Purpose:**

The device provides two ways to diagnose the video quality: manual and all-day. Perform the following steps to set the threshold for the diagnosing and the linkage actions.


Steps:

1. Enter Video Quality Diagnostics settings interface in Camera Management and select a channel you want to detect video tampering.

Menu> Video> Video Quality

2. Click the checkbox to Enable Video Quality Diagnostics.
3. Enable and set the threshold for the diagnostic type which includes Blurred Image, Abnormal Brightness and Colour Cast. Click the corresponding checkbox for the diagnostic type and adjust the threshold by clicking-and-dragging the bar.

The higher the threshold you set, the greater the exception will be detected.

4. Click **Settings**  to set handling method for video tampering. Set arming schedule and alarm response actions for the channel.

1) Click **Arming Schedule** tab to set the arming schedule response action.

2) Choose a day of the week and up to eight time periods within each day.

Time periods must not be duplicated or overlap.

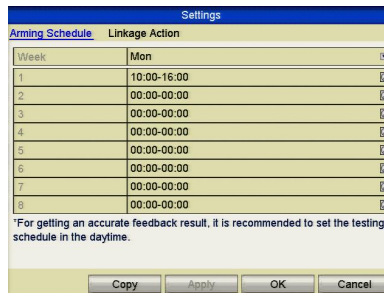


Figure 8.6.1 Set Arming Schedule for Video Quality Diagnostics

3) Select **Linkage Action** tab to set alarm response actions for video tampering alarm (please refer to *Setting Alarm Response Actions later in this chapter*).

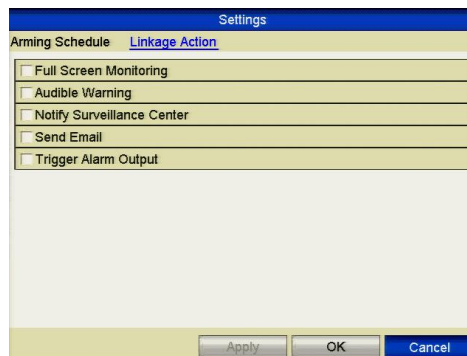


Figure 8.6.2 Set Linkage Action

6. (Optional) you can copy the same settings to other cameras by clicking the **Copy** button.

8.7 Handling Exceptions

Purpose:

Exception settings refer to the handling method for various exceptions, e.g.

- **HDD Full:** The HDD is full.
- **HDD Error:** Writing HDD error, unformatted HDD, etc.
- **Network Disconnected:** Disconnected network cable.
- **IP Conflicted:** Duplicated IP address.
- **Illegal Login:** Incorrect user ID or password.
- **Input/Recording Resolution Mismatch:** The input resolution is smaller than the recording resolution.
- **Record Exception:** No space for saving recorded files.

Steps:

1. Enter Exceptions interface and handle various exceptions.
Menu> Setup> Exceptions

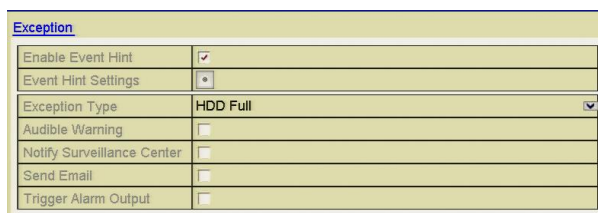




Figure 8.7.1 Exception Settings Interface

2. Click the checkbox of **Enable Event Hint** to display the  (Event Hint Settings icon) which when selected displays the Event Hint Settings menu. Then tick the detailed event hint for display. If the alarm icon  appears in the live view interface you can view the detailed information of the exception event. By clicking the **Set** button you can select the detailed event hint for display.

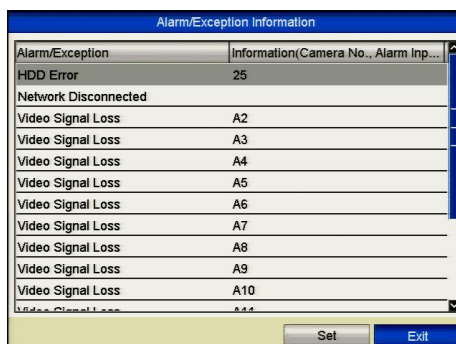


Figure 8.7.2 Detailed Event

3. Set the alarm linkage actions. For details, see Chapter below.

4. Click **Apply** to save the settings.

8.8 Setting Alarm Response Actions

Purpose:

Alarm response actions will be activated when an alarm or exception occurs, including Full Screen Monitoring, Audible Warning (buzzer), Notify Surveillance Center, Send Email and Trigger Alarm Output.

Full Screen Monitoring

When an alarm is triggered, the local monitor (HDMI, VGA or CVBS monitor) will display in full screen mode, the video image for the alarming channel configured.

If alarms are triggered simultaneously for several channels, their full-screen images will be switched at an interval of 10 seconds (default dwell time). A different dwell time can be set by going to **Menu > Setup > Live View**.

Auto-switch will terminate once the alarm stops and you will be taken back to the Live View interface.

Audible Warning

Trigger an audible *beep* when an alarm is detected.

Notify Surveillance Center

Sends an exception or alarm signal to a remote alarm host when an event occurs. The alarm host refers to the PC installed with Remote Client.

The alarm signal will be transmitted automatically at detection mode when remote alarm host is configured. Please refer to *Chapter 9* for details of the alarm host configuration.

Send Email

Send an email with alarm information to a user or users when an alarm is detected.

Please refer to *Chapter 9* for details of Email configuration.

Trigger Alarm Output

Trigger an alarm output when an alarm is triggered.

Steps:

1. Enter Alarm Output interface.

Menu> Setup> Alarm> Alarm Output

Select an alarm output and set alarm name and dwell time. Click **Settings** button to set the arming schedule for alarm output.

If “Manually Clear” is selected in the dropdown list in Dwell Time, you can clear it only by going to **Menu> Instant> Alarm**.

Select the alarm output you want to trigger or clear and make related operations.

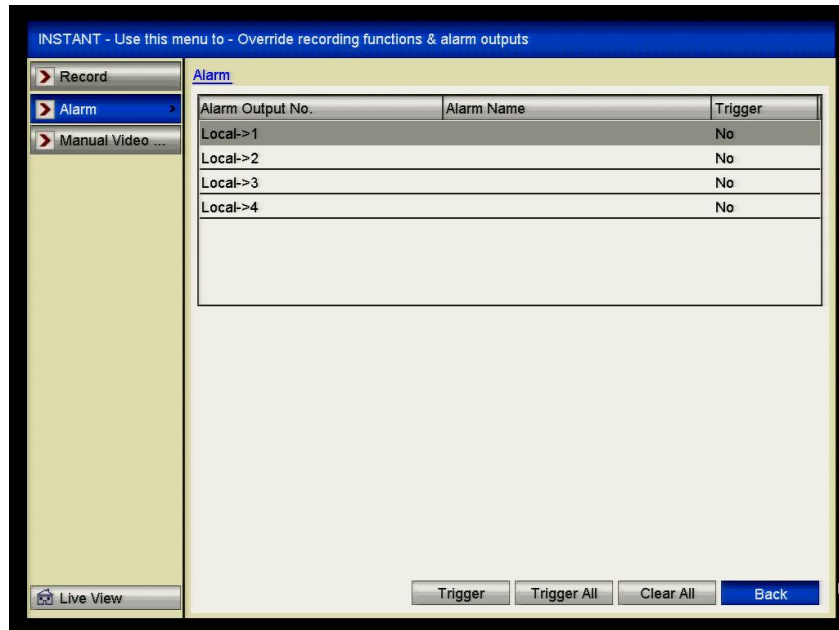


Figure 8.9.1 Clear or Trigger Alarm Output Manually

Network settings must be properly configured to allow you to operate the DVR over a network.

Note that the MAX416 has an additional option as this DVR has two LAN cards. You can therefore select either LAN1 or LAN2. All other MEGA units only have one.

One self-adaptive 10M/100M/1000M network interface is provided for MEGA204, MEGA208, MEGA216 AND MAX316.

Two self-adaptive 10M/100M/1000M network interfaces are available on the MAX416 which provide three configurable working modes: multi-address, load balance and network fault tolerance modes.

2. Select the **General** tab.
3. In the **General Settings** interface, you can configure the following settings: Working mode (applicable for MAX416 only), NIC Type, IPv4 Address, IPv4 Gateway, MTU and DNS Server.
If a DHCP server is available, you can click the **DHCP** checkbox to automatically obtain an IP address and other network settings from that server. A valid value for MTU is from 500 to 1500.
4. After having configured the general settings, click the **Apply** button to save the settings.

Working Mode

There are two 10M/100M/1000M NIC cards provided in the MAX416 DVR. This allows the DVR to work in the Multi-address, Load Balance and Net-fault Tolerance modes.

Multi-address Mode: The parameters in the two NIC cards can be configured independently. You can select LAN1 or LAN2 in the NIC type field for parameter settings. You can select one NIC card as a default route. When the system is connecting via an extranet the data will be forwarded through the default route.

Net-fault Tolerance Mode: This mode allows two NIC cards to use the same IP address and you can select the Main NIC to LAN1 or LAN2. In this way, in the case of one NIC card failing, the device will automatically enable the other standby NIC card so ensuring normal running conditions are maintained.

Load Balance Mode: By using the same IP address with two NIC cards that share the load of the total bandwidth, this mode enables the system to provide two Gigabit network capacity.

9.2 Configuring Advanced Settings

9.2.1 Configuring DDNS

Purpose:

If your router is setup on a dynamic service you may use this facility for resolving the dynamic address.

Steps:

1. Enter the Network Settings interface.
Menu > Setup > Network
Change the Preferred DNS Server to the same address as the IPv4 Default Gateway. Change the Alternate DNS Server to 8.8.8.8
Now click apply.

When you click in the blank Email box you will see a keyboard displayed. Select the characters to complete the Email address. Special characters such as dot or @ can be selected by clicking on the dot and comma under the letter A.
Subsequent lines of special characters are accessed using right arrow button.

NOTE: The dot is a special character and is number 2 and not number 1. The @ sign is accessed by clicking on the right arrow key to select the second line of special characters and is under number 5. Press **APPLY** then wait.

The ALIENDDNS service will send a six character password to the Email address and will display “**RECORD CREATED**”.

Write down the password and enter in the Password box then click **Apply** and wait. When the message “**UPDATE SUCCESSFUL**” is displayed, the DDNS service is ready to use after exiting menu.

If you wish to use a third party dynamic service then you can chose one of the optional alternatives.

You can use SNMP protocol to get device status and parameters related information.

Note that you do not need to use SNMP as the Alien Viewer will do this automatically.

9.2.5 Configuring NAT (UPnP)

Purpose:

Universal Plug and Play (UPnP) can permit automatic port forwarding on a router.

Before you start:

If you want to use the UPnP function in the device, you must enable the UPnP function in the router to which your device is connected. When the network working mode of the device is set as multi-address, the Default Route of the device should be in the same network segment as that of the LAN IP address of the router.

Steps:

1. Enter the Network Settings interface.
Menu > Setup > Network

2. Select the **NAT** tab to enter the UPnP settings interface.

 - **Alarm Host IP/Port:** With a remote alarm host configured, the device will send the alarm event or exception message to the host when an alarm is triggered. **This option is currently under development.**
 - **Alarm Host IP** refers to the IP address of the remote PC on which the Client software is installed and the **Alarm Host Port** must be the same as the alarm monitoring port configured in the software (default port is 7200). **This option is currently under development.**
 - **Multicast IP:** The multicast option can be configured to view more than the maximum number of cameras through the network. A multicast address spans the Class-D IP range of 224.0.0.0 to 239.255.255.255. It is recommended to use the IP address ranging from 239.252.0.0 to 239.255.255.255. When adding a device to the Client software, the multicast address must be the same as the device’s multicast IP.

- **RTSP Port:** The RTSP (Real Time Streaming Protocol) is a network control protocol designed for use in entertainment and communications systems to control streaming media servers.
Enter the RTSP port in the text field of **RTSP Port**. The default RTSP port is 1240 but you can change it according to different requirements.
- **Server Port and HTTP Port:** Enter the **Server Port** and **HTTP Port** in the text fields. The default Server Port is 8240 and the HTTP Port is 80 but you can change them according to different requirements.
The Server Port should be set to the range of 2000-65535 and it is used for remote client software access. The HTTP port is used for remote IE access.

9.2.7 Configuring HTTPS Port

Purpose:

HTTPS provides authentication of the web site and associated web server that one is communicating with, which protects against malware attacks. Perform the following steps to set the port number of https.

Example:

If you set the port number as 443 and the IP address is 192.168.0.64, you may access the device by inputting ***https://192.168.0.64:443*** via the web browser.

The HTTPS port can be only configured through the web browser.

Steps:

1. Open web browser, input the IP address of device, and the web server will select the language automatically according to the system language and maximise the web browser.
2. Input the correct user name and password, and click **Login** button to log into the device.
3. Enter the HTTPS settings interface.
Configuration > Remote Configuration > Network Settings > HTTPS
4. Create the self-signed certificate or authorised certificate.

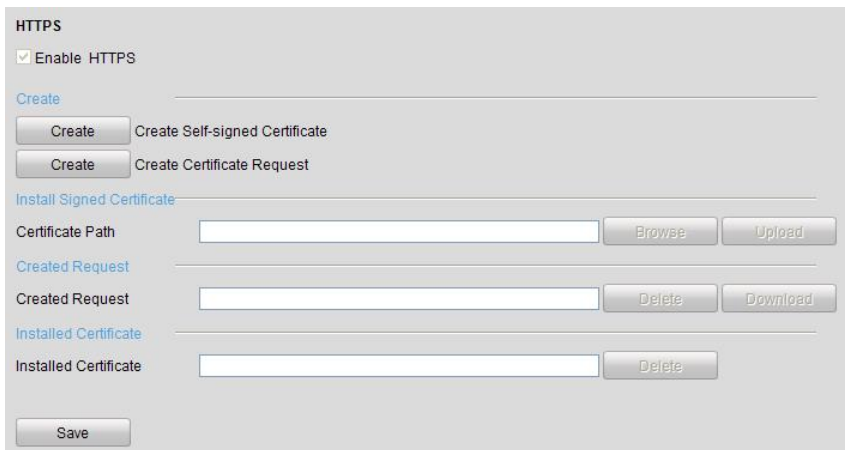


Figure 9.2.7.1 HTTPS Settings

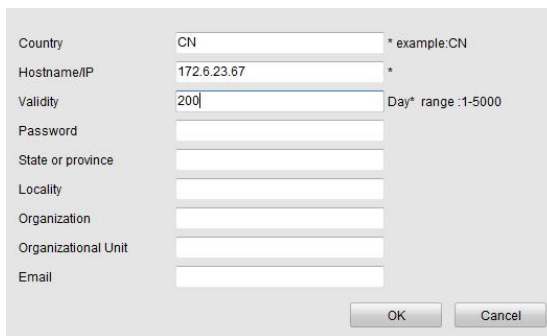


Figure 9.2.7.2 Create Self-signed Certificate

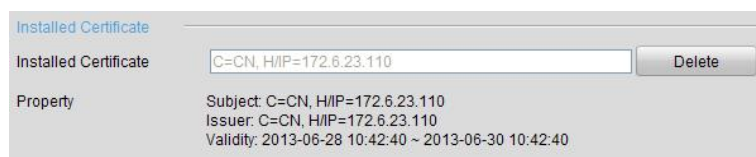


Figure 9.2.7.3 Installed Certificate Property

9.2.8 Configuring Email

Purpose:

The system can be configured to send an Email notification to all designated users if an event is detected, e.g. an alarm or motion event is detected, etc.

Before configuring the Email settings, the DVR must be connected to a local area network (LAN) that maintains an SMTP mail server. The network must also be connected to either an intranet or the Internet depending on the location of the e-mail accounts to which you want to send notification. Additionally, the Preferred DNS server must be configured.

Before you start:

Make sure you have configured the IPv4 Address, IPv4 Subnet Mask, IPv4 Gateway and the Preferred DNS Server in the Network Settings menu. Please refer to *Chapter 99.1 Configuring General Settings* for detailed information.

Steps:

1. Enter the Network Settings interface.
Menu > Setup > Network
2. Select the **Email** tab to enter the Email Settings interface

 - User Name:** The user account of sender's Email for SMTP server authentication.

 - SMTP Server:** The SMTP Server IP address or host name (e.g., smtp.263xmail.com).

SMTP Port No.: The SMTP port. The default TCP/IP port used for SMTP is 25.

Enable SSL (optional): Click the checkbox to enable SSL if required by the SMTP server.

Sender: The name of sender.

Sender's Address: The Email address of sender.

Select Receivers: Select the receiver. Up to 3 receivers can be configured.

Receiver: The name of the receiver of the Email.

Receiver's Address: The Email address of the receiver.

Enable Attached Pictures: Check the checkbox of **Enable Attached Picture** if you want to send email with attached alarm images. The interval is the time between two captures of the alarm images.

Interval: The interval refers to the time between two actions of sending attached pictures.

E-mail Test: Sends a test message to verify that the SMTP server can be reached.

4. Click the **Apply** button to save the Email settings.
5. You can click the **Test** button to test whether your Email settings work. The corresponding messages are displayed.
6. There are a variety of display messages advising you of possible errors on each field completed when you fail to send an Email. A final message of "Email test succeeded" is displayed that requires a confirmation to proceed. The following is an example:

9.3 Checking Network Traffic

Purpose:

You can check the network traffic to obtain real-time information about the DVR such as linking status, MTU, sending/receiving rate, etc.

Steps:

1. Enter the Network Traffic interface.
Menu > Tools > Net Detect

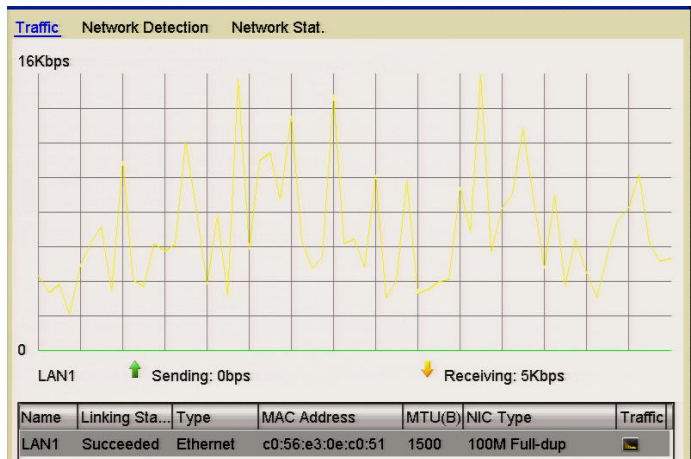


Figure 9.3.1 Network Traffic Interface

2. You can view the transmitting rate and receiving rate information via the interface. The traffic data is refreshed every 1 second.

9.4 Configuring Network Detection

Purpose:

You can obtain the network connection status of DVR through the network detection function, including network delay, packet loss, etc.

9.4.1 Testing Network Delay and Packet Loss

Steps:

1. Enter the Network Traffic interface.
Menu > Tools > Net Detect
2. Click the **Network Detection** tab to enter the Network Detection menu.

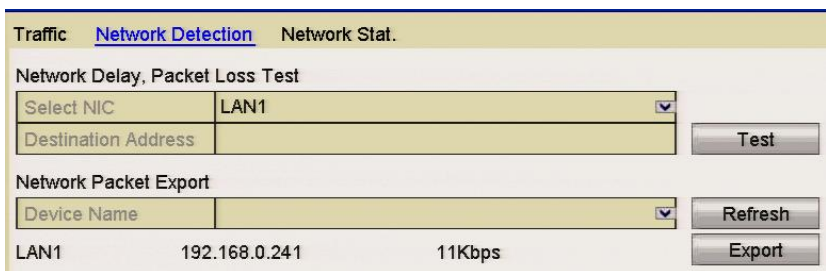


Figure 9.4.1.1 Network Detection Interface

3. Select a NIC to test network delay and packet loss.
4. Enter the destination address in the text field of **Destination Address**.
5. Click the **Test** button to start testing network delay and packet loss.

9.4.2 Exporting Network Packet

Purpose:

By connecting the DVR to a network, the captured network data packet can be exported to USB-flash disk, SATA and other local backup devices.

Steps:

1. Enter the Network Traffic interface.
Menu > Tools > Net Detect
2. Click the **Network Detection** tab to enter the Network Detection interface.
3. Select the backup device from the dropdown list in Device Name.

Click the **Refresh** button if the connected local backup device cannot be displayed. If it fails to detect the backup device, please check whether it is compatible with the DVR. You can format the backup device if the format is incorrect.

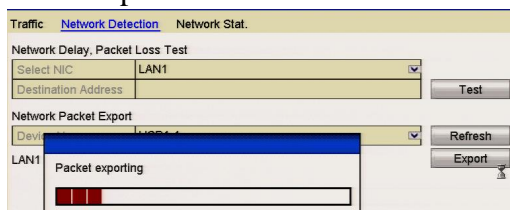


Figure 9.4.2.1 Export Network Packet

4. Click the **Export** button to start exporting.
5. After the exporting is complete, click **OK** to finish the packet export.

Up to 1M data can be exported each time.

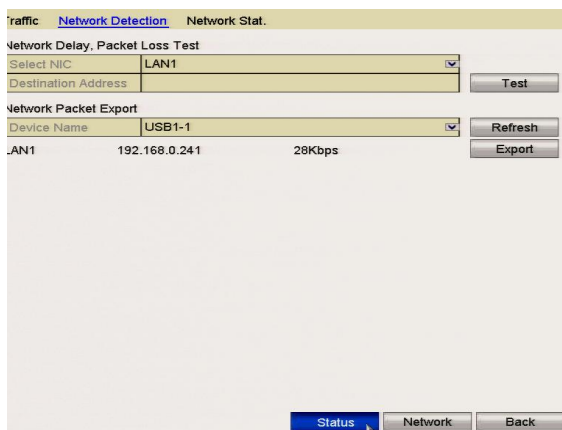
9.4.3 Checking Network Status

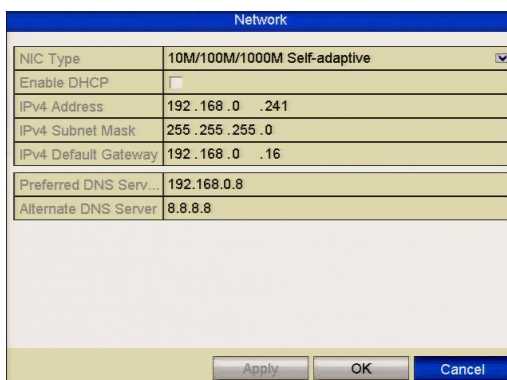


Figure 9.4.3.3 Network Parameters Configuration

9.5 Networking your DVR

The following is a guide for doing the networking on your DVR.

Before you start you will need the following

- (a) **Monitor** connected to the DVR,
- (b) **Patch or LAN cable** connected between the DVR and the router,
- (c) **Windows PC** connected to the router (preferably with a cable connection although WIFI should work)
- (d) **User and Password** to access the router. On a BT router this may be on a plastic insert on the back of the router labelled Admin Password. On other routers the user and password is supplied with the router installation documentation.

Networking is split into several processes

- 1) Setting up the DVR for networking
- 2) Checking to ensure that the PC can see the DVR locally
- 3) Setting up port forwarding
- 5) Setting up a dynamic service
- 6) Checking ports are open
- 7) Setting up CCTV Window for local and remote connection
- 8) Setting up mobile phone for local and remote connection

1. Setting up the DVR for networking

1. Ensure your PC has Internet access via your router. Try accessing Google.
2. Connect a LAN or patch cable from DVR to router. (**NOT THE YELLOW CROSSOVER CABLE**)
3. In the DVR menu, select **Setup** then **Network** and tick **Enable DHCP** box. Press **Apply** and then **Back**.
4. Click on **Tools** and **Network** on the top line and **write down** the **IPv4 Address**, **IPv4 Subnet Mask** and **IPv4 Default Gateway**. If the IPv4 address is **192.0.0.64** then check the cable connection from the DVR to the router. This address means that the DVR cannot communicate with the router. Until this is resolved do not proceed. If the address is different, continue and click on **Back**.
5. Press **Setup** and then **Network** and untick **DHCP** box, then enter **IPv4 Address**, **Subnet Mask** and **Gateway** written down.
6. Click **Apply** and then select **NAT** or **UPnP** (Universal Plug and Play) at the top of the page.
7. NAT/UPnP should automatically do your port forwarding but this depends on router having the facility and enabled. (Also BT routers seem to have an inherent problem and seldom work.)
8. Click on **Enable UPnP** and you will see the three ports
HTTP Ext Port **80** External IP Address **0.0.0.0** Port **80** **Inactive**
RTSP Ext Port **1240** External IP Address **0.0.0.0** Port **1240** **Inactive**
Server Ext Port **8240** External IP Address **0.0.0.0** Port **8240** **Inactive**
HTTPS Ext Port **443** External IP Address **0.0.0.0** Port **443** **Inactive**

Click **Apply** and **Back**.

9. Now Re-enter **Setup, Network** and **NAT/UPnP** and see if the ports are **active** and remain the same, in **both External** and **Port** port columns.

10. If the ports are active, automatic port forwarding has worked. If they are **active** but **not the ports** detailed in step 8 click the **Auto down arrow key** and select **Manual**. Then click on edit signature and change the port numbers to **8240** (Server), **80** (HTTP) and **1240** (RTSP). Then click **Apply** then **Back**.

11. Check **UPnP** ports (**Setup, Network, NAT/UPnP**) are the correct ports and are **all active**. If they are then port forwarding has worked so go to **Process 5**. If not, **untick Enable UPnP, Apply** then **Back** and **Exit** menu completely. You will now need to do manual port forwarding.

2. Checking to ensure that the PC can see the DVR locally

12. Ensure the menu in the DVR is closed and go to the Windows PC keyboard that is connected to the router.

13. Ensure the PC is on the network and press the **Windows button** and the letter **R** to open a Command Run box.

14. In the run box type **CMD** then **enter** or click **OK**.

15. A black MSDOS screen will now be displayed with a flashing cursor.

16. Type **ping <space> <IPv4 Address supplied by DHCP in step 4>** and **Enter**

17. Check **packets sent, packets received** and **packets lost** at bottom of reply.

18. If not **4 packets sent, 4 packets received** and **0 packets lost** you have a problem with communication between the PC sending test data through the router to the DVR and returning to the PC. You can try pinging the router by going to step 13 through 15 and then type **ping <space> <IPv4 Default Gateway Address>** supplied by DHCP in step 4. The IPv4 Default Gateway address is the router local address. If packets are still lost the problem is no/bad connection between PC and router, but if okay then problem is between router and DVR. Do not proceed further until **4 packets sent, 4 packets received** and **0 packets lost** is displayed.

3. Setting up port forwarding

19. If the NAT/UPnP option has not worked, then port forwarding will have to be done manually. The purpose of port forwarding is for the router to allow communication on a predetermined incoming port received on the external side of the router, to be passed through the router firewall to the local address of the DVR. The DVR will process the data and return it to the router using the IPv4 Default Gateway Address which is the router's local address.

As there are hundreds of routers on the market, they will have various options for port forwarding. If you connect to <http://portforward.com> you can view a large range of router makes and models that will indicate how to do port forwarding. You probably will not find the ALIEN range of DVRs listed but you can select a device and apply the ALIEN DVR ports that are detailed in the DVR Menu, Setup, Network and More Settings.

The standard method on many routers is to enter the router menu using the user and password set in the router. Setup **SERVICES** usually giving each service a unique name for example DVR8240, DVR1240 and DVR80 selecting **TCP** and the **start** and **finish** port number (which is usually the same port number for start and end port.

Then go to port forwarding and assign each incoming port to the local address of the DVR which is the IPv4 address set in the Network page of the DVR.

To verify that the ports are open refer to process number **6. Checking ports are open.**

5. Setting up a dynamic service (Only use if router is not on a static service)

20. Enter the Network Settings interface.

Menu > Setup > Network

Change the **Preferred DNS Server** to the same address as the **IPv4 Default Gateway**. Change the **Alternate DNS Server** to **8.8.8.8**

Now click apply.

Select the **DDNS** tab to enter the DDNS Settings interface.

Click the **ENABLE DDNS** checkbox to enable this feature.

If you are using the AlienDDNS service then all you need to do, is to enter a valid Email address in the box, right of Email and press Apply then wait.

When you click in the blank Email box you will see a keyboard displayed. Select the characters to complete the Email address. Special characters such as dot or @ can be selected by clicking on the dot and comma under the letter A.

Subsequent lines of special characters are accessed using right arrow button.

NOTE: The dot is a special character and is number 2 and not number 1.

The @ sign is accessed by clicking on the right arrow key to select the second line of special characters and is under number 5. Press **APPLY** then wait.

The ALIENDDNS service will send a six character password to the Email address and will display **“RECORD CREATED”**.

Write down the password and enter in the Password box then click **Apply** and wait.

When the message **“UPDATE SUCCESSFUL”** is displayed, the DDNS service is ready to use after exiting menu.

You can now use the Device Domain Name <**DVR serial no**>.ippostcode.com

If you wish to use a third party dynamic service then you can chose one of the optional alternatives. Select alternative **DDNS Type**. Four additional DDNS types are selectable: IPServer, DynDNS, PeanutHull or NO-IP. Refer to DDNS instructions earlier for further information.

6. Checking ports are open

21. The easiest method to check that ports are open is to run www.ping.eu and select option 5 Port Check.
22. Enter the public address of the router. This can be found by using a PC connected to the router and firing up Google and entering “**Whats My IP**”
This will return the public address of the router by opening one of the records found. Then enter the port numbers in turn and press **GO**. If port says **OPEN** then port forwarding has worked. If port says **CLOSED** then check DVR is out of the menu and Welcome screen and try again. If still closed then you will need to investigate further or get assistance.
23. To check if the dynamic system is working then instead of using an IP address and port, use the dynamic name and the port. If ports are closed but open when trying the current public address, the problem is not port forwarding but the dynamic service. Go into **DVR Menu, Setup, Network, DDNS** and check that the status of DDNS displays **UPDATE SUCCESSFUL**. If a different display, untick **Enable DDNS, Apply** then **Exit**, reboot DVR and then go back into **DDNS** menu and tick **Enable DDNS, Apply** and wait unit the unit returns **UPDATE SUCCESSFUL**. Exit completely from the menu and service should be running.

7. Setting up CCTVWindow for local and remote connection

Local Connection

24. If using CCTVWindow, launch the client.
25. Enter user **admin** password **666666**
26. Click on Setup.
27. In left hand column using mouse, double click the Alien Icon with eyes, to the left of the DVR name eg: ‘DVR No 1’
28. Modify Device Information window will be displayed
29. Enter the DVR’s IP address in Device IP field.
30. Ensure username and password are the same as that used to access the DVR menu. User is **admin** and Password by default is **555555**.

Port number is **8240**. Set channel number to number of channels on DVR.

31. Click on **Ok** to **Save**
32. Click on the **Preview** tab.
33. Click on the '+' sign to expand the DVR channels, then double click on a channel to display a picture. Alternatively double click the Alien Icon to display all channels. The local connection is now working.

34. Before going to the remote site, you need to find out what the public address of the router is. This can be found by using a PC connected to the router and firing up Google and entering "**Whats My IP.**" This will return the public address of the router by opening one of the records found. Make a note of this address.

Remote Connection

35. Go to the remote site and load the client software to the PC used for the remote connection.

36. Now run CCTVWindow and setup a similar entry to the local setting described above, steps 24 to 32, but instead of entering the local IP address, you need to enter the remote IP address as per step 34. If you are using the AlienDDNS service the dynamic name **<dvr serial no>.ippostcode.com** must be entered in CCTVWindow. This is explained below.

37. Launch CCTVWindow.

38. Enter user **admin** password **666666**

39. Click on Setup.

40. In left hand column using mouse, double click the Alien Icon with eyes, to the left of the DVR name eg: 'DVR No 1'

41. Modify Device Information window will be displayed

42. Change Register Mode from Normal IP to Normal Domain.

43. Enter the dynamic name **<dvr serial no>.ippostcode.com** in Normal Domain.

44. Ensure username and password are the same as that used to access the DVR

menu. User is **admin** and Password by default is **555555**.

Port number is **8240**. Set channel number to number of channels on DVR.

45. Click on the **Preview** tab.

46. Click on the '+' sign to expand the DVR channels, then double click on a channel to display a picture. Alternatively double click the Alien Icon to display all channels.

The remote connection is now working.

47. Note that you must use the local IP address for connecting locally ie: using the network in the building where the DVR is located. Conversely, you use the remote IP address or dynamic name of the router when your PC is remote.

8. Setting up mobile phone for local and remote connection

Local Connection

48. If the mobile phone is an iPhone you will need to load the Mobile App from the App Store. The file will be called ALIEN DVR. If the phone is an Android phone then download the Mobile App from www.aliendvr.com website. Note that phones using the Windows platform are not currently supported.

49. Add a device calling it something to distinguish it from being a remote connection e.g **DVRinternal**. In IP address field set the local IP address e.g **198.168.1.240** (see step 4) of the DVR. Ensure username and password is the same as that used to access the DVR menu. User is **admin** and Password by default is **555555**.

Port number is **8240**.

Remote Connection

50. Add a device calling it something to distinguish it from being a local connection e.g **DVRexternal**. In IP address/domain name field set the remote IP address e.g **80.56.168.221** (see step 34) of the DVR. If you are using the AlienDDNS service the dynamic name **<dvr serial no>.ippostcode.com** must be entered. The admin username, password and port must be entered as per example shown in step 49.

51. For mobile phone access use the local IP address of the DVR on WIFI in the building. Conversely, switch WIFI off to use the remote IP address or dynamic name of the router when your mobile phone is remote using the 3/4G network.

Chapter 10 HDD Management

10.1 Initialising HDDs

Purpose:

A newly installed hard disk drive (HDD) must be initialised before it can be used with your DVR.

Steps:

1. Enter the HDD Information interface.
Menu > Drives>General.

2. Select HDD to be formatted.
3. Click the **Format** button.

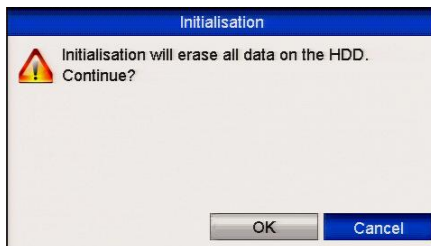


Figure 10.1.2 Confirm Initialisation

4. Select the **OK** button to start initialisation.

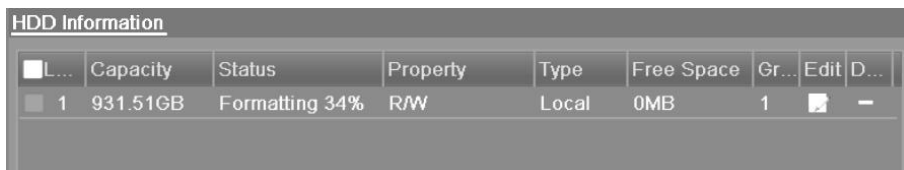


Figure 10.1.3 Start Initialisation

5. After the HDD has been initialised, the status of the HDD will change from *Uninitialised* to *Normal*.

Note that initializing/formatting the HDD will erase all data on it.

To decrease the power consumption of the device and extend the life of the HDDs, the HDDs that are not in continuous use, can be put into sleep mode.

Click Menu > Drives > Advanced.

Click the checkbox to **Enable HDD Sleeping** (by default) and the HDDs that are not in continuous use, will be place in sleeping mode.

Unclick the checkbox for **Enable HDD Sleeping** and the HDDs will work continuously.

10.2 Managing Network HDD

Purpose:

You can add the allocated NAS or IP SAN disk and use it as a network HDD.

Steps:

1. Enter the HDD Information interface.

Menu > Drives>General

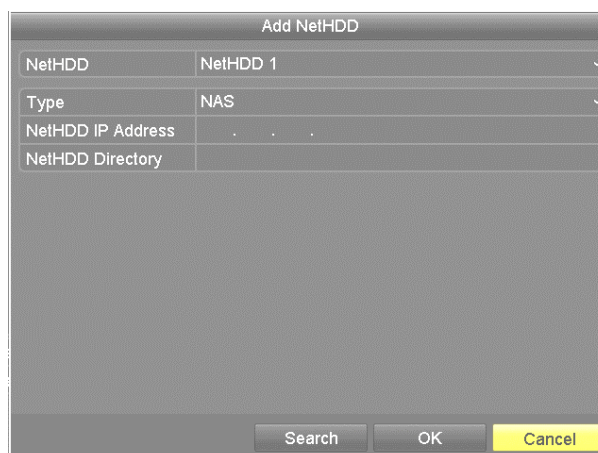
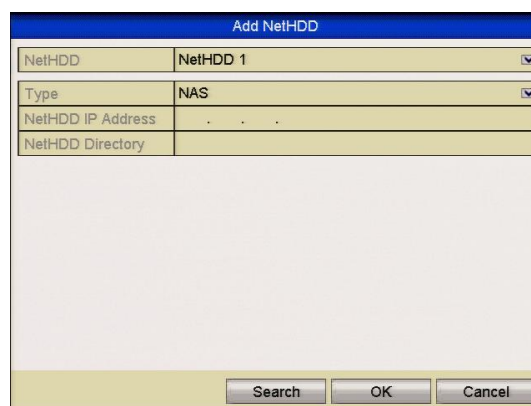


Figure 10.2.2 HDD Information Interface

2. Select the eSATA type to Export or Record from the dropdown list of **eSATA**.

Record: use the eSATA for record. Refer to the following steps for operating instructions.

Purpose:

Multiple HDDs can be managed in groups. Video from specified channels can be recorded onto a particular HDD group through HDD settings.

Steps:

- Set the **Mode** to Group, as shown below.

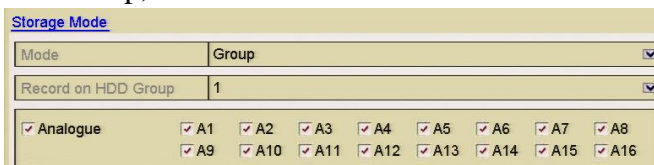


Figure 10.4.1.1 Storage Mode Interface

- Click the **Apply** button and the following will be displayed.

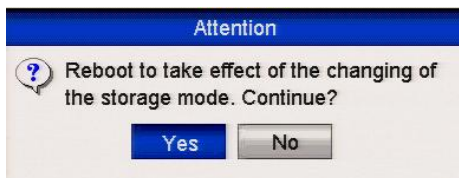


Figure 10.4.1.2 Attention for Reboot

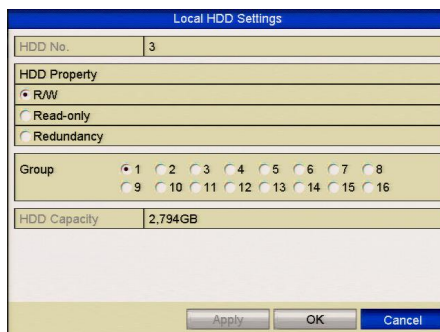


Figure 10.4.1.3 Local HDD Settings Interface

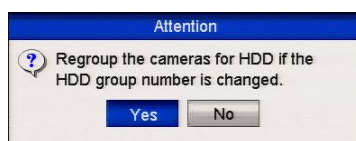


Figure 10.4.1.4 Confirm HDD Group Settings

10.4.2 Setting HDD Property


Purpose:

The HDD property can be set to redundancy, read-only or read/write (R/W). Before setting the HDD property, please set the storage mode to Group (refer to step1-4 of **Chapter 10.4 Setting HDD Groups**).

An HDD can be set to read-only to prevent important recorded files from being overwritten when the HDD becomes full in overwrite recording mode.

When the HDD property is set to redundancy, the video can be recorded both onto the redundancy HDD and the R/W HDD simultaneously so as to ensure high security and reliability of video data.

Steps:

1. Enter the HDD Information interface.
Menu > Drives> General
2. Select HDD from the list and click the  icon to enter the Local HDD Settings interface.

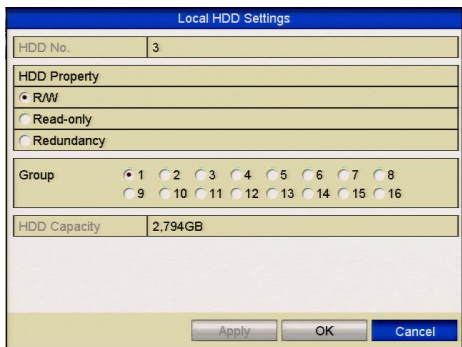


Figure 10.4.2.1 Set HDD Property

3. Set the HDD property to R/W, Read-only or Redundancy.
4. Click the **OK** button to save the settings and exit the interface.
5. In the HDD Information menu, the HDD property will be displayed in the list.

At least 2 hard drives must be added on your DVR when you want to set a HDD to Redundancy when there is one HDD with R/W property.

Configuring Quota Mode

Purpose

Each camera can be configured with allocated quota for the storage of recorded files.

Steps

1. Enter the Storage Mode interface.
Menu > Drives> Advanced
2. Set the **Mode** to Quota.

The DVR must be rebooted to enable the changes to take effect.

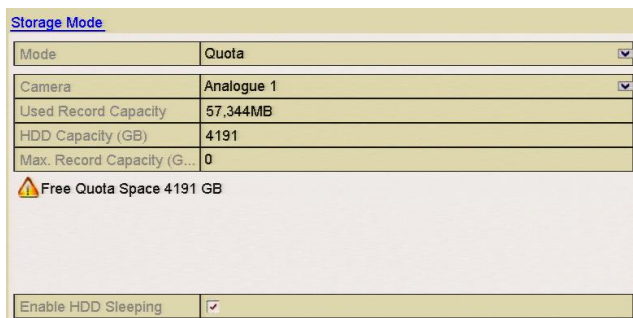


Figure 10.4.2.2 Storage Mode Settings Interface

5. You can copy the quota settings of the current camera to other cameras if required. Click the **Copy** button to enter the Copy Camera interface, as shown below.

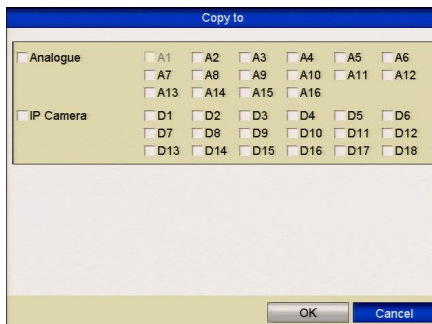


Figure 10.4.2.3 Copy Settings to Other Camera(s)

10.6 Checking S.M.A.R.T Information

Purpose:

The S.M.A.R.T. (Self-Monitoring, Analysis and Reporting Technology) is a monitoring system for HDD to detect and report on various indicators of reliability in the hopes of anticipating failures.

Steps:

1. Enter the HDD Detect interface.
Menu > Tools > HDD Detect
2. Click the S.M.A.R.T. Settings tab to enter the interface.
3. Select the HDD to view its S.M.A.R.T. information list.

If you want to use the HDD even when the S.M.A.R.T. checking has failed, you can click the checkbox left of **Continue to use this disk when self-evaluation is failed.**

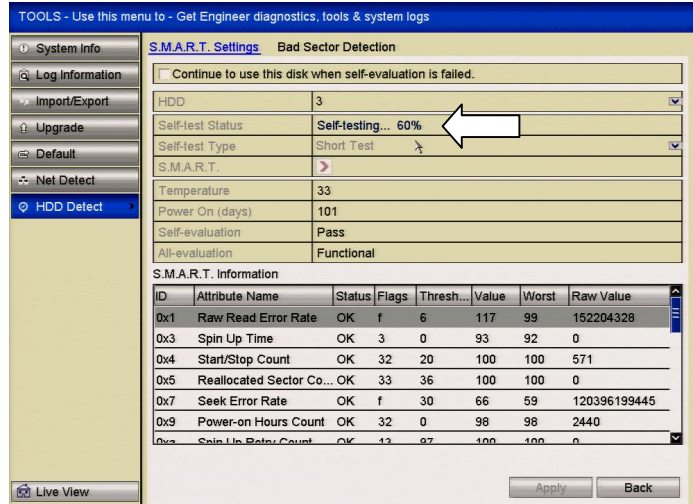


Figure 10.7.1 SMART Test

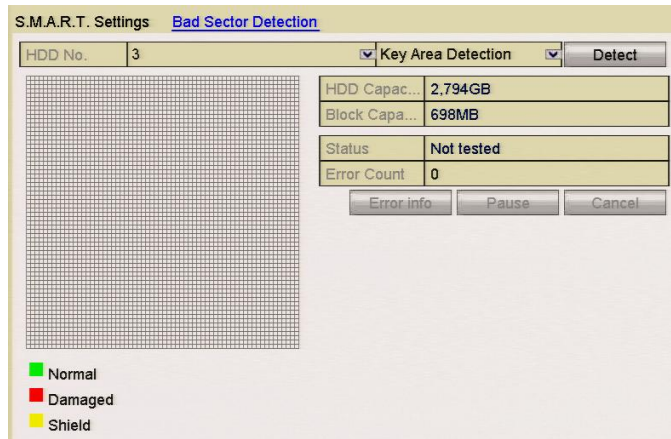


Figure 10.7.2 Bad Sector Detecting

10.9 Configuring Privacy Mask

You are allowed to configure four privacy masking zones that cannot be viewed or recorded by the operator.

1. Enter the Privacy Mask Settings interface.

2. Select the camera to set privacy mask.
3. Click the **Enable Privacy Mask** checkbox to enable this feature.

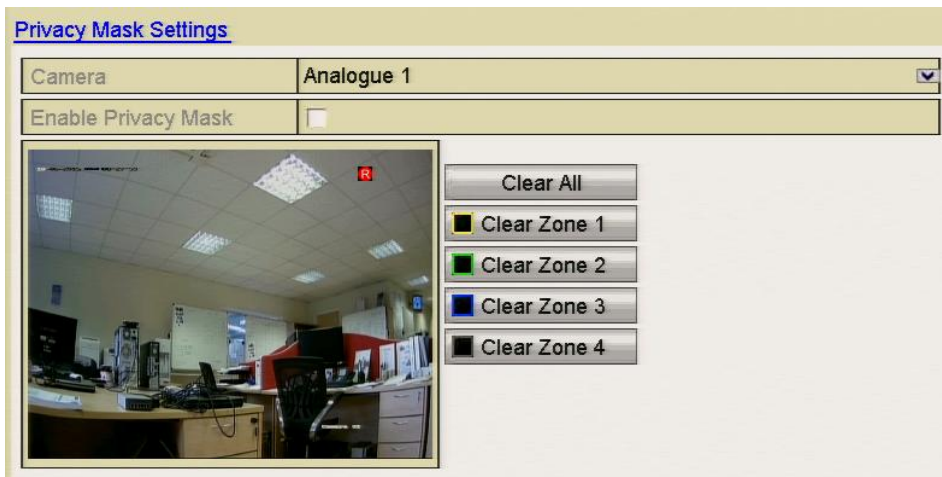


Figure 10.9.1 Privacy Mask Settings Interface

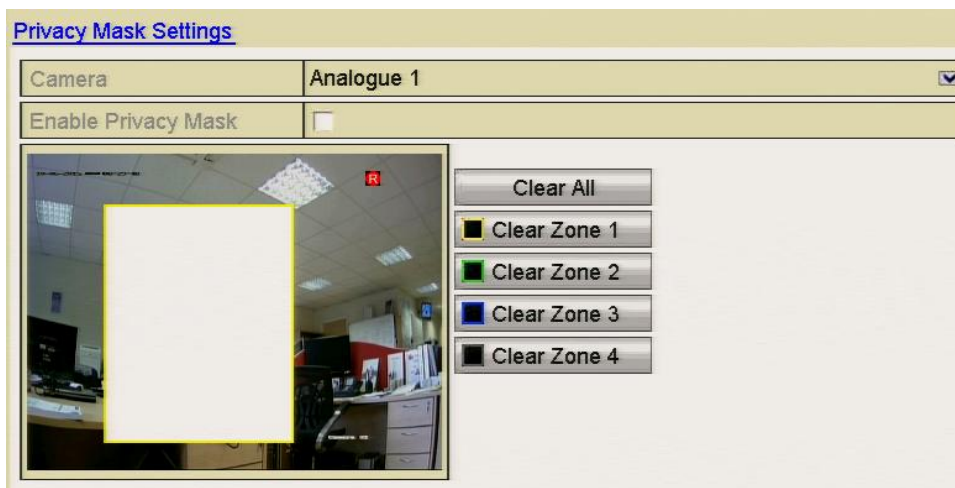


Figure 10.9.2 Set Privacy Mask Area

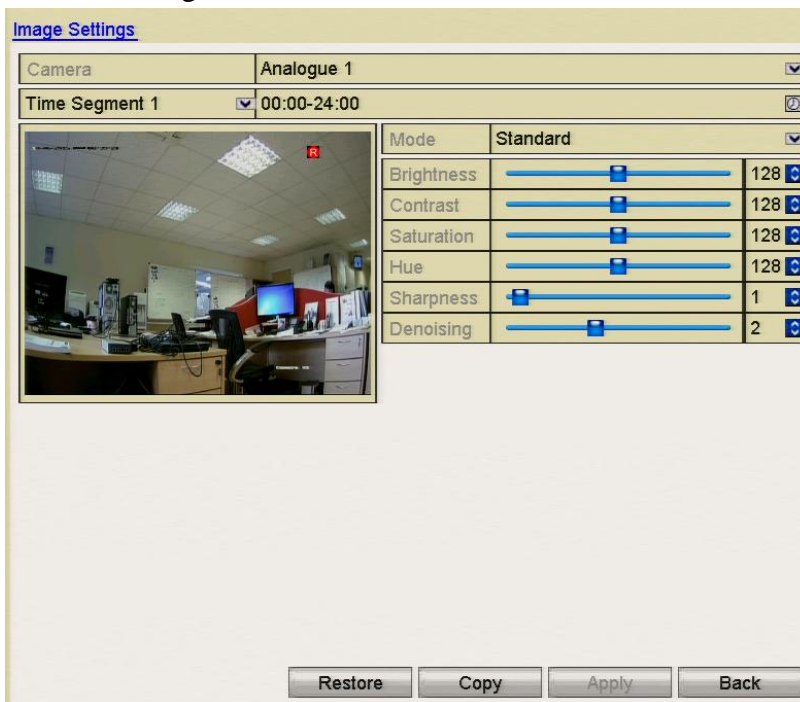


Figure 10.10.1 Image Settings Interface

4. Select the mode from the drop-down list of **Modes** which are: Standard, Indoor, Dim Light and Outdoor.
5. Adjust the image parameters according to actual needs. The parameters include Brightness, Contrast, Saturation, Hue, Sharpness and DE noising. You can also click **Restore** to set the parameters to the default settings.
6. You can click **Copy** to copy the image settings of the current camera to other analogue cameras.
7. Click **Apply** to save the settings.

10.11 Configuring OSD Settings

Purpose:

You can configure the OSD (On-screen Display) settings for the camera, including date /time, camera name, etc.

Steps:

1. Enter the OSD Configuration interface.
Menu > Video > OSD
2. Select the camera to configure OSD settings.
3. Edit the Camera Name in the text field.
4. Configure the Display Name, Display Date and Display Week by checking the checkbox.
5. Select the Date Format, Time Format, Display Mode and the OSD font.

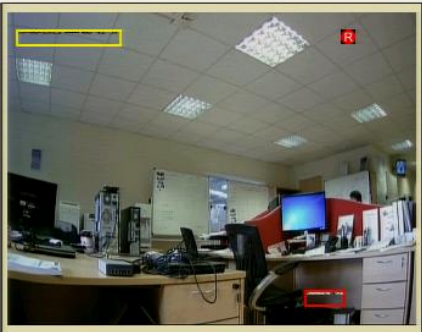

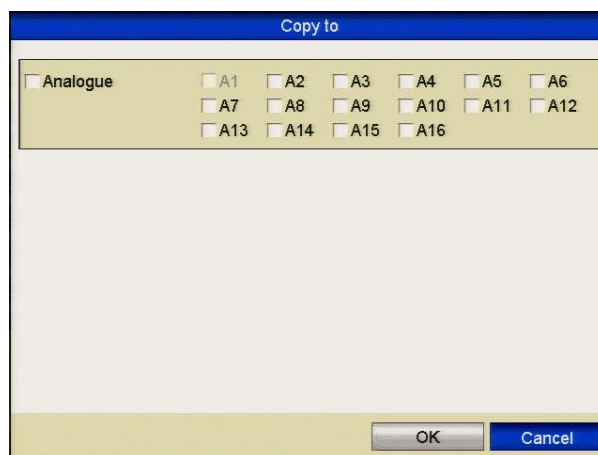


Figure 10.11.2 Copy Settings to Other Cameras

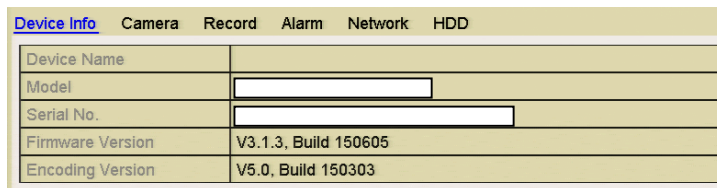


Figure 11.1.1 System Information Interface

11.2 Searching and Exporting Log Files

Purpose:

The operation, alarm, exception and information of the DVR can be stored in log files, which can be viewed and exported at any time.

Steps:

1. Enter the Log Search interface.
Menu > Tools > Log Information

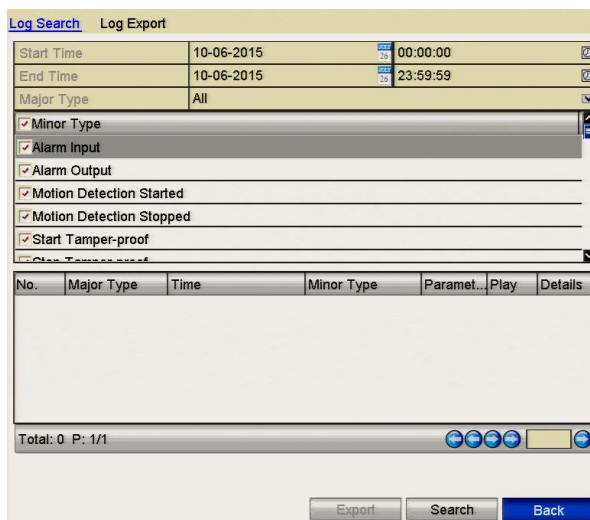


Figure 11.2.1 Log Search Interface

2. Set the log search conditions to refine your search, including the Start Time, End Time, Major Type and Minor Type.

3. Click the **Search** button to start search log files.
4. The matched log files will be displayed on the list shown below.

Up to 2000 log files can be displayed each time.

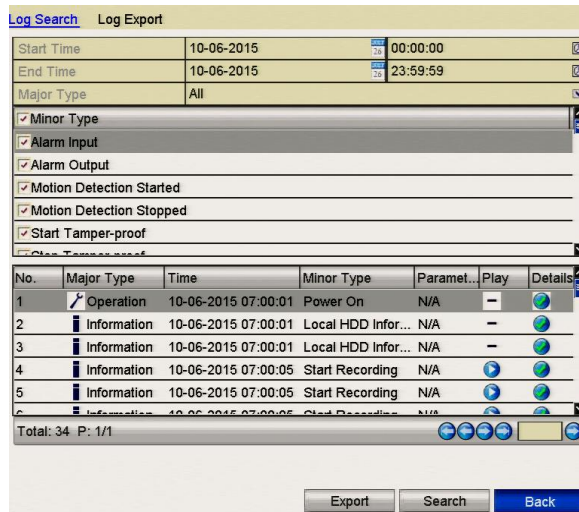


Figure 11.2.2 Log Search Results

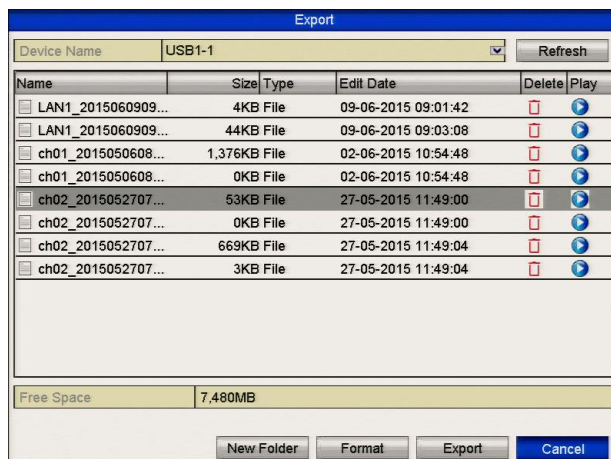


Figure 11.2.4 Export Log Files

8. Click the **Export** to export the log files to the selected backup device.
You can click the **New Folder** button to create a new folder in the backup device, or click the **Format** button to format the backup device before exporting the log.
 - Please connect the backup device to DVR before operating log export.
 - The log files exported to the backup device are named by exporting time, e.g., **20110514124841logBack.txt**.

11.3 Importing/Exporting IP Camera Info

Purpose:

The setup information regarding an IP camera can be copied into an Excel file and exported to a local backup device, including the IP address, port, admin password, etc. The exported file can be edited on your PC, by adding or deleting the content; and copy the settings to other devices by importing the Excel file.

Steps:

1. Enter the camera management interface.
Menu > Video > Camera>IP Camera Import/Export
2. Click the IP Camera Import/Export tab, the content of the detected external device appears.
3. Click the **Export** button to export configuration files to the selected local backup device.
4. To import a configuration file, select the file from the selected backup device and click the **Import** button. After the importing process is complete, you must reboot the DVR.

11.4 Importing/Exporting Configuration Files

Purpose:

The DVR configuration files can be exported to a local device for backup; and the configuration files from one DVR can be imported to multiple DVR devices if they are to be configured with the same parameters.

Steps:

1. Enter the Import/Export Configuration File interface.

Menu > Tools > Import/Export

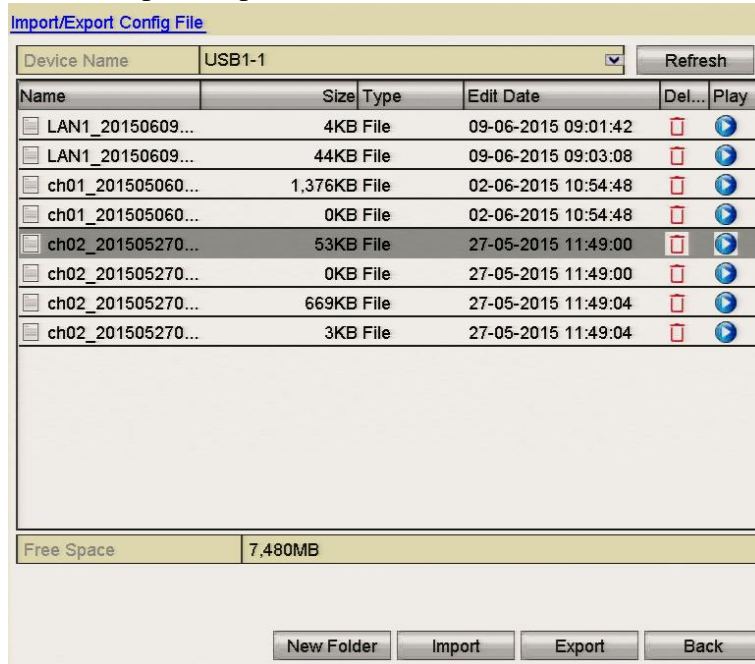


Figure 11.4.1 Import/Export Config File

2. Click the **Export** button to export configuration files to the selected local backup device.
3. To import a configuration file, select the file from the selected backup device and click the **Import** button. After the import process is complete, the DVR must be rebooted. However having finished the import of configuration files, the device will reboot automatically.

11.5 Upgrading Firmware

Purpose:

The firmware on your DVR can be upgraded by local backup device or remote FTP server.

Using incorrect firmware can leave your DVR unusable so never try any firmware upgrade unless you are absolutely sure it is the correct software.

11.5.1 Upgrading by Local Backup Device

Steps:

1. Connect your DVR with a local backup device where the update firmware file is located.
2. Enter the Upgrade interface.
Menu > Tools > Upgrade
3. Click the **Local Upgrade** tab to enter the local upgrade menu.

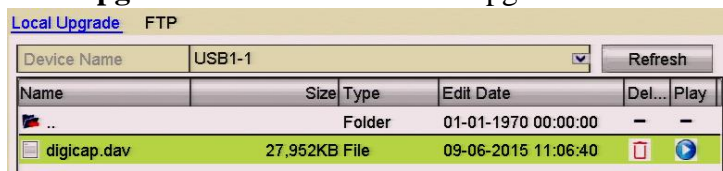


Figure 11.5.1.1 Local Upgrade Interface

4. Select the update file from the backup device.
5. Click the **Upgrade** button to start upgrading.
6. After the upgrading is complete, reboot the DVR to activate the new firmware.

11.5.2 Upgrading by FTP

Before you start:

Configure PC (running FTP server) and DVR in the same Local Area Network. Run the 3rd-party TFTP software on the PC and copy the firmware into the root directory of TFTP.

Steps:

1. Enter the Upgrade interface.
Menu > Maintenance > Upgrade
2. Click the **FTP** tab to enter the local upgrade interface as shown.

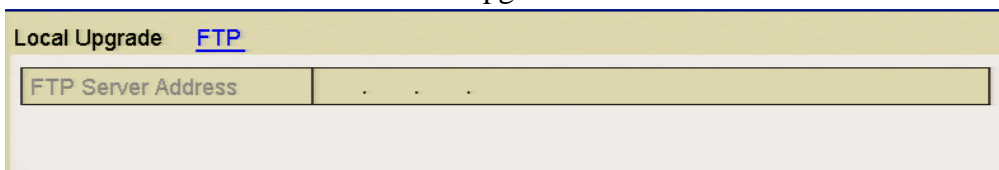


Figure 11.5.2.1 FTP Upgrade Interface

3. Enter the FTP Server Address in the text field.

4. Click the **Upgrade** button to start upgrading.
5. After the upgrading is complete, reboot the DVR to activate the new firmware.

11.6 Restoring Default Settings

Steps:

1. Enter the Default interface.
Menu > Tools > Default

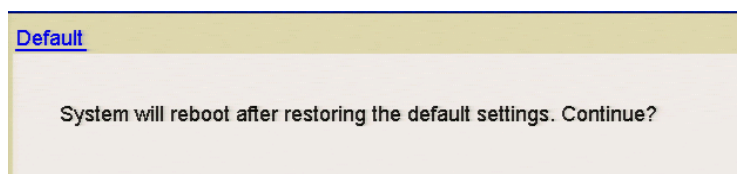


Figure 11.6.1 Restore Factory Default

2. Click the **OK** button to restore the default settings.

Except the network parameters (including IP address, subnet mask, gateway, MTU, default route and server port), all other parameters in the DVR will be restored to factory default settings.

Chapter 12 Others

12.1 Configuring RS-232 Serial Port

Purpose:

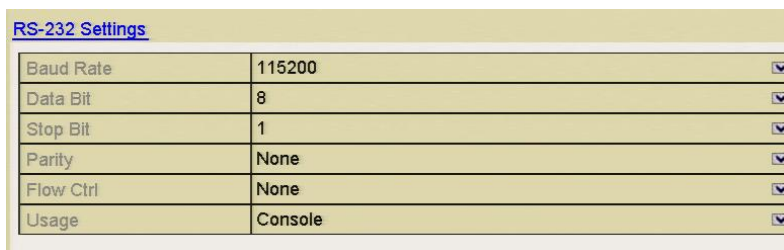
The RS-232 port can be used in two ways:

Parameters Configuration: Connect a PC to the device through the PC serial port. Device parameters can be configured by using software such as HyperTerminal. The serial port parameters must be the same as the device's when connecting through the PC serial port.

Transparent Channel: Connect a serial device directly to the device. The serial device will be controlled remotely by the PC through the network.

Steps:

1. Enter the RS-232 Settings interface.
Menu > Setup > RS-232

12.2 Configuring General Settings

Purpose:

You can configure the output resolution, system time, mouse pointer speed, etc.

Steps:

1. Enter the General Settings interface.
Menu > Setup > General
2. Select the **General** tab.

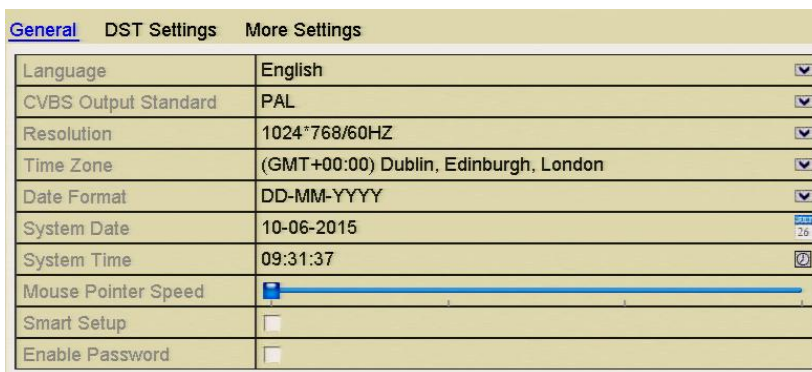


Figure 12.2.1 General Settings Interface

3. Configure the following settings:
 - **Language:** The default language used is *English*.
 - **CVBS Output Standard:** Select the CVBS output standard to NTSC or PAL, which must be the same with the video input standard.

Note that some DVR models provide no CVBS output.

- **Resolution:** Select the output resolution, which must be the same as the resolution of the VGA/HDMI monitor.
 - **Time Zone:** Select the time zone.
 - **Date Format:** Select the date format.
 - **System Date:** Select the system date.
 - **System Time:** Select the system time.
 - **Mouse Pointer Speed:** Set the speed of mouse pointer; 4 levels are configurable.
 - **Enable Wizard:** Enable/disable the Wizard when the device starts up.
 - **Enable ID Authentication:** Enable/disable the use of the login password.
4. Click the **Apply** button to save the settings.

12.3 Configuring DST (Daylight Saving Time)

Steps:

1. Enter the General Settings interface.
Menu >Setup>General
2. Select the **DST Settings** tab.

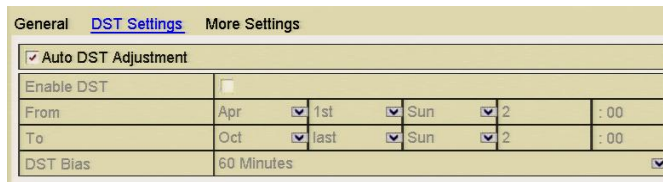


Figure 12.3.1 DST Settings Interface

Click the **Auto DST Adjustment** checkbox.

12.4 Configuring More Settings

Steps:

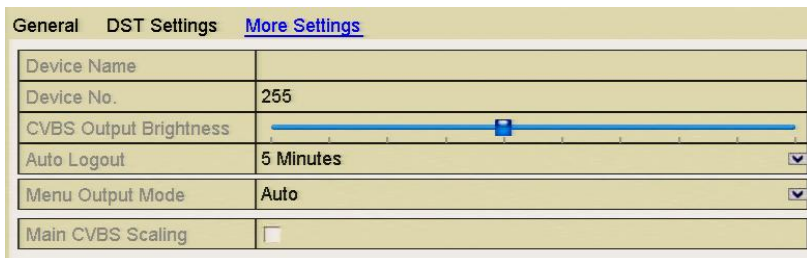


Figure 12.4.1 More Settings Interface

 - **Device Name:** Edit the name of DVR.
 - **Device No.** Edit the DVR device number. This can be set in the range of 1~255. The default No. is 255.
 - **CVBS Output Brightness:** Adjust the video output brightness via the CVBS interface. The MEGA204, MEGA208 and MEGA216 provide no CVBS output.
 - **Auto Logout:** Set timeout time for menu inactivity. E.g., when the timeout time is set to *5 Minutes*, then the system will exit from the current operation menu to live view screen after 5 minutes of menu inactivity.
 - **Menu Output Mode:** You can choose the menu display on different video outputs. Setting Auto will allow the DVR to self detect on bootup.
 - **Main CVBS Scaling:** Enable/disable video output scaling for main CVBS video output.
 - Click the **Apply** button to save the settings.

12.5 Managing User Accounts

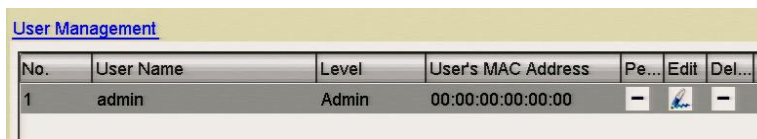
Purpose:

There is a default account in the DVR: *Administrator*. The *Administrator* user name is ***admin*** and the password is ***555555***. The *Administrator* has the permission to add and delete users and configure user parameters.

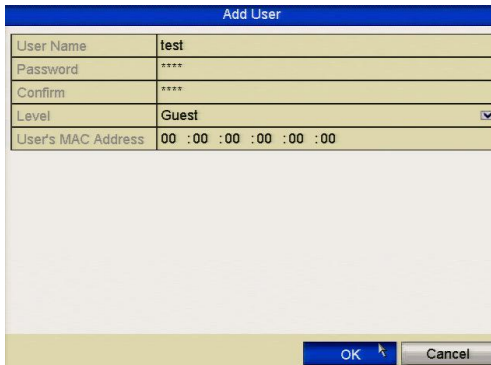

Level: Set the user level to Operator or Guest. Different user levels have different operating permissions.

- **Operator:** The *Operator* user level has permission for Local Log Search in Local Configuration, Remote Log Search and Two-way Audio in Remote Configuration and all operating permissions in Camera Configuration.
- **Guest:** The Guest user has permission for Local Log Search in Local Configuration, Remote Log Search in Remote Configuration and only has the

local/remote playback permission in the Camera Configuration.

User's MAC Address: The MAC address of the remote PC which logs onto the DVR. If it is configured and enabled, it only allows the remote user with this MAC address to access the DVR.

- Click the **OK** button to save the settings and go back to the User Management interface. The added new user will be displayed in the list as shown below.

- Local Log Search: Searching and viewing logs and system information.
- Local Parameters Settings: Configuring parameters, restoring factory default parameters and importing/exporting configuration files.
- Local Advanced Operation: Operating HDD management (initialising HDD, setting HDD property), upgrading system firmware, clearing I/O alarm output.
- Local Shutdown Reboot: Shutting down or rebooting the DVR.

Remote Configuration

- Remote Log Search: Remotely viewing logs that are saved on the DVR.
- Remote Parameters Settings: Remotely configuring parameters, restoring factory default parameters and importing/exporting configuration files.
- Remote Serial Port Control: Configuring settings for RS-232 and RS-485 ports.
- Remote Video Output Control: Sending remote button control signal.
- Two-way Audio: Two-way audio between the remote client and the DVR.
- Remote Alarm Control: Remotely arming (notify alarm and exception message to the remote client) and controlling the alarm output.
- Remote Advanced Operation: Remotely operating HDD management (initialising HDD, setting HDD property), upgrading system firmware, clearing I/O alarm output.
- Remote Shutdown/Reboot: Remotely shutting down or rebooting the DVR.

Camera Configuration

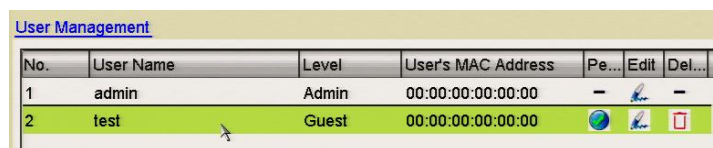
- Remote Live View: Remotely viewing live video for the selected camera(s).
 - Local Manual Operation: Locally start/stopping manual recording and alarm output of the selected camera(s).
 - Remote Manual Operation: Remotely starting/stopping manual recording and alarm output of the selected camera(s).

 - Local Video Export: Locally exporting recorded files of the selected camera(s).
7. Click the **OK** button to save the settings and exit interface.

Only the *admin* user account has the permission for restoring factory default parameters.

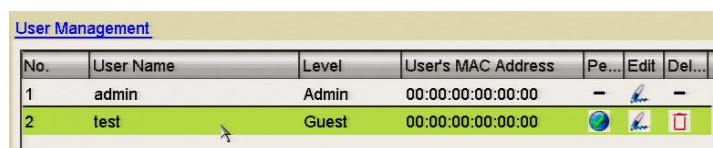
Figure 12.5.2.1 Delete a User

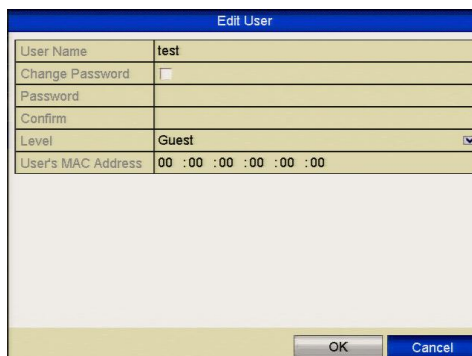

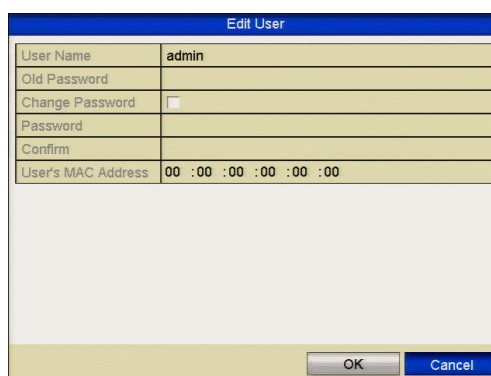
Figure 12.5.3.1 Edit a User

Chapter 13 Glossary

- **Dual Stream:** Dual stream is a technology used to record high resolution video locally while transmitting a lower resolution stream over the network. The two streams are generated by the DVR, with the main stream having a maximum resolution of 1080P and the sub-stream having a maximum resolution of CIF.
- **DVR:** Acronym for Digital Video Recorder. A DVR is device that is able to accept video signals from analog cameras, compress the signal and store it on its hard drives.
- **HDD:** Acronym for Hard Disk Drive. A storage medium which stores digitally encoded data on platters with magnetic surfaces.
- **DHCP:** Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol (DHCP) is a network application protocol used by devices (DHCP clients) to obtain configuration information for operation in an Internet Protocol network.
- **HTTP:** Acronym for Hypertext Transfer Protocol. A protocol to transfer hypertext request and information between servers and browsers over a network
- **PPPoE:** PPPoE, Point-to-Point Protocol over Ethernet, is a network protocol for encapsulating Point-to-Point Protocol (PPP) frames inside Ethernet frames. It is used mainly with ADSL services where individual users connect to the ADSL transceiver (modem) over Ethernet and in plain Metro Ethernet networks.
- **DDNS:** Dynamic DNS is a method, protocol, or network service that provides the capability for a networked device, such as a router or computer system using the Internet Protocol Suite, to notify a domain name server to change, in real time (ad-hoc) the active DNS configuration of its configured hostnames, addresses or other information stored in DNS.
- **Hybrid DVR:** A hybrid DVR is a combination of a DVR and NVR.
- **NTP:** Acronym for Network Time Protocol. A protocol designed to synchronise the clocks of computers over a network.
- **NTSC:** Acronym for National Television System Committee. NTSC is an analogue television standard used in such countries as the United States and Japan. Each frame of an NTSC signal contains 525 scan lines at 60Hz.
- **NVR:** Acronym for Network Video Recorder. An NVR can be a PC-based or embedded system used for centralised management and storage for IP cameras, IP Domes and other DVRs.
- **PAL:** Acronym for Phase Alternating Line. PAL is also another video standard used in broadcast televisions systems in the UK and large parts of the world. PAL signal contains 625 scan lines at 50Hz.
- **PTZ:** Acronym for Pan, Tilt, Zoom. PTZ cameras are motor driven systems that allow the camera to pan left and right, tilt up and down and zoom in and out.
- **USB:** Acronym for Universal Serial Bus. USB is a plug-and-play serial bus standard to interface devices to a host computer.

Chapter 14 Troubleshooting

- **No image displayed on the monitor after the device boots up normally.**

Possible Reasons:

- a) No VGA or HDMI connections.
- b) Connection cable is damaged.
- c) Input mode of the monitor is incorrect or DVR resolution is set higher than the monitor.

Steps:

1. Verify the device is connected to the monitor via HDMI or VGA cable. A composite output is available on some DVR models. Only connect one video cable. Then reboot the DVR to self detect. (The DVR menu (Setup – General – Menu Output Mode) is set to Auto which is self detect, by default)
2. Verify the connection cable is good.
If there is still no image displayed on the monitor after rebooting, please check the cable, or replace and connect again.
3. Verify Input mode of the monitor is correct.
Please check the input mode of the monitor matches with the output mode of the device (e.g. if the output mode of DVR is HDMI output, then the input mode of monitor must be the HDMI input). If not, please modify the input mode of monitor.

- **There is a beeping sound after a new DVR starts up.**

Possible Reasons:

- a) No HDD is installed in the device.
- b) The installed HDD has not been initialised.
- c) The installed HDD is not compatible with the device or is faulty.

Steps:

1. Verify at least one HDD is installed in the device.
 - 1) If not, please install a compatible HDD.
 - 2) If you do not want to install an HDD, select “Menu>Setup> Exceptions” and unclick the Audible Warning checkbox for “HDD Error”.
2. Verify the HDD is initialised.
 - 1) Select “Menu>Drives>General”.
 - 2) If the status of the HDD is “Uninitialised”, please click the checkbox of corresponding HDD and click the “Format” button.
3. Verify the HDD is detected or is in good condition.
 - 1) Select “Menu>Drives>General”.
 - 2) If the HDD is not detected or the status is “Abnormal”, please replace the dedicated HDD according to the requirement.

- **Live view pictures not fluent**

Possible Reasons:

- a) The frame rate is not set to 25fps real-time frame rate.

Steps:

1. Check the parameters of Main Stream (Normal) and Main Stream (Event).
Select “Menu > Video > Encoding > Record”, and set the resolution of Main Stream (Event) the same as the one of Main Stream (Normal).
2. Verify the frame rate is real-time frame rate.
Select “Menu > Video > Encoding > Record”, and set the Frame rate to Full Frame.

- **When using the device to get the live view audio, there is no sound or there is too much noise, or the volume is too low.**

Possible Reasons:

- a) Cable between the audio device and DVR is not connected correctly, there are impedance mismatches or incompatibilities.
- b) The stream type in the DVR menu is not set to “Video & Audio”.

Steps:

1. Verify the cable between the audio unit and DVR is connected correctly, impedance matches and they are compatible.
2. Verify the setting parameters are correct.
Select “Menu > Video > Encoding > Record” and set the Stream Type as “Audio & Video”.

- **No record file found on the DVR local HDD and the prompt “No record file found” displays when you search for recorded files.**

Possible Reasons:

- a) The time setting is incorrect.
- b) The search condition is incorrect.
- c) The HDD is in error or not detected.

Steps:

1. Verify the system time setting is correct.
Select “Menu > Setup > General ” and verify the “Device Time” is correct.
2. Verify the search condition is correct.
Select “Playback”, and verify the channel and time are correct.
3. Verify the HDD status is normal.
Select “Menu > Drives > General” to view the HDD status, and verify the HDD is detected and can be read and written normally.
